Definitions of "Willingly" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “willingly” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Readily; of one's own free will.*
- *In a willing manner.*

Synonyms of "Willingly" as an adverb (3 Words)

by choice In reserve; not for immediate use.

volitionally In a willing manner.

voluntarily Of one's own free will.
*He **voluntarily** attended a police station.*

Usage Examples of "Willingly" as an adverb

- *She went willingly.*
- *I willingly accept.*

Associations of "Willingly" (30 Words)

act	Take action do something. <i>I acted dumb at first.</i>
amenable	Liable to answer to a higher authority. <i>The tumor was not amenable to surgical treatment.</i>
apt	(usually followed by `to') naturally disposed toward. <i>He is apt to lose.</i>
cheerfully	In a way that inspires feelings of happiness. <i>He cheerfully admits to being the wrong side of fifty.</i>
compliant	Disposed or willing to comply. <i>The conversion of the gel to a much less compliant rigid glass.</i>
deservedly	In the way that is deserved; rightfully. <i>A deservedly popular sitcom.</i>
discretionary	Not earmarked; available for use as needed. <i>Discretionary income.</i>
disposed	Usually followed by to naturally disposed toward. <i>He is favourably disposed towards the proposals.</i>
enjoin	Instruct or urge (someone) to do something. <i>He was enjoined from using the patent.</i>
fain	Having made preparations. <i>I am weary and would fain get a little rest.</i>
given	Specified or stated. <i>Given the engine's condition it is a wonder that it started.</i>
gladly	In a willing manner. <i>This was gladly agreed to.</i>
greet	Express greetings upon meeting someone. <i>Some of the customers greeted the barman in Gaelic.</i>
happily	In a happy way. <i>Happily today's situation is very different.</i>
inclined	At an angle to the horizontal or vertical position. <i>An inclined ramp.</i>
luckily	It is fortunate that. <i>Luckily for me it's worked out.</i>
minded	Naturally disposed toward. <i>I am not minded to answer any questions.</i>

<u>obedience</u>	Observance of a monastic rule. Obedience to moral standards.
<u>obedient</u>	Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. Obedient children.
<u>obey</u>	Behave in accordance with (a general principle, natural law, etc). <i>The universe was complex but it obeyed certain rules.</i>
partiality	Unfair bias in favour of one person or thing; favouritism. <i>Miller's partiality for flowering shrubs is evident.</i>
participation	The action of taking part in something. Participation in chapel activities.
<u>prone</u>	Lying flat, especially face downwards. A prone position.
submission	Something (manuscripts or architectural plans and models or estimates or works of art of all genres etc.) submitted for the judgment of others (as in a competition). <i>A written submission to the UN.</i>
submissive	Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant S H Adams. <i>She has become submissive and subservient.</i>
<u>thankfully</u>	Let us be thankful that. <i>He accepted thankfully my apologies.</i>
<u>tractable</u>	Easily managed (controlled or taught or molded). <i>Trying to make the mathematics tractable.</i>
volitional	Relating to the use of one's will. <i>Acceptance is a volitional act.</i>
<u>voluntary</u>	Under the conscious control of the brain. <i>A voluntary confession.</i>
<u>willing</u>	The act of making a choice. Willing and prompt obedience.
