<b>get jaded with</b>	Succeed in catching or seizing, especially after a chase.
<b>get satiated with</b>	Succeed in catching or seizing, especially after a chase.

<b>get sick of</b>	Be stricken by an illness, fall victim to an illness.
<b>get sick to death of</b>	Undergo (as of injuries and illnesses).

<b>tax</b>	Levy a tax on. <i>Clothing is not <b>taxed</b> in our state.</i>
<b>tire</b>	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>It <b>tired</b> her that Eddie felt important because he was involved behind the scenes.</i>

<b>hectic</b>	A hectic fever or flush. A <b>hectic</b> business schedule.
<b>humdrum</b>	Lacking excitement or variety; boringly monotonous. <i>An escape from the <b>humdrum</b> of his life.</i>
<b>irksome</b>	Irritating; annoying. <i>An <b>irksome</b> journey.</i>
<b>jaded</b>	Dulled by surfeit. <i>My father s words had left me <b>jaded</b> and depressed.</i>

<b>puncture</b>	Sustain a puncture. <i>The tyre had <b>punctured</b> and it would have to be replaced.</i>
<b>tedious</b>	Using or containing too many words. A <b>tedious</b> journey.
<b>tedium</b>	The state or quality of being tedious. <i>The <b>tedium</b> of car journeys.</i>
<b>tire</b>	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>I m so <b>tired</b> of your mother and her complaints about my food.</i>
<b>tired</b>	Bored or impatient with. <b>Tired</b> clich s like the information revolution.
