Associations of "Well established" (30 Words)

assured	Protected against discontinuance or change. <i>An extremely assured performance.</i>
<u>certain</u>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable Benjamin Franklin. <i>He faced certain death.</i>
<u>certainly</u>	Definitely or positively (‘sure’ is sometimes used informally for ‘surely’). <i>She certainly is a hard worker.</i>
certitude	Absolute certainty or conviction that something is the case. <i>The question may never be answered with certitude.</i>
<u>clarity</u>	The quality of being easy to see or hear; sharpness of image or sound. <i>For the sake of clarity each of these strategies is dealt with separately.</i>
conciseness	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
convinced	Having a strong belief or conviction. <i>She was not entirely convinced of the soundness of his motives.</i>
decided	Recognizable; marked. <i>You could never talk him round he was very decided.</i>
<u>definite</u>	Clearly true or real; unambiguous. <i>Organizations have boundaries in the sense that they may occupy a definite geographical area.</i>
dependable	Trustworthy and reliable. <i>A dependable worker.</i>
entrench	Occupy a trench or secured area. <i>By 1947 de Gaulle's political opponents were firmly entrenched in power.</i>
<u>entrenched</u>	Established firmly and securely. <i>The entrenched power of the nobility.</i>

fasten	Become fixed or fastened. <i>Fasten the lock onto the door.</i>
<u>firmly</u>	In a secure manner; in a manner free from danger. <i>The door remained firmly shut.</i>
<u>fortified</u>	Denoting wine of a type to which spirits have been added so as to produce port, sherry, or a similar drink. <i>Many fortified wines are sweet.</i>
incontestable	Not able to be disputed.
ordained	Invested with ministerial or priestly functions. <i>An ordained priest.</i>
prescribed	Fixed or established especially by order or command. <i>In prescribed order.</i>
<u>proven</u>	(of a new method, system, or treatment) tried and tested. <i>A system based on proven technologies.</i>
securely	In a confident and unselfconscious manner. <i>She held the child securely.</i>
settled	Established or decided beyond dispute or doubt. <i>I don't feel entirely settled here.</i>
simple	Lacking mental capacity and subtlety. <i>Simple mechanisms.</i>
simplicity	The quality or condition of being plain or uncomplicated in form or design. <i>The grandeur and simplicity of Roman architecture.</i>
simplification	The act of reducing complexity. <i>He is proposing simplification of the planning system.</i>
solidly	In a sound or consistent manner but without any special qualities or flair. <i>The company had performed solidly in difficult times.</i>
stoutly	In a resolute manner. <i>The houses are built stoutly of granite.</i>
<u>straightforward</u>	Without evasion or compromise. <i>In a straightforward case no fees will be charged.</i>
strongly	In a way that is able to withstand force or wear. <i>The rebel movement strongly denied responsibility for the attack.</i>
<u>tested</u>	Tested and proved useful or correct. <i>A tested method.</i>

Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion.

An ***unequivocal*** success.
