<b>flicker</b>	A momentary flash of light. <i>The <b>flicker</b> of an eyelid.</i>
<b>fragment</b>	A small part broken off or separated from something. <i>A <b>fragment</b> of rock.</i>
<b>glimmer</b>	A slight suggestion or vague understanding. <i>He saw a faint <b>glimmer</b> of light from her window.</i>
<b>grain</b>	Foodstuff prepared from the starchy grains of cereal grasses. <i>A <b>grain</b> of sugar.</i>
<b>hint</b>	A slight but appreciable amount. <i>Randall smiled with a <b>hint</b> of mockery.</i>
<b>hushed tone</b>	Tranquil silence.
<b>inkling</b>	A slight knowledge or suspicion; a hint. <i>The records give us an <b>inkling</b> of how people saw the world.</i>
<b>insinuation</b>	An unpleasant hint or suggestion of something bad. <i>A piece of filthy <b>insinuation</b>.</i>
<b>iota</b>	The 9th letter of the Greek alphabet. <i>Nothing she said seemed to make an <b>iota</b> of difference.</i>
<b>jot</b>	A very small amount. <i>I have yet to see one <b>jot</b> of evidence.</i>
<b>lap</b>	A flap that lies over another part. <i>His <b>lap</b> was covered with food stains.</i>
<b>low voice</b>	An air mass of lower pressure; often brings precipitation.
<b>mite</b>	Any of numerous very small to minute arachnids often infesting animals or plants or stored foods.
<b>moan</b>	A sound resembling a human moan. <i>There were <b>moans</b> about the car's feeble ventilation.</i>
<b>modicum</b>	A small or moderate or token amount- Ian Jack. <i>His statement had a <b>modicum</b> of truth.</i>
<b>morsel</b>	A small amount of solid food; a mouthful. <i>There was a <b>morsel</b> of consolation for the British team.</i>
<b>mumble</b>	A soft indistinct utterance. <i>Rosie had replied in a <b>mumble</b>.</i>
<b>murmur</b>	A softly spoken or almost inaudible utterance. <i>He had heard hints only <b>murmurs</b>.</i>
<b>mutter</b>	A complaint uttered in a low and indistinct tone. <i>A little <b>mutter</b> of disgust.</i>

<b>ounce</b>	A very small amount of something. <i>Melt three <b>ounces</b> of butter in a large frying pan.</i>
<b>purl</b>	An ornamental edging of lace or ribbon.
<b>report</b>	The act of informing by verbal report. <i>He was a person of bad <b>report</b>.</i>
<b>rumour</b>	Gossip (usually a mixture of truth and untruth) passed around by word of mouth. <i><b>Rumour</b> has it that he will take a year off.</i>
<b>rustle</b>	A light noise, like the noise of silk clothing or leaves blowing in the wind. <i>There was a <b>rustle</b> in the undergrowth behind her.</i>
<b>rustling</b>	The stealing of cattle.
<b>scintilla</b>	A tiny trace or spark of a specified quality or feeling. <i>A <b>scintilla</b> of doubt.</i>
<b>scrap</b>	Bits of uneaten food left after a meal. <i>The unhappy couple got into a terrible <b>scrap</b>.</i>
<b>shred</b>	A tiny or scarcely detectable amount. <i>Her dress was torn to <b>shreds</b>.</i>
<b>sigh</b>	A sound like a person sighing. <i>The councils heaved a <b>sigh</b> of relief when they saved over 6m between them.</i>
<b>sough</b>	A moaning, whistling, or rushing sound as made by the wind in the trees or the sea.
<b>soupçon</b>	A slight but appreciable amount.
<b>spark</b>	A small amount of a quality or intense feeling. <i>He had a <b>sparkle</b> in his eye.</i>
<b>speck</b>	A tiny piece of anything. <i>The figure in the distance had become a mere <b>speck</b>.</i>
<b>speculation</b>	The forming of a theory or conjecture without firm evidence. <i>There has been widespread <b>speculation</b> that he plans to quit.</i>
<b>spot</b>	A small amount of something. <i>Ladybirds have black <b>spots</b> on their red wing covers.</i>
<b>story</b>	A plot or storyline. <i>The novel has a good <b>story</b>.</i>
<b>suggestion</b>	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>The picnic was her <b>suggestion</b>.</i>
<b>suspicion</b>	Cautious distrust. <i>A <b>suspicion</b> of a smile.</i>

<b>susurration</b>	Whispering or rustling. <i>The <b>susurration</b> of the river.</i>
<b>swish</b>	A shot that goes through the basket without touching the backboard or rim. <i>He could hear the <b>swish</b> of a distant car.</i>
<b>tinge</b>	A trace of a colour. <i>There was a faint pink <b>tinge</b> to the sky.</i>
<b>touch</b>	An act of touching someone or something. <i>He longed for the <b>touch</b> of her hand.</i>
<b>trace</b>	The sum of the elements in the principal diagonal of a square matrix. <i>There wasn't a <b>trace</b> of evidence for the claim.</i>
<b>undertone</b>	A pale or subdued color. <i>The sexual <b>undertones</b> of most advertising.</i>
<b>vestige</b>	An indication that something has been present. <i>He waited patiently but without a <b>vestige</b> of sympathy.</i>
<b>voicelessness</b>	Speaking softly without vibration of the vocal cords. <i>The <b>voicelessness</b> of those who live in situations of hopelessness.</i>
<b>whiff</b>	An act of sniffing or inhaling. <i>There had been a <b>whiff</b> of financial scandal in the past.</i>
<b>whir</b>	A whirring sound. <i>The <b>whir</b> of the projector.</i>
<b>whispering</b>	A light noise, like the noise of silk clothing or leaves blowing in the wind.
<b>whit</b>	A tiny or scarcely detectable amount. <i>The last <b>whit</b> of warmth was drawn off by the setting sun.</i>
<b>whoosh</b>	A sudden movement accompanied by a rushing sound. <i>There was a big <b>whoosh</b> of air.</i>

