## Synonyms of "Weep" as a verb (28 Words)

<b>back out</b>	Shift to a counterclockwise direction.
<b>bawl</b>	Make a raucous noise. <i>We don't need fans <b>bawling</b> at us from two or three yards away.</i>
<b>beg off</b>	Make a solicitation or entreaty for something; request urgently or persistently.
<b><u>cancel</u></b>	Annul or revoke (a formal arrangement which is in effect). <i>His visa had been <b>cancelled</b>.</i>
<b>cry</b>	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>She heard a voice <b>crying</b> her name.</i>
<b>discharge</b>	Go off or discharge. <i>The overflow should <b>discharge</b> in an obvious place.</i>
<b><u>emanate</u></b>	(of a feeling, quality, or sensation) issue or spread out from (a source). <i>He <b>emanated</b> a powerful brooding air.</i>

<b>emit</b>	Produce and discharge (something, especially gas or radiation). <i>The ozone layer blocks some harmful rays which the sun <b>emits</b>.</i>
<b>excuse oneself</b>	Excuse, overlook, or make allowances for; be lenient with.
<b>give off</b>	Estimate the duration or outcome of something.
<b>give out</b>	Convey or reveal information.
<b>grieve</b>	Cause to feel sorrow. <i>She <b>grieved</b> for her father.</i>
<b>issue</b>	Make out and issue. <i>Exotic smells <b>issued</b> from a nearby building.</i>
<b>keen</b>	Express grief verbally.
<b>lament</b>	Express regret or disappointment about something. <i>We could have won <b>lamented</b> the England captain.</i>
<b>mewl</b>	(especially of a baby) cry feebly or querulously; whimper. <i>A forlorn cat <b>mewled</b> pathetically.</i>
<b>mourn</b>	Observe the customs of mourning after the death of a loved one. <i>Isobel <b>mourned</b> her husband.</i>
<b>pull out</b>	Bring take or pull out of a container or from under a cover.
<b>release</b>	Release gas or energy as a result of a chemical reaction or physical decomposition. <i><b>Release</b> the holdings in the dictator's bank account.</i>
<b>send forth</b>	Transfer.
<b>send out</b>	Assign to a station.
<b>shed tears</b>	Get rid of.
<b>snivel</b>	Complain in a whining or tearful way. <i>He shouldn't <b>snivel</b> about his punishment.</i>
<b>sob</b>	Say while crying noisily. <i>He <b>sobbed</b> himself to sleep.</i>
<b>wail</b>	Utter a wail. <i>But why she <b>ailed</b>.</i>
<b>whimper</b>	Cry weakly or softly. <i>He's not dead is he she <b>whimpered</b>.</i>
<b>whine</b>	Complain in a feeble or petulant way. <i>She began to <b>whine</b> about how hard she had been forced to work.</i>
<b>withdraw</b>	Withdraw from active participation. <i>For the cocaine user it is possible to <b>withdraw</b> without medication.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Weep" as a verb

- *A young widow weeping her lost lord.*
- *'No!' she wept.*
- *He wept bitter tears at her cruelty.*
- *She rubbed the sore, making it weep.*
- *A grieving mother wept over the body of her daughter.*



## Associations of "Weep" (30 Words)

**bitterly** In an angry, hurt, or resentful way.  
*Its humour is cutting and **bitterly** sarcastic.*



<b>complain</b>	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>Local authorities <b>complained</b> that they lacked sufficient resources.</i>
<b>cry</b>	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>The cat was <b>crying</b>.</i>
<b>dirge</b>	A lament for the dead, especially one forming part of a funeral rite. <i>After his ten minute <b>dirge</b> the audience booed.</i>
<b>disappointed</b>	Sad or displeased because someone or something has failed to fulfil one's hopes or expectations. <i>I m <b>disappointed</b> in you Mary.</i>
<b>elegy</b>	(in modern literature) a poem of serious reflection, typically a lament for the dead.
<b>embitter</b>	Make (someone) feel bitter or resentful. <i>These injustices <b>embittered</b> her even more.</i>
<b>gripe</b>	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>My only <b>gripe</b> is the size of the page numbers.</i>
<b>howl</b>	Make a howling sound. <i>He gave a <b>howl</b> of pain.</i>
<b>lachrymal</b>	A small bone forming part of the eye socket. <i>That hysterical then <b>lachrymal</b> then guilt ridden hour.</i>
<b>lachrymose</b>	Inducing tears; sad. <i>She was pink eyed and <b>lachrymose</b>.</i>
<b>lament</b>	A mournful poem a lament for the dead. <i>He was <b>lamenting</b> the death of his infant daughter.</i>
<b>lamentation</b>	The passionate expression of grief or sorrow; weeping. <i>Scenes of <b>lamentation</b>.</i>
<b>mourn</b>	Observe the customs of mourning after the death of a loved one. <i>Publishers <b>mourned</b> declining sales of hardback fiction.</i>
<b>mourning</b>	The passionate and demonstrative activity of expressing grief. <i>She s still in <b>mourning</b> after the death of her husband.</i>
<b>plaintive</b>	Expressing sorrow. <i>A <b>plaintive</b> cry.</i>
<b>resent</b>	Wish ill or allow unwillingly. <i>She <b>resented</b> the fact that I had children.</i>
<b>sad</b>	Of things that make you feel sad Christina Rossetti. <i><b>Sad</b> news.</i>
<b>screech</b>	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>The car drove off at speed its tyres <b>screeching</b>.</i>

<b>sniffle</b>	An act or sound of sniffing. <i>He was restraining his <b>sniffles</b> rather well.</i>
<b>snivel</b>	An act or sound of snivelling. <i>Lucy's torrent of howls weakened to a <b>snivel</b>.</i>
<b>sob</b>	An act or sound of sobbing. <i>He was <b>sobbing</b> inconsolably.</i>
<u>sorrow</u>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>He tried to express his <b>sorrow</b> at her loss.</i>
<b>squawk</b>	The noise of squawking. <i>The geese flew upriver <b>squawking</b>.</i>
<u>squeal</u>	Make a squeal. <i>The girls <b>squealed</b> with delight.</i>
<b>tear</b>	The act of tearing. <i>His story brought <b>tears</b> to her eyes.</i>
<b>threnody</b>	A song or hymn of mourning composed or performed as a memorial to a dead person. <i>A brooding <b>threnody</b> to urban desolation.</i>
<b>wail</b>	Utter a wail. <i>The wind <b>wailed</b> and buffeted the timber structure.</i>
<u>whimper</u>	A whimpering sound. <i>Their first appearance in the top flight ended with a <b>whimper</b> rather than a bang.</i>
<b>whine</b>	Move with a whining sound. <i>The <b>whine</b> of the engine.</i>
