- *The force exerted on the mass of a body by a gravitational field.*
- *A unit or system of units used for expressing how much an object or quantity of matter weighs.*
- *Blocks or discs of metal or other heavy material used in weightlifting or weight training.*
- *The amount that a jockey is expected or required to weigh, or the amount that a horse can easily carry.*
- *The importance attributed to something.*

- *A body's relative mass or the quantity of matter contained by it, giving rise to a downward force; the heaviness of a person or thing.*
- *A heavy object, especially one being lifted or carried.*
- *The quality of being heavy.*
- *A factor associated with one of a set of numerical quantities, used to represent its importance relative to the other members of the set.*

<u>muscle</u>	A muscle or muscles when well developed or prominently visible under the skin. <i>The calf <b>muscle</b>.</i>
<b>power</b>	A state powerful enough to influence events throughout the world. <i>The party had been in <b>power</b> for eight years.</i>
<b>pressure</b>	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>The compressed gas exerts an increased <b>pressure</b>.</i>
<u>prestige</u>	Denoting something that arouses widespread respect or admiration. <i><b>Prestige</b> diplomatic posts.</i>
<b>significance</b>	The message that is intended or expressed or signified. <i>The <b>significance</b> of his remark became clear only later.</i>
<b>substance</b>	The real physical matter of which a person or thing consists and which has a tangible, solid presence. <i>He had yet to accomplish anything of <b>substance</b>.</i>
<u>sway</u>	Rule; control. <i>The country was under the <b>sway</b> of rival warlords.</i>
<b>system of weights</b>	A group of independent but interrelated elements comprising a unified whole.

<b>weighting</b>	The relative importance granted to something. <i>Each score is then multiplied by the appropriate <b>weighting</b> giving a weighted score.</i>

- *Attach a heavy object to (something), especially so as to make it stay in place.*

<b>fleshy</b>	(of plant or fruit tissue) soft and thick. <i>Normally the tissue is <b>fleshy</b> pink.</i>
<b>gage</b>	A measuring instrument for measuring and indicating a quantity such as the thickness of wire or the amount of rain etc. <i>A guide sent to them by the headman of this place <b>gaged</b> his life as a forfeit if he failed.</i>
<b>heavy</b>	A thing such as a vehicle that is large or heavy of its kind. <i><b>Heavy</b> seas.</i>
<b>inch</b>	As a unit of map scale so many inches representing one mile on the ground. <i>I had no intention of budging an <b>inch</b>.</i>
<b>inequitable</b>	Not equitable or fair. <i><b>Inequitable</b> taxation.</i>
<b>laden</b>	Heavily loaded or weighed down. <i>A tree <b>laden</b> with apples.</i>
<b>load</b>	Fill or place a load on. <i>The arch has hollow spandrels to lighten the <b>load</b> on the foundations.</i>
<b>loaded</b>	(of weapons) charged with ammunition. <i>It s Friday night and we want to get <b>loaded</b>.</i>
<b>luggage</b>	Cases used to carry belongings when traveling. <i>Upon landing we waited and waited for our <b>luggage</b>.</i>
<b>obese</b>	Excessively fat. <i>One in ten people surveyed were <b>obese</b>.</i>
<b>onerous</b>	(of a task or responsibility) involving a great deal of effort, trouble, or difficulty. <i>My duties weren t <b>onerous</b> I only had to greet the guests.</i>
<b>onus</b>	Something that is one's duty or responsibility. <i>The <b>onus</b> is on you to show that you have suffered loss.</i>
<b>outweigh</b>	Be heavier than. <i>These considerations <b>outweigh</b> our wishes.</i>

<b>overweight</b>	Above an allowed weight. <i>Surgical procedures for <b>overweight</b>.</i>
<b>packing</b>	A charge made when delivering goods to cover the cost of packing them. <i>2 plus postage and <b>packing</b>.</i>
<b>physical</b>	Impelled by physical force especially against resistance. <i>A <b>physical</b> manifestation.</i>
<b>pound</b>	The act of pounding delivering repeated heavy blows. <i><b>Pound</b> the cows so they don't stray.</i>
<b>quantifiable</b>	Capable of being quantified. <i>The benefits are not easily <b>quantifiable</b>.</i>
<b>reducing</b>	Any process in which electrons are added to an atom or ion as by removing oxygen or adding hydrogen always occurs accompanied by oxidation of the reducing agent. <i>A doctor supervised her <b>reducing</b>.</i>
<b>ton</b>	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>All of a sudden I had <b>tons</b> of friends.</i>
<b>tricky</b>	Not to be trusted- James Agee. <i>Applying eyeliner can be a <b>tricky</b> business.</i>
<b>weigh</b>	Balance in the hands to guess or as if to guess the weight of. <i>They need to <b>weigh</b> benefit against risk.</i>
