## **Whispers as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Whispers" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “whispers” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A light noise, like the noise of silk clothing or leaves blowing in the wind.*
- *Speaking softly without vibration of the vocal cords.*



### Synonyms of "Whispers" as a noun (5 Words)

**rustle** A soft, muffled crackling sound like that made by the movement of dry leaves or paper.

*There was a **rustle** in the undergrowth behind her.*

**rustling** A light noise, like the noise of silk clothing or leaves blowing in the wind.

**susurration** The indistinct sound of people whispering.

*The **susurration** of the river.*

**voicelessness** Having no voice in the management or control of affairs.

*The **voicelessness** of those who live in situations of hopelessness.*

**whispering** Speaking softly without vibration of the vocal cords.



## Associations of "Whispers" (30 Words)

- babbling** (of flowing water) making a continuous murmuring sound.  
*The noise of **babbling** tourists.*
- calmly** With self-possession (especially in times of stress).  
*He spoke slowly and **calmly**.*
- crackle** Having the surface decorated with a network of fine cracks as in crackleware.  
*The blazing sun **crackled** the desert sand.*
- croon** Sing softly.  
*She was **crooning** to the child.*
- cuddly** Denoting a toy, especially a model of an animal, that is padded or spongy and covered in soft fabric.  
*A **cuddly** teddybear.*
- equivocate** Use ambiguous language so as to conceal the truth or avoid committing oneself.  
*The government have **equivocated** too often in the past.*

<b>equivocation</b>	The use of ambiguous language to conceal the truth or to avoid committing oneself; prevarication. <i>I say this without <b>equivocation</b>.</i>
<b><u>evasive</u></b>	Avoiding or escaping from difficulty or danger especially enemy fire. <i>Pilots are taught to take <b>evasive</b> action.</i>
<b>gently</b>	With only gradual inclines. <i>A <b>gently</b> humorous account.</i>
<b>gibber</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>They shrieked and <b>gibbered</b> as flames surrounded them.</i>
<b><u>giggle</u></b>	A foolish or nervous laugh. <i>The girls <b>giggled</b> when the rock star came into the classroom.</i>
<b><u>growl</u></b>	The sound of growling as made by animals. <i>With a <b>growl</b> of fury he tightened his grip.</i>
<b><u>grumble</u></b>	A low rumbling sound. <i>My appendix <b>grumbled</b> for years before it finally got serious.</i>
<b>hiss</b>	Express disapproval of someone by hissing. <i>The audience <b>hissed</b> loudly at the mention of his name.</i>
<b><u>hug</u></b>	Hold (something) closely or tightly round or against part of one's body. <i>He <b>hugged</b> her close to him.</i>
<b><u>mildly</u></b>	To a slight extent. <i>He had suffered <b>mildly</b> from the illness since he was 23.</i>
<b><u>mumble</u></b>	Bite or chew (something) with toothless gums or without making much use of the teeth. <i>Rosie had replied in a <b>mumble</b>.</i>
<b><u>murmur</u></b>	A complaint uttered in a low and indistinct tone. <i>He had heard hints only <b>murmurs</b>.</i>
<b><u>mutter</u></b>	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech. <i>He <b>muttered</b> something under his breath.</i>
<b>muttering</b>	A privately expressed complaint or expression of dissatisfaction. <i>There were disloyal <b>mutterings</b> about his leadership.</i>
<b>prevaricate</b>	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>He seemed to <b>prevaricate</b> when journalists asked pointed questions.</i>
<b>quiet</b>	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>The journalists <b>quieted</b> down as Judy stepped on to the dais.</i>

<b>quietly</b>	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>He worked <b>quietly</b> and diligently.</i>
<b>rustle</b>	Cause (something) to make a rustling sound. <i>Dolly <b>rustled</b> the paper irritably.</i>
<b>screech</b>	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>The car drove off at speed its tyres <b>screeching</b>.</i>
<b>sibilant</b>	A sibilant speech sound. <i>His <b>sibilant</b> whisper.</i>
<b>silent</b>	Marked by absence of sound. <i>I m the strong <b>silent</b> type.</i>
<b>smile</b>	Express with a smile. <i>She <b>smiled</b> her thanks.</i>
<b>snarl</b>	An act or sound of snarling. <i>The guard <b>snarled</b> at us.</i>
<b>softly</b>	Used as a direction in music to be played relatively softly. <i>Her <b>softly</b> rounded belly.</i>
