| <b>undulating</b> | Having a smoothly rising and falling form or outline.<br><i>The valley s <b>undulating</b> contours.</i>   |
| <b>wavelike</b>   | Uneven by virtue of having wrinkles or waves.  |
| <b>winding</b>    | Following a twisting or spiral course.<br><b>Winding</b> roads are full of surprises.  |
| <b>zigzag</b>     | Having the form of a zigzag veering alternately to right and left.<br><i>When chased by a predator some animals take a <b>zigzag</b> course.</i> |

| <b>erratic</b>      | Having no fixed course.<br><i>An <b>erratic</b> comet.</i>  |
| <b>hair</b>         | Hairs collectively especially those growing on a person's head.<br><i>Thick black <b>hairs</b> on his huge arms.</i>  |
| <b>hilly</b>        | Having hills and crags.<br><i>A remote <b>hilly</b> district.</i>   |
| <b>irregular</b>    | A member of an irregular armed force that fights a stronger force by sabotage and harassment.<br><i>Their involvement in <b>irregular</b> financial dealings.</i> |
| <b>jagged</b>       | With rough, sharp points protruding.<br><i>Her <b>jagged</b> nerves.</i>  |
| <b>jaundice</b>     | Affect with or as if with jaundice.<br><i>Jealousy had <b>jaundiced</b> his judgment.</i>   |
| <b>line</b>         | Be in line with form a line along.<br><i>Laughter <b>lines</b>.</i>   |
| <b>lopsided</b>     | With one side lower or smaller than the other.<br><i>A <b>lopsided</b> grin.</i>  |
| <b>myopic</b>       | Lacking foresight or intellectual insight.<br><i><b>Myopic</b> thinking.</i>  |
| <b>orange</b>       | A butterfly with mainly or partly orange wings.<br><i>A slice of <b>orange</b>.</i>   |

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| <b>patchy</b>    | Not of the same quality throughout; inconsistent.<br><i>Your coursework was <b>patchy</b>.</i>  |
| <b>perm</b>      | Set the hair in a perm.<br><i>She <b>perms</b> her hair.</i>  |
| <b>proximity</b> | A Gestalt principle of organization holding that (other things being equal) objects or events that are near to one another (in space or time) are perceived as belonging together as a unit.<br><i>Do not operate microphones in close <b>proximity</b> to television sets.</i> |
| <b>sinuate</b>   | Having a wavy or sinuous margin; with alternate rounded notches and lobes.  |
| <b>stripe</b>    | Mark with stripes.<br><i>A pair of blue shorts with pink <b>stripes</b>.</i>  |
| <b>toothed</b>   | Having an irregularly notched or toothed margin as though gnawed.<br><i>Saw <b>toothed</b>.</i>   |
| <b>unequal</b>   | A person or thing regarded as unequal to another in status or level.<br><i><b>Unequal</b> odds.</i>   |
| <b>uneven</b>    | (of a contest or contestants) not fairly matched as opponents.<br><i>The <b>uneven</b> distribution of resources.</i>   |
| <b>wanting</b>   | Inadequate in amount or degree.<br><i>Tested and found <b>wanting</b>.</i>  |
