*A **cry** to arms.*
- lament** A mournful poem a lament for the dead.
*Their pitiful **laments** could be heard throughout the ward.*
- snivel** An act or sound of snivelling.
*Lucy's torrent of howls weakened to a **snivel**.*
- sob** An act or sound of sobbing.
*With a **sob** of despair she threw herself on to the bed.*
- whimper** A whimpering sound.
*Their first appearance in the top flight ended with a **whimper** rather than a bang.*

Synonyms of "Weep" as a verb (28 Words)

back out	Shift to a counterclockwise direction.
bawl	Make a raucous noise. <i>We don't need fans bawling at us from two or three yards away.</i>
beg off	Make a solicitation or entreaty for something; request urgently or persistently.
<u>cancel</u>	Annul or revoke (a formal arrangement which is in effect). <i>His visa had been cancelled.</i>
cry	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>She heard a voice crying her name.</i>
discharge	Go off or discharge. <i>The overflow should discharge in an obvious place.</i>
<u>emanate</u>	(of a feeling, quality, or sensation) issue or spread out from (a source). <i>He emanated a powerful brooding air.</i>

emit	Produce and discharge (something, especially gas or radiation). <i>The ozone layer blocks some harmful rays which the sun emits.</i>
excuse oneself	Excuse, overlook, or make allowances for; be lenient with.
give off	Estimate the duration or outcome of something.
give out	Convey or reveal information.
grieve	Cause to feel sorrow. <i>She grieved for her father.</i>
issue	Make out and issue. <i>Exotic smells issued from a nearby building.</i>
keen	Express grief verbally.
lament	Express regret or disappointment about something. <i>We could have won lamented the England captain.</i>
mewl	(especially of a baby) cry feebly or querulously; whimper. <i>A forlorn cat mewled pathetically.</i>
mourn	Observe the customs of mourning after the death of a loved one. <i>Isobel mourned her husband.</i>
pull out	Bring take or pull out of a container or from under a cover.
release	Release gas or energy as a result of a chemical reaction or physical decomposition. <i>Release the holdings in the dictator's bank account.</i>
send forth	Transfer.
send out	Assign to a station.
shed tears	Get rid of.
snivel	Complain in a whining or tearful way. <i>He shouldn't snivel about his punishment.</i>
sob	Say while crying noisily. <i>He sobbed himself to sleep.</i>
wail	Utter a wail. <i>But why she wailed.</i>
whimper	Cry weakly or softly. <i>He's not dead is he she whimpered.</i>
whine	Complain in a feeble or petulant way. <i>She began to whine about how hard she had been forced to work.</i>
withdraw	Withdraw from active participation. <i>For the cocaine user it is possible to withdraw without medication.</i>



Usage Examples of "Weep" as a verb

- *A young widow weeping her lost lord.*
- *'No!' she wept.*
- *He wept bitter tears at her cruelty.*
- *She rubbed the sore, making it weep.*
- *A grieving mother wept over the body of her daughter.*

bitterly

In an angry, hurt, or resentful way.
*Its humour is cutting and **bitterly** sarcastic.*

complain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>Local authorities complained that they lacked sufficient resources.</i>
cry	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>The cat was crying.</i>
dirge	A lament for the dead, especially one forming part of a funeral rite. <i>After his ten minute dirge the audience booed.</i>
disappointed	Sad or displeased because someone or something has failed to fulfil one's hopes or expectations. <i>I m disappointed in you Mary.</i>
elegy	(in modern literature) a poem of serious reflection, typically a lament for the dead.
embitter	Make (someone) feel bitter or resentful. <i>These injustices embittered her even more.</i>
gripe	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>My only gripe is the size of the page numbers.</i>
howl	Make a howling sound. <i>He gave a howl of pain.</i>
lachrymal	A small bone forming part of the eye socket. <i>That hysterical then lachrymal then guilt ridden hour.</i>
lachrymose	Inducing tears; sad. <i>She was pink eyed and lachrymose.</i>
lament	A mournful poem a lament for the dead. <i>He was lamenting the death of his infant daughter.</i>
lamentation	The passionate expression of grief or sorrow; weeping. <i>Scenes of lamentation.</i>
mourn	Observe the customs of mourning after the death of a loved one. <i>Publishers mourned declining sales of hardback fiction.</i>
mourning	The passionate and demonstrative activity of expressing grief. <i>She s still in mourning after the death of her husband.</i>
plaintive	Expressing sorrow. <i>A plaintive cry.</i>
resent	Wish ill or allow unwillingly. <i>She resented the fact that I had children.</i>
sad	Of things that make you feel sad Christina Rossetti. <i>Sad news.</i>
screech	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>The car drove off at speed its tyres screeching.</i>

sniffle	An act or sound of sniffing. <i>He was restraining his sniffles rather well.</i>
snivel	An act or sound of snivelling. <i>Lucy's torrent of howls weakened to a snivel.</i>
sob	An act or sound of sobbing. <i>He was sobbing inconsolably.</i>
<u>sorrow</u>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>He tried to express his sorrow at her loss.</i>
squawk	The noise of squawking. <i>The geese flew upriver squawking.</i>
<u>squeal</u>	Make a squeal. <i>The girls squealed with delight.</i>
tear	The act of tearing. <i>His story brought tears to her eyes.</i>
threnody	A song or hymn of mourning composed or performed as a memorial to a dead person. <i>A brooding threnody to urban desolation.</i>
wail	Utter a wail. <i>The wind wailed and buffeted the timber structure.</i>
<u>whimper</u>	A whimpering sound. <i>Their first appearance in the top flight ended with a whimper rather than a bang.</i>
whine	Move with a whining sound. <i>The whine of the engine.</i>
