- *The World Wide Web or the internet.*
- *The endless wire mesh in a papermaking machine on which the paper is made.*
- *A fabric (especially a fabric in the process of being woven).*
- *An intricate trap that entangles or ensnares its victim.*
- *Membrane connecting the toes of some aquatic birds and mammals.*
- *A roll of paper used in a continuous printing process.*
- *A complex system of interconnected elements.*
- *Computer network consisting of a collection of internet sites that offer text and graphics and sound and animation resources through the hypertext transfer protocol.*

- *A membrane between the toes of a swimming bird or other aquatic animal.*
- *A filmy network spun by some insect larvae, especially communal caterpillars.*
- *A piece of woven fabric.*
- *A network of fine threads constructed by a spider from fluid secreted by its spinnerets, used to catch its prey.*

chain

A measure of length equivalent to a chain 66 ft.
*The action would initiate a **chain** of events.*

complex	(psychoanalysis) a combination of emotions and impulses that have been rejected from awareness but still influence a person's behavior. <i>A complex of hotels.</i>
conglomeration	A rounded spherical form. <i>A loose conglomeration of pieces.</i>
entanglement	The action or fact of entangling or being entangled. <i>Many dolphins die from entanglement in fishing nets.</i>
knot	A particular method of making a knot. <i>The bird had a knot of feathers forming a crest.</i>
lattice	An interlaced structure or pattern resembling a lattice. <i>Honeysuckle was growing up a lattice round the door.</i>
mass	A body of matter without definite shape. <i>The sun broke out from behind a mass of clouds.</i>
maze	A confusing mass of information. <i>They were trapped in a menacing maze of corridors.</i>
mesh	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>Cell fragments which agglutinate and form intricate meshes.</i>
net	A net supported on a cord between two posts to divide the playing area in tennis badminton volleyball etc. <i>The search was delayed allowing the murderers to escape the net.</i>
netting	A trap made of netting to catch fish or birds or insects. <i>Protect crops from pigeons and other birds with netting.</i>
network	A communication system consisting of a group of broadcasting stations that all transmit the same programs. <i>A support network.</i>
nexus	The means of connection between things linked in series. <i>The nexus between industry and political power.</i>
series	(in chronostratigraphy) a range of strata corresponding to an epoch in time, being a subdivision of a system and itself subdivided into stages. <i>The Pliocene series.</i>
set	Any electronic equipment that receives or transmits radio or tv signals. <i>The early sets ran on storage batteries.</i>
snare	A drum fitted with snares a side drum. <i>It was all a snare and delusion.</i>
tangle	A twisted and tangled mass that is highly interwoven. <i>A tangle of golden hair.</i>

trap

A device to hurl clay pigeons into the air for trapshooters.
*By keeping quiet I was walking into a **trap**.*

vane

Flat surface that rotates and pushes against air or water.

world wide web All of the living human inhabitants of the earth.

