- drifter** A wanderer who has no established residence or visible means of support.
- gypsy** The Indic language of the Gypsies.
*Why should she choose to wander the world with a penniless **gypsy** like me.*
- itinerant** A laborer who moves from place to place as demanded by employment.
***Itinerant** traders.*
- journeyer** A traveler going on a trip.
- migrant** A person who moves from one place to another, especially in order to find work or better living conditions.
- nomad** A member of a people who have no permanent home but move about according to the seasons.
*The **nomads** who roam the borderlands of Afghanistan.*

traveller A member of a community traditionally having an itinerant way of life, in particular an Irish Traveller.
*Business **travellers**.*

vagabond Anything that resembles a vagabond in having no fixed place.
*Pirate ships were **vagabonds** of the sea.*

vagrant A wanderer.
*Most birders are hoping to find the wind blown **vagrants** of migration.*

***Adventurous** pioneers.*

airline A pipe supplying air.
***Airline** pilot.*

airport	Relating to or denoting light popular fiction such as is offered for sale to travellers in airports. <i>An airport thriller.</i>
circumnavigate	Avoid dealing with (something difficult or unpleasant). <i>He helped her to circumnavigate a frozen puddle.</i>
cruise	An ocean trip taken for pleasure. <i>A cruise liner.</i>
embark	Go on board. <i>She embarked upon a new career.</i>
<u>expedition</u>	The people involved in an expedition. <i>An expedition was sent to explore Mars.</i>
exploration	Thorough examination of a subject. <i>An exploration of the African interior.</i>
explorer	A commercial browser. <i>A polar explorer.</i>
<u>flight</u>	A formation of aircraft in flight. <i>An eagle in flight.</i>
guided	Conducted by a guide. <i>A guided tour of the castle.</i>
<u>international</u>	A player who has taken part in an international game or contest. <i>Large international hotels.</i>
itinerary	A planned route or journey. <i>His itinerary included an official visit to Canada.</i>
itinerate	Travel from place to place, as for work. <i>Regular use of itinerating magistrates was made.</i>
journey	Undertake a journey or trip. <i>I was excited with my character's journey in the film.</i>
maritime	Bordering on or living or characteristic of those near the sea. <i>A maritime museum.</i>
<u>migrate</u>	(of an animal, typically a bird or fish) move from one region or habitat to another according to the seasons. <i>Rural populations have migrated to urban areas.</i>
nonnative	Of plants or animals originating in a part of the world other than where they are growing. <i>Our large nonnative population.</i>
<u>odyssey</u>	A long wandering and eventful journey. <i>His odyssey from military man to politician.</i>

peregrination	Traveling or wandering around. <i>She kept Aunt Ilsa company on her peregrinations.</i>
sightseeing	The activity of visiting places of interest in a particular location. <i>A sightseeing tour.</i>
<u>stranger</u>	An individual that one is not acquainted with. <i>He must have been a stranger to the village.</i>
<u>tour</u>	Take a performer production etc on tour. <i>He decided to tour France.</i>
transcontinental	A transcontinental railway or train. <i>A transcontinental radio audience.</i>
travel	Travel upon or across. <i>My job involves a lot of travel.</i>
<u>traveler</u>	A person who changes location.
trip	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>The man was determined to trip him up on his economics.</i>
venturous	Disposed to venture or take risks. <i>A venturous spirit.</i>
<u>voyage</u>	Go on a voyage. <i>Writing a biography is a voyage of discovery.</i>
world	Another planet like the earth. <i>They consider the church to be independent of the world.</i>
