<b>considerable</b>	Notably large in size, amount, or extent. <i>Snow was a limited but still <b>considerable</b> novelist.</i>
<b>encumber</b>	Restrict or impede (someone or something) in such a way that free action or movement is difficult. <i>She was <b>encumbered</b> by her heavy skirts.</i>
<b>gage</b>	A valued object deposited as a guarantee of good faith. <i>A guide sent to them by the headman of this place <b>gaged</b> his life as a forfeit if he failed.</i>
<b>gasp</b>	Strain to obtain air by gasping. <i>Jeremy <b>gasped</b> out an apology.</i>
<b>gram</b>	A metric unit of mass equal to one thousandth of a kilogram.
<b>grandmother</b>	The mother of one’s father or mother. <i>My <b>grandmother</b> is ill.</i>
<b>heavy</b>	Large and powerful especially designed for heavy loads or rough work. <i>Steering that is <b>heavy</b> when parking.</i>

<b>inch</b>	As a unit of map scale so many inches representing one mile on the ground. <i>Spain s conservatives are <b>inching</b> ahead.</i>
<b>keystone</b>	A central stone at the summit of an arch, locking the whole together. <i>Cooperation remains the <b>keystone</b> of the government s security policy.</i>
<b>liter</b>	A metric unit of capacity, formerly defined as the volume of one kilogram of pure water under standard conditions; now equal to 1,000 cubic centimeters (or approximately 1.75 pints).
<b>load</b>	Fill or place a load on. <i>The streams deposited their <b>loads</b> leaving thin sheets of gravel or sand.</i>
<b>meter</b>	Stamp with a meter indicating the postage. <i><b>Meter</b> the flow of water.</i>
<b>metric</b>	The metric system. <i>All measurements are given in <b>metric</b> form.</i>
<b>onus</b>	Something that is one's duty or responsibility. <i>The <b>onus</b> is on you to show that you have suffered loss.</i>
<b>ounce</b>	A very small amount of something. <i>Melt three <b>ounces</b> of butter in a large frying pan.</i>
<b>palpitate</b>	Cause to throb or beat rapidly. <i>His heart <b>palpitated</b>.</i>
<b>pant</b>	Utter while panting as if out of breath. <i>The opening song makes you <b>pant</b> for more.</i>
<b>penny</b>	(in biblical use) a denarius. <i>We didn t get paid a <b>penny</b>.</i>
<b>ponderable</b>	Capable of being thought about. <i>Something <b>ponderable</b> from the outer world something of which we can say that its weight is so and so.</i>
<b>pound</b>	Place or shut up in a pound. <i>The locks <b>pound</b> the water of the canal.</i>
<b>ream</b>	Enlarge with a reamer. <i><b>Ream</b> a hole.</i>
<b>sterling</b>	British money especially the pound sterling as the basic monetary unit of the UK. <i>Prices in <b>sterling</b> are shown.</i>
<b>ton</b>	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>He scored 102 not out his third <b>ton</b> of the tour.</i>
