- *An instrument used to produce a shrill, high-pitched sound, especially for giving a signal.*
- *A shrill, high-pitched sound.*
- *Acoustic device that forces air or steam against an edge or into a cavity and so*

*produces a loud shrill sound.*

- *The act of signalling (e.g., summoning) by whistling or blowing a whistle.*
- *An inexpensive fipple flute.*
- *A clear, high-pitched sound made by forcing breath through a small hole between partly closed lips, or between one's teeth.*
- *The sound made by something moving rapidly or by steam coming out of a small aperture.*



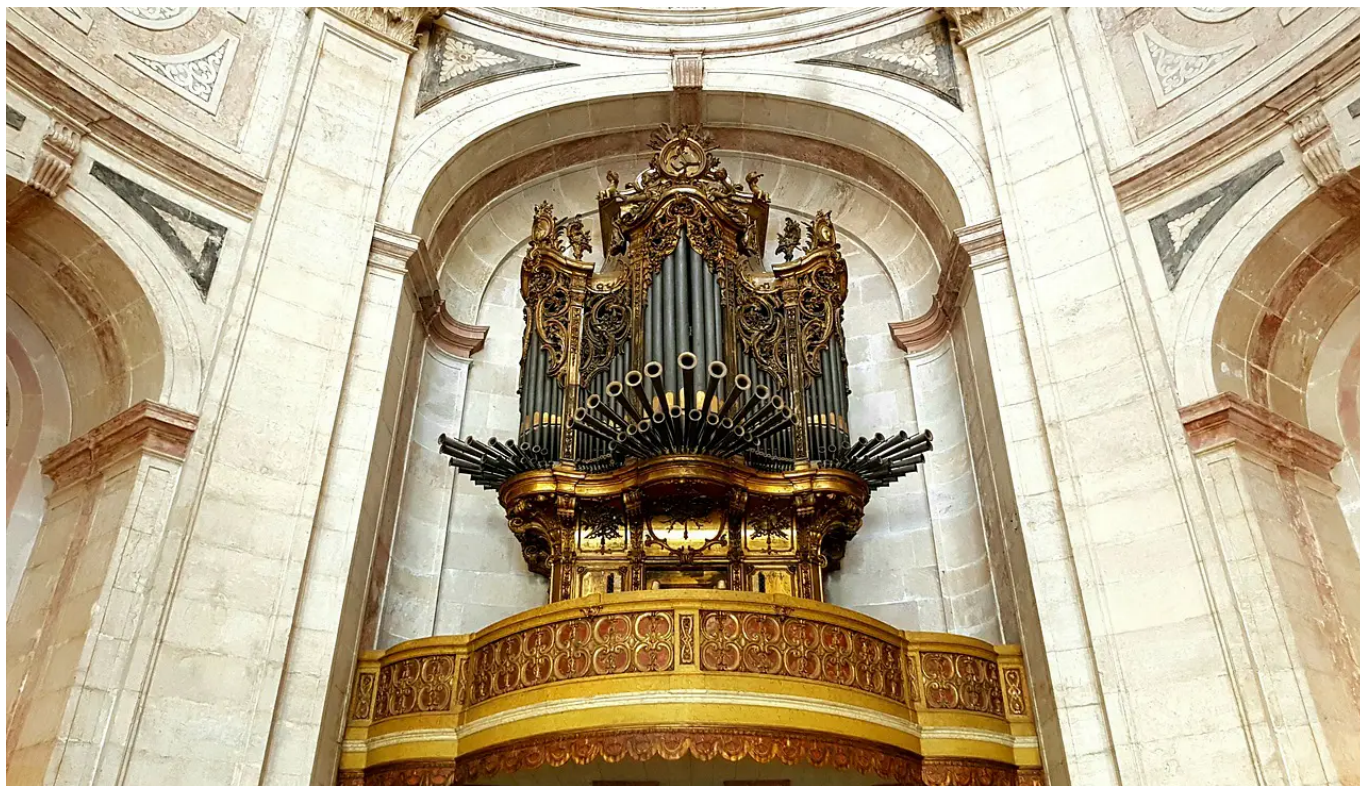
## Synonyms of "Whistle" as a noun (44 Words)

<b>acclamation</b>	Loud and enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in <b>acclamation</b>.</i>
<b>alarm signal</b>	An automatic signal (usually a sound) warning of danger.
<b>alert</b>	A warning serves to make you more alert to danger. <i>Traffic was halted during the <b>alert</b>.</i>

<b>birdsong</b>	The musical vocalizations of a bird or birds, typically uttered by a male songbird in characteristic bursts or phrases for territorial purposes.

