- Speaking softly without vibration of the vocal cords.






Synonyms of "Whispers" as a noun (5 Words)

| rustle | A soft, muffled crackling sound like that made by the movement of dry leaves or paper. There was a rustle in the undergrowth behind her. |

| susurration | The indistinct sound of people whispering. The susurration of the river. |
| voicelessness | Having no voice in the management or control of affairs. The voicelessness of those who live in situations of hopelessness. |
| whispering | Speaking softly without vibration of the vocal cords. |

| babbling | (of flowing water) making a continuous murmuring sound. <i>The noise of babbling tourists.</i> |

| calmly | With self-possession (especially in times of stress. <i>He spoke slowly and calmly.</i> |
| crackle | Having the surface decorated with a network of fine cracks as in crackleware. The blazing sun crackle d the desert sand. |
| croon | Sing softly. She was croon ing to the child. |
| cuddly | Denoting a toy, especially a model of an animal, that is padded or spongy and covered in soft fabric. <i>A cuddly teddybear.</i> |
| <u>equivocate</u> | Use ambiguous language so as to conceal the truth or avoid committing oneself. The government have equivocate d too often in the past. |



| equivocation | The use of ambiguous language to conceal the truth or to avoid committing oneself; prevarication. <i>I say this without equivocation</i> . |

| <u>evasive</u> | Avoiding or escaping from difficulty or danger especially enemy fire. <i>Pilots are taught to take evasive action.</i> |
| gently | With only gradual inclines. A gently humorous account. |
| gibber | Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. They shrieked and gibber ed as flames surrounded them. |
| <u>giggle</u> | A foolish or nervous laugh. The girls giggle d when the rock star came into the classroom. |
| <u>growl</u> | The sound of growling as made by animals. With a growl of fury he tightened his grip. |
| <u>grumble</u> | A low rumbling sound. My appendix grumble d for years before it finally got serious. |
| hiss | Express disapproval of someone by hissing. The audience hiss ed loudly at the mention of his name. |
| hug | Hold (something) closely or tightly round or against part of one's body. <i>He</i> hug ged her close to him. |
| <u>mildly</u> | To a slight extent. <i>He had suffered mildly from the illness since he was 23.</i> |
| <u>mumble</u> | Bite or chew (something) with toothless gums or without making much use of the teeth. <i>Rosie had replied in a mumble.</i> |
| <u>murmur</u> | A complaint uttered in a low and indistinct tone. <i>He had heard hints only murmurs.</i> |
| <u>mutter</u> | A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech. <i>He muttered something under his breath.</i> |
| muttering | A privately expressed complaint or expression of dissatisfaction. There were disloyal muttering s about his leadership. |
| prevaricate | Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. He seemed to prevaricate when journalists asked pointed questions. |
| quiet | With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. The journalists quiet ed down as Judy stepped on to the dais. |



| quietly | With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>He worked quietly and diligently.</i> |

| rustle | Cause (something) to make a rustling sound. Dolly rustle d the paper irritably. |
| screech | Make a high pitched screeching noise. The car drove off at speed its tyres screech ing. |
| sibilant | A sibilant speech sound. <i>His sibilant whisper.</i> |
| <u>silent</u> | Marked by absence of sound. I m the strong silent type. |
| smile | Express with a smile. She smile d her thanks. |
| <u>snarl</u> | An act or sound of snarling. The guard snarl ed at us. |
| <u>softly</u> | Used as a direction in music to be played relatively softly. <i>Her</i> softly <i>rounded belly.</i> |
