Definitions of "Warmly" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “warmly” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In a way that shows friendliness towards a person or enthusiasm for an idea or project.*
- *With colours containing red, yellow, or orange tones.*
- *Using clothes or coverings that help the body to retain heat.*
- *In a hearty manner.*
- *In a way that gives out warmth; with comfortable heat.*
- *In a warm manner.*



Synonyms of "Warmly" as an adverb (3 Words)

cordially With intense feeling.
*He was **cordially** detested for his brutality and injustice.*

heartily In a hearty manner.
*They were **heartily** sick of the whole subject.*

warm In a warm manner.
***Warmly** dressed.*

affection	The action or process of affecting or being affected. <i>She felt affection for the wise old lady.</i>
<u>affectionate</u>	Having or displaying warmth or affection. <i>An affectionate kiss.</i>
balmy	Mild and pleasant. <i>The balmy days of late summer.</i>
caring	A loving feeling. <i>A caring and invaluable friend.</i>
celsius	Swedish astronomer who devised the centigrade thermometer (1701-1744).
cherish	Keep (a hope or ambition) in one's mind. <i>He had long cherished a secret fantasy about his future.</i>
clement	Inclined to show mercy. <i>A more clement judge reduced the sentence.</i>
cordial	A sweet fruit-flavoured drink. <i>A tall glass of blackcurrant cordial.</i>
<u>cozy</u>	Enjoying or affording comforting warmth and shelter especially in a small space. <i>A cozy nook near the fire.</i>
dotting	Extravagantly or foolishly loving and indulgent. <i>She was spoiled outrageously by her dotting father.</i>
embrace	Accept (a belief, theory, or change) willingly and enthusiastically. <i>His career embraces a number of activities composing playing and acting.</i>
embracement	The act of clasping another person in the arms (as in greeting or affection).
<u>enamored</u>	Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness. <i>Narcissus was a beautiful Greek youth who became enamored of his own reflection.</i>
<u>fond</u>	Having an affection or liking for. <i>Fond fancies.</i>
<u>fondly</u>	With foolishly optimistic hope or belief; naively. <i>He talks fondly of his grandfather.</i>
friendly	Not seriously or unpleasantly competitive or divisive. <i>A consumer friendly policy.</i>
<u>fuzzy</u>	Relating to a form of set theory and logic in which predicates may have degrees of applicability, rather than simply being true or false. It has important uses in artificial intelligence and the design of control systems. <i>Fuzzy fake fur throw pillows.</i>

<u>genial</u>	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i>A genial host.</i>
halfhearted	Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm. <i>A halfhearted effort.</i>
<u>hearty</u>	(of a person) strong and healthy. <i>A hearty welcome.</i>
<u>hospitable</u>	Friendly and welcoming to visitors or guests. <i>Two friendly hospitable brothers run the hotel.</i>
<u>hug</u>	Fit closely or tightly. <i>A pair of jeans that hugged the contours of his body.</i>
loving	Feeling or showing love or great care. <i>The cargo was described in loving detail.</i>
<u>lovingly</u>	With love or great care. <i>They smile lovingly at each other.</i>
lukewarm	Moderately warm. <i>He hates lukewarm coffee.</i>
soft	In a relaxed manner or without hardship soft is nonstandard. <i>The ground was soft beneath their feet.</i>
temperate	Free from extremes; mild; or characteristic of such weather or climate. <i>Temperate in his response to criticism.</i>
<u>tender</u>	Make tender or more tender as by marinating pounding or applying a tenderizer. <i>A tender heart.</i>
tepid	(especially of a liquid) only slightly warm; lukewarm. <i>The applause was tepid.</i>
