Associations of "Wept" (30 Words)

bitterly	To an extreme, forceful, or particularly harsh degree. <i>It was bitterly cold.</i>
complain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>You never listen to me Larry complained.</i>
cry	Bring into a particular state by crying. <i>Before we had newspapers a town crier would cry the news.</i>
dirge	A song or piece of music that is considered too slow, miserable, or boring. <i>Singers chanted dirges.</i>
disappointed	Sad or displeased because someone or something has failed to fulfil one's hopes or expectations. <i>I m disappointed in you Mary.</i>
elegy	(in Greek and Latin verse) a poem written in elegiac couplets, as notably by Catullus and Propertius.
embitter	Make (someone) feel bitter or resentful. <i>He didn t let illness and divorce embitter him.</i>
gripe	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>He seized me by the arms with a rude gripe.</i>
howl	Make a howling sound. <i>The howl of the wind made him restless.</i>
lachrymal	A small bone forming part of the eye socket. <i>That hysterical then lachrymal then guilt ridden hour.</i>
lachrymose	Inducing tears; sad. <i>She was pink eyed and lachrymose.</i>
lament	A mournful poem a lament for the dead. <i>He was lamenting the death of his infant daughter.</i>
lamentation	A cry of sorrow and grief. <i>Scenes of lamentation.</i>

<u>mourn</u>	Observe the customs of mourning after the death of a loved one. <i>She mourned for her friends who died in the accident.</i>
mourning	State of sorrow over the death or departure of a loved one. <i>If he dies she ll put on mourning but she won t cry.</i>
<u>plaintive</u>	Expressing sorrow. <i>A plaintive cry.</i>
<u>resent</u>	Feel bitter or indignant about. <i>She resents being paid less than her co workers.</i>
sad	Of things that make you feel sad Christina Rossetti. <i>Her clothes were in sad shape.</i>
screech	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>He ducked at the screechings of shells.</i>
sniffle	The act of breathing heavily through the nose (as when the nose is congested). <i>He was restraining his sniffles rather well.</i>
snivel	An act or sound of snivelling. <i>Kate started to snivel looking sad and stunned.</i>
sob	An act or sound of sobbing. <i>He broke down and sobbed like a child.</i>
<u>sorrow</u>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>A bereaved person needs time to work through their sorrow.</i>
squawk	The noise of squawking. <i>Her plan provoked a loud squawk from her friends.</i>
<u>squeal</u>	Make a squeal. <i>The girls squealed with delight.</i>
tear	Fill with tears or shed tears. <i>His story brought tears to her eyes.</i>
threnody	A song or hymn of mourning composed or performed as a memorial to a dead person. <i>A brooding threnody to urban desolation.</i>
wail	Utter a wail. <i>She wailed with pain.</i>
<u>whimper</u>	A whimpering sound. <i>He s not dead is he she whimpered.</i>
whine	A feeble or petulant complaint. <i>The dog gave a small whine.</i>
