significance	The message that is intended or expressed or signified. <i>The significance of his remark became clear only later.</i>
substance	The real physical matter of which a person or thing consists and which has a tangible, solid presence. <i>He had yet to accomplish anything of substance.</i>

luggage	Cases used to carry belongings when traveling. <i>Upon landing we waited and waited for our luggage.</i>
obese	Excessively fat. <i>One in ten people surveyed were obese.</i>
onerous	(of a task or responsibility) involving a great deal of effort, trouble, or difficulty. <i>My duties weren t onerous I only had to greet the guests.</i>
onus	Something that is one's duty or responsibility. <i>The onus is on you to show that you have suffered loss.</i>
outweigh	Be heavier than. <i>These considerations outweigh our wishes.</i>

overweight	Above an allowed weight. <i>Surgical procedures for overweight.</i>
packing	A charge made when delivering goods to cover the cost of packing them. <i>2 plus postage and packing.</i>
physical	Impelled by physical force especially against resistance. <i>A physical manifestation.</i>
pound	The act of pounding delivering repeated heavy blows. <i>Pound the cows so they don't stray.</i>
quantifiable	Capable of being quantified. <i>The benefits are not easily quantifiable.</i>
reducing	Any process in which electrons are added to an atom or ion as by removing oxygen or adding hydrogen always occurs accompanied by oxidation of the reducing agent. <i>A doctor supervised her reducing.</i>
ton	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>All of a sudden I had tons of friends.</i>
