### Definitions of "Wavy" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “wavy” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Uneven by virtue of having wrinkles or waves.*
- *Divided or edged with a line formed of alternating shallow curves.*
- *Having waves.*
- *(of hair) having waves.*
- *Having a form or edge that smoothly curves in and out.*



## Synonyms of "Wavy" as an adjective (14 Words)

<b>crinkled</b>	Uneven by virtue of having wrinkles or waves. <i>A skirt in <b>crinkled</b> fabric.</i>
<b>crinkly</b>	Full of creases or wrinkles; wrinkled. <i>Brown <b>crinkly</b> paper.</i>
<b>curling</b>	(of hair) making curls or having been made to curl.
<b>curly</b>	(of hair) having curls or waves. <i>They envied her naturally <b>curly</b> hair.</i>
<b>curved</b>	Having or marked by a curve or smoothly rounded bend. <i>The <b>curved</b> tusks of a walrus.</i>
<b>curving</b>	Having or marked by a curve or smoothly rounded bend.
<b>curvy</b>	(of a woman's body) having a large bosom and pleasing curves. <i>A settee with only one <b>curvy</b> end.</i>
<b>meandering</b>	Proceeding in a convoluted or undirected fashion. <i>A brilliant sample of <b>meandering</b> discourse.</i>
<b>rippled</b>	Uneven by virtue of having wrinkles or waves. <i>The <b>rippled</b> surface of the pond.</i>

<b>squiggly</b>	Wavy and twisting.
<b>undulating</b>	Having a smoothly rising and falling form or outline. <i>The valley s <b>undulating</b> contours.</i>
<b>wavelike</b>	Uneven by virtue of having wrinkles or waves.
<b>winding</b>	Following a twisting or spiral course. <b>Winding</b> roads are full of surprises.
<b>zigzag</b>	Having the form of a zigzag veering alternately to right and left. <i>When chased by a predator some animals take a <b>zigzag</b> course.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Wavy" as an adjective

- *She had long, wavy hair.*
- *The leaf has a wavy edge.*
- *Visual distortion that makes straight lines appear wavy.*
- *She had long wavy hair.*



## Associations of "Wavy" (30 Words)

### **approximate**

Close to the actual, but not completely accurate or exact.

*The **approximate** time was 10 o'clock.*

### **approximative**

(of a method, description, etc.) giving only an approximation to something.

*A crudely **approximative** outline.*

<b>asymmetric</b>	Characterized by asymmetry in the spatial arrangement or placement of parts or components.
<b>asymmetrical</b>	Having parts or aspects that are not equal or equivalent; unequal. <i>The church has an <b>asymmetrical</b> plan with an aisle only on one side.</i>
<b>blond</b>	Being or having light colored skin and hair and usually blue or grey eyes. <b>Blond</b> Scandinavians.
<b><u>bumpy</u></b>	Covered with or full of bumps. <i>Investors could be in for a <b>bumpy</b> ride.</i>
<b>circular</b>	Having a circular shape. <i>The reality of standard English rests on the <b>circular</b> argument that that is good which good users use.</i>
<b>curly</b>	(of hair) having curls or waves. <i>My hair is just naturally thick and <b>curly</b>.</i>
<b><u>distance</u></b>	Beat a horse by a distance. <i>They sped off into the <b>distance</b>.</i>
<b><u>erratic</u></b>	Having no fixed course. <i>An <b>erratic</b> comet.</i>
<b>hair</b>	Hairs collectively especially those growing on a person's head. <i>Thick black <b>hairs</b> on his huge arms.</i>
<b>hilly</b>	Having hills and crags. <i>A remote <b>hilly</b> district.</i>
<b><u>irregular</u></b>	A member of an irregular armed force that fights a stronger force by sabotage and harassment. <i>Their involvement in <b>irregular</b> financial dealings.</i>
<b><u>jagged</u></b>	With rough, sharp points protruding. <i>Her <b>jagged</b> nerves.</i>
<b>jaundice</b>	Affect with or as if with jaundice. <i>Jealousy had <b>jaundiced</b> his judgment.</i>
<b>line</b>	Be in line with form a line along. <i>Laughter <b>lines</b>.</i>
<b>lopsided</b>	With one side lower or smaller than the other. <i>A <b>lopsided</b> grin.</i>
<b>myopic</b>	Lacking foresight or intellectual insight. <i><b>Myopic</b> thinking.</i>
<b><u>orange</u></b>	A butterfly with mainly or partly orange wings. <i>A slice of <b>orange</b>.</i>

<b>patchy</b>	Not of the same quality throughout; inconsistent. <i>Your coursework was <b>patchy</b>.</i>
<b>perm</b>	Set the hair in a perm. <i>She <b>perms</b> her hair.</i>
<b>proximity</b>	A Gestalt principle of organization holding that (other things being equal) objects or events that are near to one another (in space or time) are perceived as belonging together as a unit. <i>Do not operate microphones in close <b>proximity</b> to television sets.</i>
<b>sinuate</b>	Having a wavy or sinuous margin; with alternate rounded notches and lobes.
<b>stripe</b>	Mark with stripes. <i>A pair of blue shorts with pink <b>stripes</b>.</i>
<b>toothed</b>	Having an irregularly notched or toothed margin as though gnawed. <i>Saw <b>toothed</b>.</i>
<b>unequal</b>	A person or thing regarded as unequal to another in status or level. <i><b>Unequal</b> odds.</i>
<b>uneven</b>	(of a contest or contestants) not fairly matched as opponents. <i>The <b>uneven</b> distribution of resources.</i>
<b>wanting</b>	Inadequate in amount or degree. <i>Tested and found <b>wanting</b>.</i>
<b>weal</b>	Mark with a weal. <i>His neck was <b>wealed</b> and raw.</i>
<b>yellow</b>	Changed to a yellowish color by age. <i>He d better get back there quick and prove he s not <b>yellow</b>.</i>
