<b>rain</b>	Falls of rain. <i>It s pouring with <b>rain</b>.</i>
<b>rains</b>	Anything happening rapidly or in quick successive.
<b>showery weather</b>	The atmospheric conditions that comprise the state of the atmosphere in terms of temperature and wind and clouds and precipitation.
<b>spray</b>	An act of spraying something. <i>A <b>spray</b> of bullets.</i>
<b>weakling</b>	A person who is physically weak and ineffectual. <i>He was a <b>weakling</b> and a hypocrite.</i>
<b>wet weather</b>	Wetness caused by water.
<b>wetness</b>	Wetness caused by water. <i>The long dark <b>wetness</b> of winter.</i>

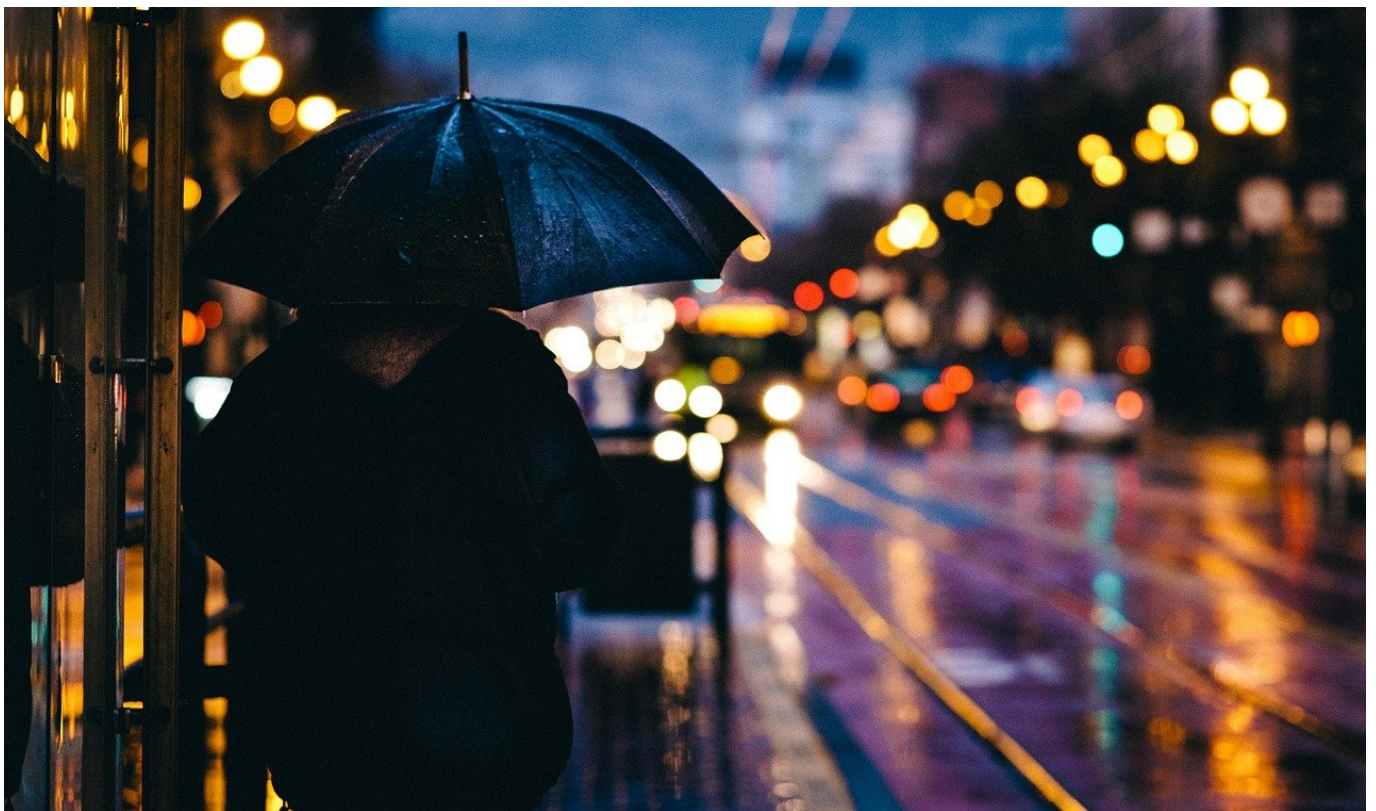
### Definitions of "Wet" as an adjective

