### Definitions of "Whisk" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "whisk" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Move somewhere quickly.*
- *Move quickly and nimbly.*
- *Take or move (someone or something) somewhere suddenly and quickly.*
- *Whip with or as if with a wire whisk.*
- *Beat or stir (a substance, especially cream or eggs) with a light, rapid movement.*
- *Brush or wipe off lightly.*

<b>beat</b>	Shape by beating. <i>Reading <b>beats</b> watching television.</i>
<b>bolt</b>	Secure or lock with a bolt. <i><b>Bolt</b> fabric.</i>
<b>bound</b>	Form the boundary of be contiguous to. <i>Louis came <b>bounding</b> down the stairs.</i>
<b>career</b>	Move headlong at high speed. <i>The coach <b>careered</b> across the road and went through a hedge.</i>
<b>catapult</b>	Shoot forth or launch as if from a catapult. <i>The horse <b>catapulted</b> away from the fence.</i>

<b>dash</b>	Come into forceful contact with something. <i>I won't tell Stuart I think he'd be <b>dashed</b>.</i>
<b>double</b>	Do double duty serve two purposes or have two functions. <i>She <b>doubles</b> as his wife and secretary.</i>
<b>flash</b>	Display (information or an image) suddenly on a television or computer screen or electronic sign, typically briefly or repeatedly. <i>Carrie <b>flashed</b> a glance in his direction.</i>
<b>fly</b>	Cause to fly or float. <i>I <b>fly</b> back to London this evening.</i>
<b>gallop</b>	Of a horse go at the pace of a gallop. <i>The horse was <b>galloping</b> along.</i>
<b>go hell for leather</b>	Have a particular form.
<b>go like lightning</b>	Be the right size or shape; fit correctly or as desired.
<b>go like the wind</b>	Be ranked or compare.
<b>hare</b>	Run quickly like a hare. <i>He <b>hared</b> down the hill.</i>
<b>hasten</b>	Be quick to do something. <i>We <b>hastened</b> back to Paris.</i>
<b>hurry</b>	Act or move at high speed. <i><b>Hurry</b> it's late.</i>
<b>hurtle</b>	Throw forcefully. <i>The trucks <b>hurtled</b> them through the grassland to the construction sites.</i>
<b>mix vigorously</b>	Mix so as to make a random order or arrangement.
<b>pluck</b>	Pull lightly but sharply with a plucking motion. <i><b>Pluck</b> the flowers off the bush.</i>
<b>pound</b>	Place or shut up in a pound. <i>The locks <b>pound</b> the water of the canal.</i>
<b>pull</b>	Bring take or pull out of a container or from under a cover. <i>He <b>pulled</b> at the oars and the boat moved swiftly through the water.</i>
<b>race</b>	Compete in a race. <i>He <b>raced</b> his three horses simply for the fun of it.</i>

<b>run</b>	Be operating running or functioning. <i>Who are these people <b>running</b> around in the building.</i>
<b>rush</b>	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>We ll <b>rush</b> you a copy at once.</i>
<b>scamper</b>	To move about or proceed hurriedly. <i>He <b>scampered</b> in like an overgrown puppy.</i>
<b>scurry</b>	(of a person or small animal) move hurriedly with short quick steps. <i>Pedestrians scurried for cover.</i>
<b>scuttle</b>	To move about or proceed hurriedly.
<b><u>shoot</u></b>	Shoot game over an estate or other area of countryside. <i><b>Shoot</b> a basket.</i>
<b><u>speed</u></b>	Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit. <i>The runner zipped past us at breakneck <b>speed</b>.</i>
<b><u>sprint</u></b>	Run very fast, usually for a short distance. <i>I saw Charlie <b>sprinting</b> through the traffic towards me.</i>
<b>stir vigorously</b>	Move an implement through.
<b><u>streak</u></b>	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>The singer admitted to <b>streaking</b> in his home town in the seventies.</i>
<b>sweep</b>	Sweep across or over. <i>Please <b>sweep</b> the floor.</i>
<b>take</b>	Make undertake or perform an action or task. <i>Can you <b>take</b> me to the main entrance.</i>
<b>tear</b>	Fill with tears or shed tears. <i>The material wouldn't <b>tear</b>.</i>
<b>tug</b>	Tow a ship by means of a tugboat. <i>The ships were <b>tugged</b> off the reefs.</i>
<b>whip</b>	Thrash about flexibly in the manner of a whiplash. <i>Lewis <b>whipped</b> the boy twenty times.</i>
<b>whisk off</b>	Kill intentionally and with premeditation.
<b>whizz</b>	Move or go quickly. <i>Cobbled streets where people <b>whizzed</b> back and forth on bicycles.</i>
<b><u>zoom</u></b>	Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. <i>We watched the fly <b>zooming</b> around.</i>
