## Associations of "Well received" (30 Words)

<b>accept</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>They <b>accepted</b> the need to cut overheads.</i>
<b><a href="#">accessible</a></b>	(of a person, especially one in a position of authority) friendly and easy to talk to; approachable. <i>Most students now have computers <b>accessible</b>.</i>
<b>acquire</b>	Locate (a moving entity) by means of a tracking system such as radar. <i>You must <b>acquire</b> the rudiments of Greek.</i>
<b>achievement</b>	Something acquired, typically a skill. <i>The <b>achievement</b> of self control.</i>
<b><a href="#">admit</a></b>	Admit into a group or community. <i>The theater <b>admits</b> 300 people.</i>
<b>admittedly</b>	As acknowledged. <i><b>Admittedly</b> the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<b>assured</b>	Characterized by certainty or security. <i>An <b>assured</b> tenancy.</i>
<b>available</b>	Able to be used or obtained; at someone's disposal. <i><b>Available</b> in many colors.</i>
<b><a href="#">concede</a></b>	Be willing to concede. <i>Their rights to redress of grievances were <b>conceded</b> once more.</i>
<b>conveniently</b>	In a convenient manner. <i>The switch was <b>conveniently</b> located.</i>
<b>derive</b>	Reason by deduction; establish by deduction. <i>Words whose spelling <b>derives</b> from Dr Johnson's incorrect etymology.</i>
<b>familiarly</b>	In an intimately familiar manner.
<b>fetch</b>	The action of fetching. <i>That air of his always <b>fetches</b> women.</i>

<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>We ll <b>get</b> them.</i>
<b>grantor</b>	A person or institution that makes a grant or conveyance. <i>Conveyed from <b>grantor</b> to grantee.</i>
<b>handy</b>	Ready to hand. <i>Keep credit cards <b>handy</b>.</i>
<b>have</b>	Have put someone at a disadvantage in an argument. <i><b>Have</b> an assistant.</i>
<b>incur</b>	Become subject to (something unwelcome or unpleasant) as a result of one's own behaviour or actions. <i>I will pay any expenses <b>incurred</b>.</i>
<b>innocuous</b>	Not causing disapproval. <i>It was an <b>innocuous</b> remark.</i>
<b>obtain</b>	Be valid, applicable, or true. <i>Adequate insurance cover is difficult to <b>obtain</b>.</i>
<b>obtainable</b>	Able to be obtained. <i>Savings of up to 50 percent are <b>obtainable</b>.</i>
<b>own</b>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>His father <b>owns</b> a restaurant.</i>
<b>permission</b>	The action of officially allowing someone to do a particular thing; consent or authorization. <i>He received <b>permission</b> to go to Brussels.</i>
<b>procure</b>	Get by special effort. <i>He <b>procured</b> extra cigarettes even though they were rationed.</i>
<b>receptiveness</b>	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>This <b>receptiveness</b> is the key feature in oestral behavior enabling natural mating to occur.</i>
<b>recipient</b>	The semantic role of the animate entity that is passively involved in the happening denoted by the verb in the clause. <i>The <b>recipient</b> of the Nobel Peace Prize.</i>
<b>resignedly</b>	With resignation and acceptance; in a resigned manner.
<b>safely</b>	In a way that is not likely to cause or lead to harm or injury. <i>All crews have returned <b>safely</b> from their missions.</i>
<b>shuck</b>	Remove the shucks from maize or shellfish. <i>She <b>shucked</b> off her nightdress and started dressing.</i>
<b>simplicity</b>	Absence of affectation or pretense. <i>They took advantage of her <b>simplicity</b>.</i>
