- Someone who dissipates resources self-indulgently.








Synonyms of "Wastrel" as a noun (19 Words)

do-nothing	Person who does no work.
drone	A musical instrument or part of one sounding a continuous note of low pitch in particular also drone pipe a pipe in a bagpipe or also drone string a string in an instrument such as a hurdy gurdy or a sitar. Only twenty minutes of the hour long drone had passed.
good-for-nothing	A quantity of no importance.
idler	Person who does no work.
laggard	Someone who takes more time than necessary; someone who lags behind. Staff were under enormous pressure and there was no time for laggards.
layabout	A person who habitually does little or no work. <i>How d you get mixed up with that layabout.</i>
loafer	A low leather step-in shoe; the top resembles a moccasin but it has a broad flat heel. <i>His handmade Italian loafers</i> .
lounger	A comfortable chair for relaxing on, especially an outdoor chair that adjusts or extends, allowing a person to recline. The lounger s in the beer parlour catcalled at him.
ne'er-do-well	An idle worthless person.
prodigal	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. The government wished to clip the wings of the local authority prodigals .
profligate	A recklessly extravagant consumer. <i>He is a drunkard and a profligate.</i>
shirker	A person who shirks his work or duty (especially one who tries to evade military service in wartime.
slob	A coarse obnoxious person. He s a slob and expects others to clean up after him.
slug	A strip of type metal used for spacing. Writers can edit the slug that will become an article or page URL.
slugabed	A person who stays in bed until a relatively late hour.
sluggard	A lazy, sluggish person. I m waiting for those sluggard s to bring my steak.



spendthrift	Someone who spends money prodigally. Putt was a spendthrift and a heavy gambler.
squanderer	A recklessly extravagant consumer.
waster	A person who destroys or ruins or lays waste to. It s nice to know you re not a complete waster .

degraded Reduced in quality; inferior. She had felt cheap and **degraded**.



disintegration	The spontaneous disintegration of a radioactive substance along with the emission of ionizing radiation. The twin problems of economic failure and social disintegration .
dissipation	Breaking up and scattering by dispersion. Mindless dissipation of natural resources.
dissolute	Unrestrained by convention or morality. Unfortunately his heir was feckless and dissolute .
<u>dissolution</u>	The process of going into solution. <i>An advanced state of dissolution.</i>
<u>expensive</u>	High in price or charging high prices. An expensive shop.
extravagance	The trait of spending extravagantly. His reckless extravagance with other people s money.
extravagant	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>Extravagant</i> claims about the merchandise.
<u>garbage</u>	Worthless or meaningless material or ideas; rubbish. A store full of overpriced garbage .
<u>indolent</u>	Wanting to avoid activity or exertion; lazy. Leprosy is an indolent infectious disease.
<u>ineffective</u>	Not producing an intended effect. A weak and ineffective president.
<u>inefficiency</u>	Unskillfulness resulting from a lack of efficiency. The idea is to eliminate inefficiency creating a seamless manufacturing process.
<u>inefficient</u>	Not achieving maximum productivity; wasting or failing to make the best use of time or resources. <i>Inefficient</i> transport systems.
languor	Tiredness or inactivity, especially when pleasurable. The afternoon was hot quiet and heavy with languor .
<u>lavish</u>	Sumptuously rich, elaborate, or luxurious. <i>Lavish</i> praise.
<u>lazy</u>	Moving slowly and gently. At a lazy pace.
looseness	The quality of movability by virtue of being free from attachment or other restraints. Misunderstandings can often be traced to a looseness of expression.



lot	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. The contents have already been lot ted up and the auction takes place on Monday.
luxury	Luxurious or of the nature of a luxury. They actually had the luxury of a whole day together.
prodigal	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. <i>The dessert was prodigal with whipped cream.</i>
prodigality	The trait of spending extravagantly.
profligacy	Reckless extravagance or wastefulness in the use of resources. An era of extreme decadence and profligacy .
profligate	A dissolute man in fashionable society. <i>He succumbed to drink and a profligate lifestyle.</i>
slothful	Lazy. Fatigue made him slothful .
slow	Slow to learn or understand lacking intellectual acuity Thackeray. <i>A slow process.</i>
spending	The act of spending or disbursing money.
spendthrift	Someone who spends money prodigally. Putt was a spendthrift and a heavy gambler.
splurge	An ostentatious display (of effort or extravagance etc. We splurge d on T bone steaks.
wastebasket	A container with an open top; for discarded paper and other rubbish.
<u>wasteful</u>	Inefficient in use of time and effort and materials. <i>Wasteful</i> duplication of effort.
