by choice In reserve; not for immediate use.
volitionally In a willing manner.
voluntarily Of one's own free will. He voluntarily attended a police station.

Usage Examples of "Willingly" as an adverb

- She went willingly.
- I willingly accept.



Associations of "Willingly" (30 Words)

<u>act</u>	Take action do something. I act ed dumb at first.
<u>amenable</u>	Liable to answer to a higher authority. <i>The tumor was not amenable to surgical treatment.</i>
<u>apt</u>	(usually followed by `to') naturally disposed toward. <i>He is apt to lose.</i>
cheerfully	In a way that inspires feelings of happiness. He cheerfully admits to being the wrong side of fifty.
compliant	Disposed or willing to comply. <i>The conversion of the gel to a much less compliant rigid glass.</i>
deservedly	In the way that is deserved; rightfully. A deservedly popular sitcom.
discretionary	Not earmarked; available for use as needed. Discretionary income.
<u>disposed</u>	Usually followed by to naturally disposed toward. <i>He is favourably disposed towards the proposals.</i>
<u>enjoin</u>	Instruct or urge (someone) to do something. <i>He was enjoined from using the patent.</i>
fain	Having made preparations. I am weary and would fain get a little rest.
given	Specified or stated. <i>Given</i> the engine s condition it is a wonder that it started.
<u>gladly</u>	In a willing manner. This was gladly agreed to.
<u>greet</u>	Express greetings upon meeting someone. Some of the customers greet ed the barman in Gaelic.
<u>happily</u>	In a happy way. <i>Happily</i> today s situation is very different.
inclined	At an angle to the horizontal or vertical position. An inclined ramp.
luckily	It is fortunate that. <i>Luckily</i> for me it s worked out.
minded	Naturally disposed toward. I am not minded to answer any questions.



<u>obedience</u>	Observance of a monastic rule. Obedience to moral standards.
<u>obedient</u>	Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i>Obedient</i> children.
<u>obey</u>	Behave in accordance with (a general principle, natural law, etc. The universe was complex but it obey ed certain rules.
partiality	Unfair bias in favour of one person or thing; favouritism. Miller s partiality for flowering shrubs is evident.
participation	The action of taking part in something. <i>Participation</i> in chapel activities.
<u>prone</u>	Lying flat, especially face downwards. A prone position.
submission	Something (manuscripts or architectural plans and models or estimates or works of art of all genres etc.) submitted for the judgment of others (as in a competition. <i>A written</i> submission to the UN.
submissive	Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant S H Adams. She has become submissive and subservient.
<u>thankfully</u>	Let us be thankful that. <i>He accepted thankfully my apologies.</i>
<u>tractable</u>	Easily managed (controlled or taught or molded. <i>Trying to make the mathematics tractable</i> .
volitional	Relating to the use of one's will. Acceptance is a volitional act.
<u>voluntary</u>	Under the conscious control of the brain. A voluntary confession.
<u>willing</u>	The act of making a choice. <i>Willing</i> and prompt obedience.
