### Definitions of "Weather" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “weather” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Cold, wet, and unpleasant or unpredictable atmospheric conditions.*
- *The atmospheric conditions that comprise the state of the atmosphere in terms of temperature and wind and clouds and precipitation.*
- *The state of the atmosphere at a particular place and time as regards heat, cloudiness, dryness, sunshine, wind, rain, etc.*
- *Denoting the side from which the wind is blowing, especially on board a ship; windward.*

## Weather as a Verb

### Definitions of "Weather" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "weather" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of a ship) come safely through (a storm).*
- *Make (boards or tiles) overlap downwards to keep out rain.*
- *(of rock or other material) be worn away or altered by long exposure to the atmosphere.*
- *Change under the action or influence of the weather.*
- *Sail to the windward of.*
- *Wear away or change the appearance or texture of (something) by long exposure to the atmosphere.*
- *Withstand (a difficulty or danger).*

- *Get to the windward of (a cape).*
- *Face and withstand with courage.*
- *Cause to slope.*
- *(in building) slope or bevel (a surface) to throw off rain.*
- *Allow (a hawk) to spend a period perched in the open air.*



## Synonyms of "Weather" as a verb (12 Words)

### brave

Endure or face (unpleasant conditions or behaviour) without showing fear.

*She **braved** the elements.*

### **brave out**

Face and withstand with courage.

### **come through**

Reach or enter a state, relation, condition, use, or position.

### **come through**

Develop into.

### **unscathed**

<b>endure</b>	Continue to live and avoid dying. <i>It seemed impossible that anyone could <b>endure</b> such pain.</i>
<b>get through</b>	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
<b>live through</b>	Continue to live through hardship or adversity.
<b>outlast</b>	Live longer than. <i>The kind of beauty that will <b>outlast</b> youth.</i>
<b>outlive</b>	Live longer than. <i>The world has <b>outlived</b> much.</i>
<b>pull through</b>	Bring, take, or pull out of a container or from under a cover.
<b>ride out</b>	Sit and travel on the back of animal, usually while controlling its motions.
<b>survive</b>	Manage to keep going in difficult circumstances. <i>He <b>survived</b> the cancer against all odds.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Weather" as a verb

- *The sturdy boat had weathered the storm well.*
- *The ice sheet preserves specimens that would weather away more quickly in other regions.*
- *A weathered old hut.*
- *I would advise to weather her in her hood.*
- *This year has tested industry's ability to weather recession.*
- *His skin was weathered almost black by his long outdoor life.*
- *This perch is small enough to be moved outside when the bird is weathering.*

## Synonyms of "Weather" as an adjective (1 Word)

**upwind** Situated or moving in the opposite direction to that in which the wind is blowing.  
*You can buffer the **upwind** side with a hedge.*





## Associations of "Weather" (30 Words)

<b><u>aridity</u></b>	A deficiency of moisture (especially when resulting from a permanent absence of rainfall).
<b><u>climate</u></b>	A region with a particular climate. <i>Agricultural development is constrained by <b>climate</b>.</i>
<b>climatic</b>	Relating to climate. <i>Under certain <b>climatic</b> conditions desert locusts increase in number.</i>
<b>climatology</b>	The scientific study of climate. <i>The role of clouds is one of the big conundrums of <b>climatology</b>.</i>
<b><u>cloud</u></b>	Billow up in the form of a cloud. <i>A <b>cloud</b> of dust.</i>
<b><u>cloudy</u></b>	(of a person's eyes) misted with tears. <i>The pond water is slightly <b>cloudy</b>.</i>
<b>forecast</b>	Predict in advance. <i>Rain is <b>forecast</b> for Scotland.</i>
<b>forecaster</b>	Someone who makes predictions of the future (usually on the basis of special knowledge). <i>Economic <b>forecasters</b> are predicting a downturn.</i>
<b>forecasting</b>	A statement made about the future.

<b><u>hurricane</u></b>	A severe tropical cyclone usually with heavy rains and winds moving a 73-136 knots (12 on the Beaufort scale). <i>A powerful <b>hurricane</b> hit the Florida coast.</i>
<b>inclement</b>	Used of persons or behavior; showing no clemency or mercy. <i>Walkers should be prepared for <b>inclement</b> weather.</i>
<b>lowering</b>	Darkened by clouds. <i>Society has allowed a <b>lowering</b> of standards.</i>
<b>monsoon</b>	A seasonal prevailing wind in the region of South and SE Asia blowing from the south west between May and September and bringing rain the wet monsoon or from the north east between October and April the dry monsoon.
<b><u>murky</u></b>	Obscure or morally questionable. <i><b>Murky</b> waters.</i>
<b>overcast</b>	Make overcast or cloudy. <i>A chilly <b>overcast</b> day.</i>
<b>precipitation</b>	The act of casting down or falling headlong from a height. <i>These convective processes produce cloud and <b>precipitation</b>.</i>
<b>prediction</b>	A statement made about the future. <i>The <b>prediction</b> of future behaviour.</i>
<b>rain</b>	Precipitate as rain. <i>It s pouring with <b>rain</b>.</i>
<b>rainfall</b>	The quantity of rain falling within a given area in a given time. <i>The absorption of further supplies from <b>rainfalls</b>.</i>
<b>rainy</b>	(of weather) wet by periods of rain. <i><b>Rainy</b> days.</i>
<b>seasonal</b>	Occurring at or dependent on a particular season. <i>A selection of <b>seasonal</b> fresh fruit.</i>
<b>snow</b>	Snow falls. <i>The first <b>snow</b> of the season.</i>
<b>squall</b>	Blow in a squall. <i>Sarah was <b>squalling</b> in her crib.</i>
<b><u>storm</u></b>	Attack by storm attack suddenly. <i>Two men were taken by a <b>storm</b> of bullets.</i>
<b><u>swirl</u></b>	A quantity of something moving in a twisting or spiralling pattern. <i><b>Swirls</b> of dust swept across the floor.</i>
<b><u>tempest</u></b>	A violent commotion or disturbance. <i>A raging <b>tempest</b>.</i>

- vortex** A whirling mass of fluid or air, especially a whirlpool or whirlwind.  
*A swirling **vortex** of emotions.*
- warmer** A device for warming something; a thing that warms.  
*Winter **warmers** like steamed syrup sponge.*
- whirlpool** A turbulent situation from which it is hard to escape.  
*He was drawing her down into an emotional **whirlpool**.*
- windy** Abounding in or exposed to the wind or breezes.  
*A **windy** bluff.*