<b>chatter</b>	A series of short, quick high-pitched sounds. <i>The wipers should operate without <b>chatter</b>.</i>
<b><u>chattering</u></b>	Noisy talk.
<b>cheep</b>	A short, high sound resembling the cry of a young bird. <i>There has not been a <b>cheep</b> from anybody.</i>
<b>cheering</b>	Encouragement in the form of cheers from spectators.
<b>cheers</b>	A cry or shout of approval.
<b>chirp</b>	A short, sharp, high-pitched sound. <i>The <b>chirps</b> and whirrs of insects.</i>
<b>chirping</b>	A sharp sound made by small birds or insects.
<b>chirr</b>	A low trilling sound. <i>The <b>chirr</b> of summer crickets.</i>
<b>chirrup</b>	A short, high-pitched sound. <i>The <b>chirrups</b> of the crickets.</i>
<b>clapping</b>	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together.
<b><u>costume</u></b>	A swimming costume. <i>Authentic Elizabethan <b>costumes</b>.</i>
<b>cry</b>	A loud utterance of emotion (especially when inarticulate). <i>A <b>cry</b> of rage.</i>
<b>danger signal</b>	A dangerous place.
<b>distress signal</b>	Psychological suffering.
<b><u>ensemble</u></b>	The coordination between performers executing an ensemble passage. <i>Her elegant pink and black <b>ensemble</b> put most outfits in the shade.</i>
<b><u>outfit</u></b>	A complete set of equipment needed for a particular purpose. <i>A first aid <b>outfit</b>.</i>
<b>ovation</b>	A sustained and enthusiastic show of appreciation from an audience, especially by means of applause. <i>The performance received a thundering <b>ovation</b>.</i>

<b>peep</b>	A quick or furtive look. <i>Black curls and a <b>peep</b> of gold earring.</i>
<b>peeping</b>	The short weak cry of a young bird.
<b>pennywhistle</b>	An inexpensive fipple flute.
<b>pipe</b>	The flues and stops on a pipe organ. <i>A fresh <b>pipe</b> of port.</i>
<b>piping</b>	Thin lines of icing or cream, used to decorate cakes and desserts.
<b>set of clothes</b>	Representation consisting of the scenery and other properties used to identify the location of a dramatic production.
<a href="#"><u>siren</u></a>	Eellike aquatic North American salamander with small forelimbs and no hind limbs; have permanent external gills. <i>Ambulance <b>sirens</b>.</i>
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>The wheels sang their <b>song</b> as the train rocketed ahead.</i>
<b>squeak</b>	A short, high-pitched sound or cry. <i>The door opened with a slight <b>squeak</b>.</i>
<b>standing ovation</b>	An ordered listing of scores or results showing the relative positions of competitors (individuals or teams) in a sporting event.
<b>tin whistle</b>	Airtight sealed metal container for food or drink or paint etc.
<a href="#"><u>trill</u></a>	The articulation of a consonant (especially the consonant `r') with a rapid flutter of the tongue against the palate or uvula. <i>The caged bird launched into a piercing <b>trill</b>.</i>
<b>trilling</b>	United States literary critic (1905-1975).
<b>tweet</b>	A weak chirping sound as of a small bird. <i>The gentle <b>tweet</b> of a bird can be heard.</i>
<b>twitter</b>	Idle or ignorant talk. <i>His words were cut off by a faint electronic <b>twitter</b>.</i>
<b>twittering</b>	A series of chirps.
<b>warbling</b>	A lumpy abscess under the hide of domestic mammals caused by larvae of a botfly or warble fly.
<b>warning sound</b>	A message informing of danger.
<b>whistles</b>	Acoustic device that forces air or steam against an edge or into a cavity and so produces a loud shrill sound. <i>The whistle signalled the end of the game.</i>
<b>whistling</b>	The act of signalling e.g. summoning by whistling or blowing a whistle. <i>His cheerful <b>whistling</b> indicated that he enjoyed his work.</i>

- *Make a whining, ringing, or whistling sound.*
- *Produce a shrill, high-pitched sound by moving rapidly through the air or a narrow opening.*
- *Emit a clear, high-pitched sound by forcing breath through a small hole between one's lips or teeth.*
- *Blow a whistle, especially as a signal.*

- *Move with, or as with, a whistling sound.*
- *Move, send, or bring as if by whistling.*
- *Make whistling sounds.*
- *Produce (a tune) by whistling.*

<b>chirp</b>	Sing in modulation. <i>Outside the crickets <b>chirped</b> monotonously.</i>
<b>chirping</b>	Make high-pitched sounds.
<b>chirps</b>	Make high-pitched sounds. <i>The birds were chirping in the bushes.</i>
<b>chirrup</b>	Make high-pitched sounds. <i>A bird <b>chirruped</b> intermittently outside.</i>

