- belligerent** Characteristic of an enemy or one eager to fight.

- clashing** Sharply and harshly discordant.  
***Clashing** colors.*
- conflicting** Incompatible or at variance; contradictory.  
***Conflicting** opinions.*
- fighting** Displaying or engaging in violence, combat, or aggression.  
*Review the **fighting** forces.*
- militant** Favoured confrontational or violent methods in support of a political or social cause.  
***Militant** in fighting for better wages for workers.*
- opposing** In conflict or competition with someone or something.  
*The brothers fought on **opposing** sides in the war.*
- war-ridden** Engaged in war.

<b>barbaric</b>	Savagely cruel. <b>Barbaric</b> use of color or ornament.
<b>bellicose</b>	Demonstrating aggression and willingness to fight. <b>Bellicose</b> young officers.
<b>belligerent</b>	Characteristic of an enemy or one eager to fight. <i>Ships and goods captured at sea by a <b>belligerent</b>.</i>
<b>combatant</b>	A person engaged in conflict or competition with another. <i>In the long Russo Swedish conflict both <b>combatants</b> endured terrible sacrifices.</i>
<b>combative</b>	Ready or eager to fight or argue. <i>He made some enemies with his <b>combative</b> style.</i>
<b>competitive</b>	Involving competition or competitiveness. <i>Highly <b>competitive</b> sales representative.</i>
<b><u>confrontational</u></b>	Of or relating to confrontation. <i>He distanced himself from the <b>confrontational</b> approach adopted by his predecessor.</i>
<b>crossfire</b>	A lively or heated interchange of ideas and opinions. <i>A photographer was killed in <b>crossfire</b>.</i>
<b>demobilize</b>	Cease military operations. <i>He was <b>demobilized</b> in February 1946.</i>
<b><u>disarm</u></b>	Make less hostile; win over. <i>Police yesterday <b>disarmed</b> a parcel bomb.</i>
<b>fighter</b>	A person or animal that fights. <i>World War II <b>fighter</b> planes.</i>
<b><u>hostile</u></b>	Characterized by enmity or ill will. <b>Hostile</b> tender offer.
<b><u>hostility</u></b>	A hostile (very unfriendly) disposition. <i>He could no longer contain his <b>hostility</b>.</i>
<b>invader</b>	Someone who enters by force in order to conquer. <i>The arrival of Spanish <b>invaders</b>.</i>
<b>martial</b>	Roman poet noted for epigrams (first century BC). <b>Martial</b> law.
<b><u>menacing</u></b>	Suggesting the presence of danger; threatening. <i>Our officers encountered <b>menacing</b> looks from teenagers.</i>
<b><u>militant</u></b>	A militant person. <i>The army are in conflict with <b>militant</b> groups.</i>

<b><u>military</u></b>	Characteristic of or associated with soldiers or the military. <i>As a young man he joined the <b>military</b> and pursued a career in the Army.</i>
<b>militia</b>	A military force that is raised from the civil population to supplement a regular army in an emergency. <i>Their troops were untrained <b>militia</b>.</i>
<b>pugnacious</b>	Ready and able to resort to force or violence- Herman Melville. <i>His public statements became increasingly <b>pugnacious</b>.</i>
<b>scrappy</b>	Determined, argumentative, or pugnacious. <i>He had a <b>scrappy</b> New York temperament.</i>
<b><u>truculent</u></b>	Eager or quick to argue or fight; aggressively defiant. <i>A <b>truculent</b> speech against the new government.</i>
<b><u>war</u></b>	A legal state created by a declaration of war and ended by official declaration during which the international rules of war apply. <i>Japan declared <b>war</b> on Germany.</i>
<b><u>warlike</u></b>	Suggesting war or military life. <i>A <b>warlike</b> clan.</i>
<b><u>warrior</u></b>	(especially in former times) a brave or experienced soldier or fighter. <i>I really love the <b>warrior</b> pose it makes me feel centred and strong.</i>