### Definitions of "Whisper" as a verb

- *Speak very softly using one's breath rather than one's throat, especially for the sake of secrecy.*
- *Be rumoured.*
- *(of leaves, wind, or water) rustle or murmur softly.*
- *Speak softly; in a low voice.*



### Synonyms of "Whisper" as a verb (11 Words)

<b><u>mumble</u></b>	Talk indistinctly; usually in a low voice. <i>Sorry she <b>mumbled</b>.</i>
<b><u>murmur</u></b>	Say something in a low or indistinct voice. <i>How interesting he <b>murmured</b> quietly.</i>
<b><u>mutter</u></b>	Talk or grumble in secret or in private. <i>Back benchers were <b>muttering</b> about the next reshuffle.</i>
<b>say in hushed tones</b>	State as one's opinion or judgement; declare.
<b>say in muted tones</b>	Give instructions to or direct somebody to do something with authority.
<b>say softly</b>	Report or maintain.
<b>say sotto voce</b>	Have or contain a certain wording or form.
<b>speak in hushed tones</b>	Give a speech to.
<b>speak in muted tones</b>	Give a speech to.
<b>speak softly</b>	Use language.
<b>speak sotto voce</b>	Express in speech.

- *He managed to whisper a faint goodbye.*
- *Alison was whispering in his ear.*
- *'Are you all right?' he whispered.*

- *It was whispered that he would soon die.*



## Associations of "Whisper" (30 Words)

- babbling** The action or fact of talking rapidly and continuously in a foolish, excited, or incomprehensible way.  
*The noise of **babbling** tourists.*
- calmly** With self-possession (especially in times of stress).  
*People living in the area reacted **calmly** to the incident.*
- crackle** Having the surface decorated with a network of fine cracks as in crackleware.  
*My Rice Krispies **crackled** in the bowl.*
- croon** Say in a soft, low voice.  
*The female vocalist **crooned** smoky blues into the microphone.*

<b>cuddly</b>	Denoting a toy, especially a model of an animal, that is padded or spongy and covered in soft fabric. <i>She was short and <b>cuddly</b>.</i>
<b><u>equivocate</u></b>	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>The government have <b>equivocated</b> too often in the past.</i>
<b>equivocation</b>	Intentionally vague or ambiguous. <i>I say this without <b>equivocation</b>.</i>
<b><u>evasive</u></b>	Tending to avoid commitment or self-revelation, especially by responding only indirectly. <i>An <b>evasive</b> statement.</i>
<b>gently</b>	In a gradual manner. <i><b>Gently</b> pat your skin dry.</i>
<b>gibber</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>They shrieked and <b>gibbered</b> as flames surrounded them.</i>
<b><u>giggle</u></b>	An amusing person or thing; a joke. <i>They <b>giggled</b> at some private joke.</i>
<b><u>growl</u></b>	The sound of growling as made by animals. <i>The dogs yapped and <b>growled</b> at his heels.</i>
<b><u>grumble</u></b>	Complain about something in a bad-tempered way. <i>My appendix <b>grumbled</b> for years before it finally got serious.</i>
<b>hiss</b>	Express disapproval of someone by hissing. <i>Tape <b>hiss</b>.</i>
<b><u>hug</u></b>	Fit closely or tightly. <i>Come here and give me a big <b>hug</b>.</i>
<b><u>mildly</u></b>	In a gentle manner. <i>Don't be childish he reproved <b>mildly</b>.</i>
<b><u>mumble</u></b>	Talk indistinctly; usually in a low voice. <i>Sorry she <b>mumbled</b>.</i>
<b><u>murmur</u></b>	A schwa that is incidental to the pronunciation of a consonant. <i>She had been born with a heart <b>murmur</b>.</i>
<b><u>mutter</u></b>	A complaint uttered in a low and indistinct tone. <i>Back benchers were <b>muttering</b> about the next reshuffle.</i>
<b>muttering</b>	A privately expressed complaint or expression of dissatisfaction. <i>There were disloyal <b>mutterings</b> about his leadership.</i>

<b>prevaricate</b>	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>He seemed to <b>prevaricate</b> when journalists asked pointed questions.</i>
<b>quiet</b>	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>The car has a <b>quiet</b> economical engine.</i>
<b>quietly</b>	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>She was <b>quietly</b> confident that they'd win.</i>
<b>rustle</b>	Forage food. <i>A murdered rancher whose cattle were being <b>rustled</b>.</i>
<b>screech</b>	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>The van <b>screeched</b> round a bend at speed.</i>
<b>sibilant</b>	A sibilant speech sound. <i>His <b>sibilant</b> whisper.</i>
<b>silent</b>	(of a person) not prone to speak much; taciturn. <i>A <b>silent</b> house.</i>
<b>smile</b>	Express with a smile. <i>He <b>smiled</b> his admiration of the great stone circle.</i>
<b>snarl</b>	An act or sound of snarling. <i>He <b>snarled</b> a few choice remarks at them.</i>
<b>softly</b>	Used as a direction in music to be played relatively softly. <i><b>Softly</b> undulating hills.</i>