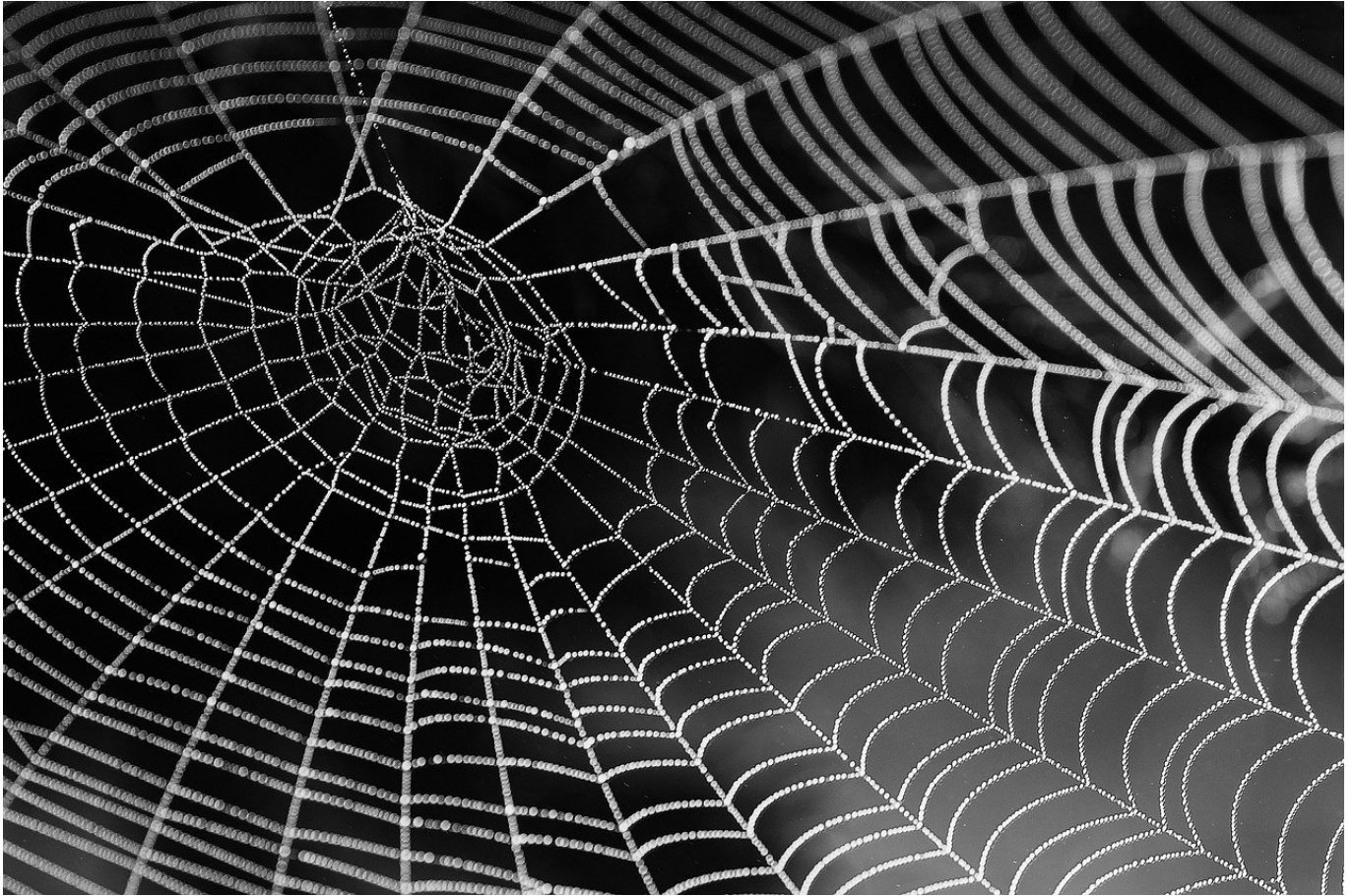

net Catch or land a fish or other animal with a net.
*Customs officials have **netted** large caches of drugs.*

- *She noticed his tanned skin, webbed with fine creases.*



Associations of "Web" (30 Words)

- affiliated** (of a subsidiary group or a person) officially attached or connected to an organization.
***Affiliated** union members.*
- arachnid** Relating to or denoting arachnids.
- channel** A service or station using a channel of frequencies.
*A solid block of metal that is machined to create **channels** into which screw in cartridge valves can be installed.*
- closely** In a careful and attentive way.
***Closely** spaced homes.*
- connected** Stored in, controlled by, or in direct communication with a central computer.
*A **connected** series of cargo holds.*

connection	(usually plural) a person who is influential and to whom you are connected in some way (as by family or friendship). <i>Ferry connections are sporadic in the low season.</i>
correlated	Mutually related.
correlative	Either of two or more related or complementary variables. <i>The child's right to education is a correlative of the parent's duty to send the child to school.</i>
corresponding	Analogous or equivalent in character, form, or function; comparable. <i>All rights carry with them corresponding responsibilities.</i>
dive	Plunge head first into water with one's arms raised over one's head. <i>Divers should have a good intake of fluid before each dive.</i>
enmesh	Involve (someone) in a difficult situation from which it is hard to escape. <i>He is enmeshed in an adulterous affair.</i>
gossamer	A fine, filmy substance consisting of cobwebs spun by small spiders, seen especially in autumn. <i>A fine gossamer fabric that clung to her skin.</i>
inextricable	Impossible to disentangle or separate. <i>Inextricable unity.</i>
interconnect	Be interwoven or interconnected. <i>The lakes are interconnected by trails filled with joggers.</i>
interface	Connect with another computer or piece of equipment by an interface. <i>The interface between chemistry and biology.</i>
interlinear	Written or printed between the lines of a text. <i>A Greek English interlinear New Testament.</i>
interlock	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>A dress in soft interlock.</i>
internet	A computer network consisting of a worldwide network of computer networks that use the TCP/IP network protocols to facilitate data transmission and exchange. <i>Internet access.</i>
linked	Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks.
mesh	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>Finer wire meshes are used for smaller particles.</i>
net	A goal lined with netting as in soccer or hockey. <i>This sale netted me 1 million.</i>
network	Connect as or operate with a network. <i>You have to network if you want to get a good job.</i>

online	With processing of computer data carried out simultaneously with its production. <i>The new power plant will go online this month.</i>
<u>relatively</u>	Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite. <i>The site was cheap and relatively clean.</i>
scorpion	Used in names of arachnids and insects resembling a scorpion e g false scorpion water scorpion.
<u>spider</u>	Form a pattern suggestive of a spider or its web. <i>A system of tunnels spider through the district.</i>
surfing	The sport or pastime of riding a wave towards the shore while standing or lying on a surfboard. <i>Why share your internet connection with people surfing and chatting.</i>
<u>swim</u>	The act of swimming. <i>He landed two 5 lb chub from the same swim.</i>
<u>tangle</u>	Tangle or complicate. <i>The broom somehow got tangled up in my long skirt.</i>
tarantula	Large hairy tropical spider with fangs that can inflict painful but not highly venomous bites.