- *Consisting of or trading in alcoholic liquor.*
- *Covered or soaked with a liquid such as water.*
- *(of the weather) rainy.*
- *(of a ship) liable to take in water over her bows or sides.*
- *Producing or secreting milk.*
- *(of a baby or young child) having urinated in its nappy or underwear.*
- *Conservative with liberal tendencies, especially as regarded by right-wing Conservatives.*
- *Involving the use of water or liquid.*

<b>foolish</b>	Lacking good sense or judgement; unwise. <i><b>Foolish</b> remarks.</i>
<b>fuddled</b>	Very drunk. <i><b>Fuddled</b> drinkers spilt their brandy and slid beneath the table.</i>
<b>ineffective</b>	Not producing any significant or desired effect. <i>An <b>ineffective</b> administration.</i>
<b>ineffectual</b>	Not producing an intended effect. <i>The therapy was <b>ineffectual</b>.</i>
<b>inept</b>	Revealing lack of perceptiveness or judgment or finesse. <i>An <b>inept</b> remark.</i>
<b>lactating</b>	Producing or secreting milk. <i><b>Lactating</b> cows.</i>
<b>loaded</b>	(of a car) equipped with many optional extras; deluxe. <i>A tray <b>loaded</b> with dishes.</i>
<b>moist</b>	(of a climate) rainy. <i>Eyes <b>moist</b> with tears.</i>
<b>namby-pamby</b>	Weak in willpower, courage or vitality.
<b>not hard</b>	Dispassionate.
<b>not hardened</b>	Made tough by habitual exposure- Robert Lynd- V.S.Pritchett.
<b>not set</b>	Fixed and unmoving- Connor Cruise O'Brien.
<b>pie-eyed</b>	Very drunk.

<b>pixilated</b>	Drunk.
<b>plastered</b>	(of walls) covered with a coat of plaster. <i>I went out and got totally <b>plastered</b>.</i>
<b>pouring</b>	Flowing profusely. <b>Pouring</b> flood waters.
<b>raining</b>	Falling in drops or as if falling like rain. <i>Watched the <b>raining</b> apple blossoms.</i>
<b>rainy</b>	(of weather) wet by periods of rain. <b>Rainy</b> days.
<b>showery</b>	(of weather or a period of time) characterized by frequent showers of rain. <b>Showery</b> weather.
<b>silly</b>	Lacking seriousness; given to frivolity. <b>Silly</b> mid on.
<b>slopped</b>	Very drunk.
<b>sloppy</b>	Wet or smeared with a spilled liquid or moist material. <i>A <b>sloppy</b> saucer.</i>
<b>sloshed</b>	Very drunk. <i>I drank a lot of wine and got <b>sloshed</b>.</i>
<b>smashed</b>	Very drunk. <i>A <b>smashed</b> collar bone.</i>
<b>soaked</b>	Extremely wet; saturated. <i>He got absolutely <b>soaked</b> in the rain.</i>
<b>soft</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music soft in a quiet subdued tone. <i>Was Brendan <b>soft</b> on her.</i>
<b>sozzled</b>	Very drunk. <i>Uncle Brian s <b>sozzled</b>.</i>
<b>spineless</b>	Lacking spiny processes. <i>A <b>spineless</b> coward.</i>
<b>spiritless</b>	Evidencing little spirit or courage; overly submissive or compliant- Orville Prescott. <i>Ruth and I played a <b>spiritless</b> game of Scrabble.</i>
<b>squiffy</b>	Slightly drunk. <i>The graphics make your eyes go <b>squiffy</b>.</i>
<b>sticky</b>	Having the sticky properties of an adhesive. <i>A <b>sticky</b> thread is now live on the forum.</i>



<b><u>stiff</u></b>	Full of. <i><b>Stiff</b> hair.</i>
<b><u>tacky</u></b>	(of a glutinous liquid such as paint) not completely dried and slightly sticky to the touch. <i>The paint was still <b>tacky</b>.</i>
<b><u>teeming</u></b>	Full of people or things; crowded. <i>The Third World s <b>teeming</b> millions.</i>
<b><u>tight</u></b>	Pressed tightly together. <i>He hated <b>tight</b> starched collars.</i>
<b><u>timid</u></b>	Lacking conviction or boldness or courage. <i>Problems that call for bold not <b>timid</b> responses.</i>
<b><u>timorous</u></b>	Timid by nature or revealing timidity. <i>A <b>timorous</b> voice.</i>
<b><u>watery</u></b>	Wet with secreted or exuded moisture such as sweat or tears. <i>A <b>watery</b> fluid.</i>
<b><u>weak</u></b>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>A <b>weak</b> president.</i>

