<u>accede</u>	Yield to another's wish or opinion. <i>By now John had died and Henry III had acceded.</i>
acquiesce	Accept something reluctantly but without protest. <i>Sara acquiesced in his decision.</i>
blunt	Make dull or blunt. <i>Blunt the knives.</i>
break	Become fractured break or crack on the surface only. <i>Dawn was just breaking.</i>
come round	Cover a certain distance.
<u>compromise</u>	Make a compromise arrive at a compromise. <i>Last month's leak of source code will not compromise your IT security.</i>

counteract	Oppose or check by a counteraction. <i>Should we deliberately intervene in the climate system to counteract global warming.</i>
countermine	Dig a countermine against. <i>They countermined the enemies mines so that sometimes they fought hand to hand underground.</i>
damp	Lessen in force or effect. <i>Concrete structures damp out any vibrations.</i>
dampen	Lessen in force or effect. <i>Nothing could dampen her enthusiasm.</i>
de-escalate	Reduce the level or intensity or size or scope of.
debilitate	Make weak. <i>He was severely debilitated by a stomach upset.</i>
decrease	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>He decreased his staff.</i>
deplete	Diminish in number or quantity. <i>Reservoirs have been depleted by years of drought.</i>
dilute	Reduce the value of (a shareholding) by issuing more shares in a company without increasing the values of its assets. <i>Bleach can be diluted with cold water.</i>
diminish	Make or become less. <i>The pain will gradually diminish.</i>
dwindle	Become smaller or lose substance. <i>Her savings dwindled down.</i>
ease up	Lessen pain or discomfort; alleviate.
ebb	Hem in fish with stakes and nets so as to prevent them from going back into the sea with the ebb. <i>The tide began to ebb.</i>
enervate	Disturb the composure of. <i>The heat enervated us all.</i>
enfeeble	Make weak. <i>Sickness had enfeebled me.</i>
exhaust	Make (someone) feel very tired. <i>Her day out had exhausted her.</i>
fizzle out	To state openly and publicly one's homosexuality.
give in	Consent to engage in sexual intercourse with a man.
give way	Afford access to.

grow dim	Develop and reach maturity; undergo maturation.
grow faint	Grow emotionally or mature.
<u>impair</u>	Weaken or damage (something, especially a faculty or function). <i>A noisy job could permanently impair their hearing.</i>
incapacitate	Injure permanently. <i>He was incapacitated by a heart attack.</i>
lessen	Wear off or die down. <i>The warmth of the afternoon lessened.</i>
let up	Cause to move; cause to be in a certain position or condition.
melt away	Become more relaxed, easygoing, or genial.
mitigate	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>There had been a provocation that mitigated the offence to a degree.</i>
moderate	Lessen the intensity of; temper; hold in restraint; hold or keep within limits. <i>The weather has moderated considerably.</i>
peter out	To state openly and publicly one's homosexuality.
reduce	Reduce in size reduce physically. <i>Reduce an image.</i>
<u>relent</u>	Give in, as to influence or pressure. <i>She was going to refuse his request but relented.</i>
<u>sabotage</u>	Destroy property or hinder normal operations. <i>Power lines from South Africa were sabotaged by rebel forces.</i>
sap	Deplete. <i>Her illness had sapped her of energy and life.</i>
sap one's strength	Deplete.
soften	Make (images or sounds) soft or softer. <i>Soften a shock.</i>
soften up	Make less severe or harsh.
step down	Cause (a computer) to execute a single command.
subside	Wear off or die down. <i>The valleys subside.</i>
<u>subvert</u>	Destroy completely. <i>Subvert the ruling class.</i>
<u>succumb</u>	Die from the effect of a disease or injury. <i>After a few blows there the porcupine succumbs.</i>
tail off	Remove or shorten the tail of an animal.

taper off	Diminish gradually.
<u>temper</u>	Make more temperate acceptable or suitable by adding something else. <i>The way a smith would temper a sword.</i>
<u>thin</u>	Make thin or thinner. <i>The trees began to thin out.</i>
tire	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>The proof of a great story is that people never tire of retelling it.</i>
trail off	Move, proceed, or walk draggingly or slowly.
undermine	Hollow out as if making a cave or opening. <i>The flow of water had undermined pillars supporting the roof.</i>
wane	(of a state or feeling) decrease in vigour or extent; become weaker. <i>Interest in the project waned.</i>
water down	Secrete or form water, as tears or saliva.
wear out	Be dressed in.
yield	Produce or provide (a natural, agricultural, or industrial product). <i>The land yields grapes and tobacco.</i>

adulterate	Corrupt, debase, or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance; often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. Adulterate remedies.
attenuate	Reduce the force, effect, or value of. <i>The first live vaccine was insufficiently attenuated and produced a significant disease.</i>

dampen	Reduce the amplitude of (a sound source). <i>The fine rain dampened her face.</i>
deaden	Make (someone) insensitive to something. <i>Diabetes can deaden the nerve endings.</i>
debilitate	Hinder, delay, or weaken. <i>Hard drugs destroy families and debilitate communities.</i>
decline	A condition inferior to an earlier condition; a gradual falling off from a better state. <i>This Evening from the Sun s decline arriv d.</i>
dilute	Lessen the strength or flavor of a solution or mixture. <i>Diluted alcohol.</i>
diminish	Make or become less. <i>The pain will gradually diminish.</i>
diminished	Diminished in size or strength as a result of disease or injury or lack of use. <i>A diminished role for local government.</i>
emasculate	Deprive of strength or vigor. <i>In his mind her success emasculated him.</i>
enervate	Make (someone) feel drained of energy or vitality. <i>The heat enervated us all.</i>
enfeeble	Make weak or feeble. <i>The breakdown in law and order enfeebled the government s authority.</i>
fading	Weakening in force or intensity.
fatigued	Drained of energy or effectiveness; extremely tired; completely exhausted.
flagging	Flagstones collectively. <i>She wants to revive her flagging career.</i>
hydrolyze	Undergo hydrolysis; decompose by reacting with water.
impotent	Unable to take effective action; helpless or powerless. <i>Felt impotent rage.</i>
languid	(of a period of time) relaxed and peaceful. <i>A languid wave of the hand.</i>
languish	Fail to make progress or be successful. <i>She still languished after Richard.</i>
lessen	Wear off or die down. <i>The years have lessened the gap in age between us.</i>
rarefy	Lessen the density or solidity of. <i>As the shell continues to expand and rarefy astronomers may eventually be able to see characteristic gamma rays from the radioactivity within.</i>

reduce	Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. <i>She reduced her niece to a servant.</i>
reduced	Well below normal (especially in price).
<u>sabotage</u>	Destroy property or hinder normal operations. <i>A coordinated campaign of sabotage.</i>
slowly	Without speed slow is sometimes used informally for slowly. <i>He spoke slowly.</i>
thinner	A diluting agent. <i>Dampen a clean rag with thinners and carefully wipe any remaining dust from the timber.</i>
undermine	Lessen the effectiveness, power, or ability of, especially gradually or insidiously. <i>The flow of water had undermined pillars supporting the roof.</i>
unsettle	Disturb the composure of. <i>The crisis has unsettled financial markets.</i>
wane	Grow smaller. <i>Interest in his novels waned.</i>
wither	Wither as with a loss of moisture. <i>It is not true that old myths either die or wither away.</i>
