## Associations of "Wildly" (30 Words)

<b>agog</b>	Highly excited by eagerness, curiosity, etc. <i>I ve been <b>agog</b> all afternoon waiting for the next episode in your mystery story.</i>
<b><u>amorphous</u></b>	Lacking the system or structure characteristic of living bodies. <i>A mob is an <b>amorphous</b> crowd of people without ideals a sum of individuals in which each lives for himself.</i>
<b>aurochs</b>	A large wild Eurasian ox that was the ancestor of domestic cattle. It was probably exterminated in Britain in the Bronze Age, and the last one was killed in Poland in 1627.
<b>balky</b>	Stopping short and refusing to go on. <i>He was trying to get his <b>balky</b> horse to move.</i>
<b>barbaric</b>	Savagely cruel. <i><b>Barbaric</b> use of color or ornament.</i>
<b>boisterous</b>	Noisy, energetic, and cheerful. <i>The <b>boisterous</b> wind was lulled.</i>
<b>caribou</b>	Arctic deer with large antlers in both sexes called reindeer in Eurasia and caribou in North America.
<b><u>chaotic</u></b>	In a state of complete confusion and disorder. <i>The political situation was <b>chaotic</b>.</i>
<b>disorderly</b>	Involving or contributing to a breakdown of peaceful and law-abiding behaviour. <i>His life was as <b>disorderly</b> as ever.</i>
<b><u>feral</u></b>	A person with an unconventional appearance and lifestyle, and anti-establishment views. <i>A pack of <b>feral</b> dogs.</i>
<b>fevered</b>	Having or showing the symptoms associated with a dangerously high temperature. <i>A <b>fevered</b> imagination.</i>

<b><u>frantic</u></b>	Conducted in a hurried, excited, and disorganized way. <i>Something <b>frantic</b> in their gaiety.</i>
<b>frenzied</b>	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason- H.W.Carter. <i>The prosecutor s <b>frenzied</b> denunciation of the accused.</i>
<b><u>hectic</u></b>	A hectic fever or flush. <i>A <b>hectic</b> business schedule.</i>
<b>intractable</b>	Hard to control or deal with. <i>An <b>intractable</b> disposition.</i>
<b>manic</b>	Showing wild, apparently deranged, excitement and energy. <i>Outbursts of drunken violence and <b>manic</b> activity and creativity.</i>
<b><u>rambunctious</u></b>	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>A social gathering that became <b>rambunctious</b> and out of hand.</i>
<b><u>rampage</u></b>	Violently angry and destructive behavior. <i>Youths went on the <b>rampage</b> and wrecked a classroom.</i>
<b>recalcitrant</b>	Having an obstinately uncooperative attitude towards authority or discipline. <i>A stiff necked <b>recalcitrant</b> and troublemaker.</i>
<b>refractory</b>	(of a person, illness, or diseased tissue) not yielding to treatment. <i>His <b>refractory</b> pony.</i>
<b>savage</b>	Criticize harshly or violently. <i>Packs of <b>savage</b> dogs roamed the streets.</i>
<b>tumultuous</b>	Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. <i>The <b>tumultuous</b> years of his administration.</i>
<b><u>uncivilized</u></b>	Without civilizing influences-Margaret Meade. <i>They pitied us for leaving the Smoke for such <b>uncivilized</b> remoteness.</i>
<b><u>uncontrollable</u></b>	Difficult to solve or alleviate. <i>Her brother had an <b>uncontrollable</b> temper.</i>
<b>unformed</b>	Without a definite form or shape. <i><b>Unformed</b> clay.</i>
<b>ungovernable</b>	Of persons. <i>The country had become <b>ungovernable</b>.</i>
<b>unreserved</b>	Not cautious or reticent. <i><b>Unreserved</b> grandstand seats.</i>
<b><u>unrestrained</u></b>	Not restrained or restricted. <i>A display of <b>unrestrained</b> delight.</i>

**unruly**

Unwilling to submit to authority.  
*Kate tried to control her **unruly** emotions.*

**untamed**

Not domesticated or otherwise controlled.  
*Her hair was a tumble of **untamed** curls.*