<b>cough</b>	Force something especially blood out of the lungs or throat by coughing. <i>Once he realized we knew he was ready to <b>cough</b> fast enough.</i>
<b>croak</b>	Of a person make a sound similar to a croak when speaking or laughing. <i>The dog finally <b>croaked</b> in 1987.</i>
<b>fizz</b>	Make a buzzing or crackling sound. <i>His lemonade was still <b>fizzing</b> at the top of the glass.</i>
<b>fizzle</b>	Make a feeble hissing or spluttering sound. <i>The strobe lights <b>fizzled</b> and flickered.</i>
<b>gasp</b>	Strain to obtain air by gasping. <i>It s beautiful she <b>gasped</b> much impressed.</i>
<b>hiss</b>	Make a sharp hissing sound as if to show disapproval. <i>The audience <b>hissed</b> loudly at the mention of his name.</i>
<b>pant</b>	Run or go in a specified direction while panting. <i>His breast <b>panted</b> with alarms.</i>
<b>peep</b>	Cause to appear. <i>The sun began to <b>peep</b> out.</i>
<b>peeping</b>	Make high-pitched sounds.
<b>peeps</b>	Cause to appear. <i>He peeped his head through the window.</i>
<b>piping</b>	Trim with piping.
<b>rasp</b>	Scrape or file something with a rasp. <i>More enamel is <b>rasped</b> off the upper outside edges of the teeth.</i>
<b><u>shrill</u></b>	Make a shrill noise. <i>How dare you she <b>shrilled</b>.</i>



**sing**

Sing in accompaniment to a song or piece of music.  
We **sing** along to all the songs.

**trill**

Pronounce with a trill of the phoneme r.  
Some speakers **trill** their r's.

**trills**

Sing or play with trills alternating with the half note above or below.  
Some speakers **trill** their r's.

**twitter**

Make high-pitched sounds, as of birds.  
Sparrows **twittered** under the eaves.

**twittering**

Make high-pitched sounds, as of birds.

**warble**

Sing or play with trills, alternating with the half note above or below.  
He **warbled** in an implausible soprano.

**warbles**

Sing by changing register; sing by yodeling.

**warbling**

Sing by changing register; sing by yodeling.

**wheeze**

(of a device) make an irregular rattling or spluttering sound.  
She **wheezed** up the hill towards them.

**whistling**

Make whistling sounds.

<b>euphony</b>	Any agreeable (pleasing and harmonious) sounds. <i>The poet put <b>euphony</b> before mere factuality.</i>
<b>gale</b>	A storm at sea. <i>It was blowing a <b>gale</b>.</i>
<b>hum</b>	Sound with a monotonous hum. <i>The computers <b>hummed</b>.</i>
<b>hymn</b>	Sing hymns. <i>The joys of domesticity were being <b>hymned</b> in magazines.</i>
<b>lullaby</b>	The act of singing a quiet song to lull a child to sleep. <i>She lullabied us, she fed us.</i>
<b>melody</b>	The principal part in harmonized music. <i>Her great gift was for <b>melody</b>.</i>
<b>rainstorm</b>	A storm with rain.
<b>sing</b>	A meeting for amateur singing. <i>Poetry should <b>sing</b> the variety of the human race.</i>
<b>singing</b>	The act of singing vocal music. <i>The cries of laughter from children are a pleasant counterpoint to the <b>singing</b> of blackbirds.</i>
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>The <b>song</b> of the wind.</i>
<b>soprano</b>	A part written for a soprano voice. <i><b>Soprano</b> voice.</i>

<b>sound</b>	Emit or cause to emit sound. <i>Politicians have no <b>sound</b> grasp of technology issues.</i>
<b>squall</b>	Blow in a squall. <i>When it <b>squalls</b> a prudent sailor reefs his sails.</i>
<u><b>timbre</b></u>	(music) the distinctive property of a complex sound (a voice or noise or musical sound). <i>You must demonstrate your moral <b>timbre</b> as a human being.</i>
<b>toot</b>	Make a toot. <i>An impatient motorist <b>tooted</b> a horn.</i>
<u><b>torrential</b></u>	(of water) flowing rapidly and with force. <i>They plunged into the <b>torrential</b> waters.</i>
<u><b>tune</b></u>	Adjust the pitches of (musical instruments). <i>DJ Samantha provided the <b>tunes</b>.</i>
<u><b>vocal</b></u>	Relating to the human voice. <i>A <b>vocal</b> bassline.</i>
<b>vocalization</b>	A sound or word produced by the voice. <i>Talk to your baby and respond to their <b>vocalizations</b>.</i>
<b>vocalize</b>	Express or state clearly. <i>The child <b>vocalizes</b> a number of distinct sounds.</i>