## Associations of "Wet" (30 Words)

<b>bog</b>	Wet spongy ground of decomposing vegetation; has poorer drainage than a swamp; soil is unfit for cultivation but can be cut and dried and used for fuel. <i>The car became <b>bogged</b> down on the beach road.</i>
<b>damp</b>	Damp air or atmosphere. <i>Clothes <b>damp</b> with perspiration.</i>
<b>dampen</b>	Suppress or constrain so as to lessen in intensity. <i>Nothing could <b>dampen</b> her enthusiasm.</i>
<b>dampness</b>	The state or condition of being slightly wet. <i>The <b>dampness</b> in the air.</i>
<b>dank</b>	Unpleasantly cool and humid. <i>Huge <b>dank</b> caverns.</i>



<b>drench</b>	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>Cool patios <b>drenched</b> in flowers.</i>
<b>dusty</b>	Covered with, full of, or resembling dust. <i>A <b>dusty</b> pile of books.</i>
<b>flooded</b>	Covered with water. <i>A <b>flooded</b> bathroom.</i>
<b>humid</b>	Marked by a relatively high level of water vapour in the atmosphere. <i><b>Humid</b> weather.</i>
<b>impassable</b>	Incapable of being passed. <i>The narrow channels are <b>impassable</b> to ocean going ships.</i>
<b>jungle</b>	A wild tangled mass of vegetation or other things. <i>The lakes are hidden in dense <b>jungle</b>.</i>
<b>macerate</b>	(especially with reference to food) soften or become softened by soaking in a liquid. <i>The fruit was allowed to <b>macerate</b> before fermentation.</i>
<b>marsh</b>	An area of low-lying land which is flooded in wet seasons or at high tide, and typically remains waterlogged at all times. <i><b>Marsh</b> plants.</i>
<b>marshland</b>	Low-lying wet land with grassy vegetation; usually is a transition zone between land and water. <i>Thousands of acres of <b>marshland</b>.</i>
<b>marshy</b>	Soft and watery. <i>A <b>marshy</b> coastline.</i>
<b>mire</b>	Cause to get stuck as if in a mire. <i>The country is still trying to climb out of the <b>mire</b> left by its previous president.</i>
<b>moisture</b>	Water or other liquid diffused in a small quantity as vapour, within a solid, or condensed on a surface. <i>In freshly felled wood the <b>moisture</b> content varies.</i>
<b>moisturize</b>	Make (something, especially the skin) less dry. <i>Revitalize your face <b>moisturize</b> your skin.</i>
<b>muddy</b>	Cause to become muddy. <i>Some sentences are so <b>muddy</b> that their meaning can only be guessed.</i>
<b>quagmire</b>	A soft boggy area of land that gives way underfoot. <i>A legal <b>quagmire</b>.</i>
<b>rain</b>	Falls of rain. <i>It was beginning to <b>rain</b>.</i>

<b>saturate</b>	A saturated fat. <i>As far as the heart is concerned <b>saturates</b> are considered the main enemy.</i>
<b>soak</b>	Washing something by allowing it to soak. <i><b>Soak</b> the beans overnight in water.</i>
<b>soaked</b>	Extremely wet; saturated. <i>Rain <b>soaked</b> streets.</i>
<b>sodden</b>	Saturated with liquid, especially water; soaked through. <i>His clothes were <b>sodden</b>.</i>
<b>soggy</b>	(of soil) soft and watery. <i>We squelched through the <b>soggy</b> ground.</i>
<b>sop</b>	Give a conciliatory gift or bribe to. <i>The dews bemoistening <b>sop</b> his harden d shoes.</i>
<b>swamp</b>	Overwhelm or flood with water. <i>He was trapped in a medical <b>swamp</b>.</i>
<b>swampy</b>	Characteristic of or resembling a swamp. <i><b>Swampy</b> bayous.</i>
<b>wetland</b>	Land consisting of marshes or swamps; saturated land. <i>The lake is recognized as a <b>wetland</b> of great international importance.</i>
