Definitions of "Willingness" as a noun

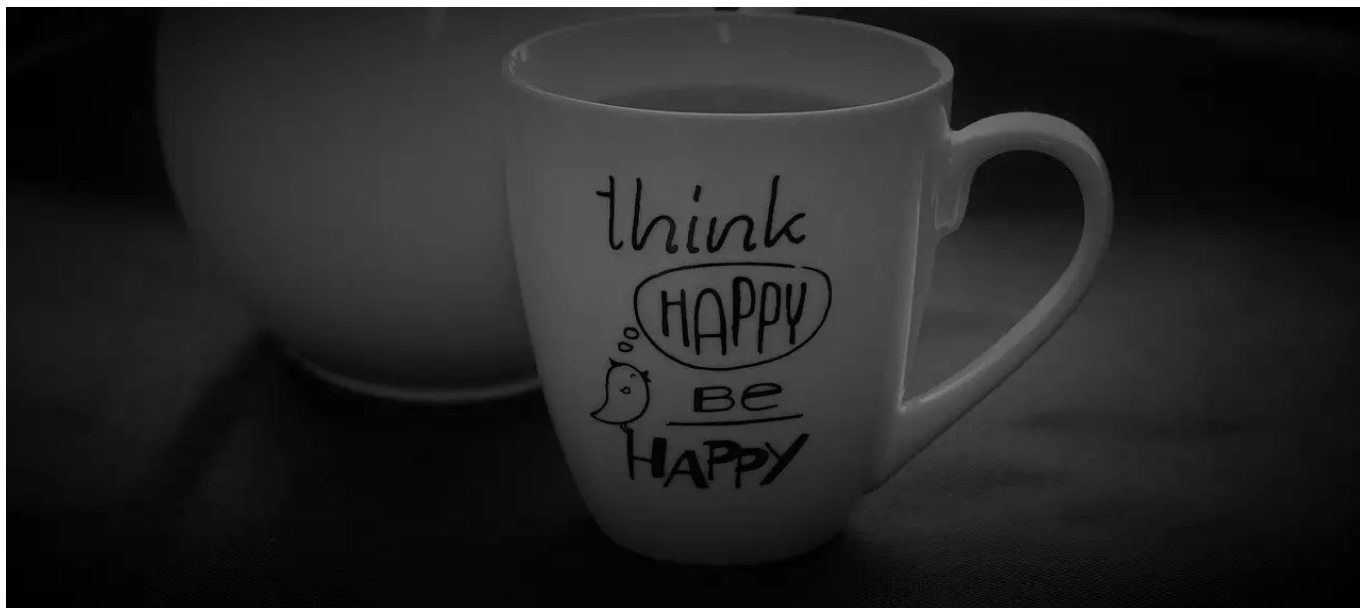
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “willingness” as a noun can have the following definitions:

Synonyms of "Willingness" as a noun (7 Words)

desire	Something that is desired. <i>They were clinging together in fierce desire.</i>
<u>disposition</u>	An attitude of mind especially one that favors one alternative over others. <i>A swelling with a disposition to rupture.</i>
inclination	The action of inclining the body or head. <i>Changes in inclination of the line on the graph.</i>
preparedness	A state of readiness, especially for war. <i>The country maintained a high level of military preparedness.</i>
<u>readiness</u>	Prompt willingness. <i>Putting them in readiness.</i>
<u>will</u>	The capability of conscious choice and decision and intention. <i>Where there s a will there s a way.</i>
<u>wish</u>	A thing that is or has been wished for. <i>The union has reiterated its wish for an agreement.</i>



Usage Examples of "Willingness" as a noun

- *He expressed his willingness to help.*
- *The ability and willingness of workers to migrate.*

Associations of "Willingness" (30 Words)

<u>alacrity</u>	Brisk and cheerful readiness. <i>She accepted the invitation with alacrity.</i>
ardor	Feelings of great warmth and intensity. <i>He spoke with great ardor.</i>
<u>aspire</u>	Direct one's hopes or ambitions towards achieving something. <i>Above the domes of loftiest mosques these pinnacles aspire.</i>
avidity	The overall strength of binding between an antibody and an antigen. <i>He read detective stories with avidity.</i>
covetous	Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages. <i>She fingered the linen with covetous hands.</i>
desire	Something that is desired. <i>They were clinging together in fierce desire.</i>
desirous	Having or characterized by desire. <i>The Pope was desirous of peace in Europe.</i>
eager	Strongly wanting to do or have something. <i>An eager look.</i>

<u>eagerly</u>	Used to emphasize a strong desire to do or have something. <i>Fans of the show are eagerly awaiting the new season.</i>
eagerness	A positive feeling of wanting to push ahead with something. <i>They showed no eagerness to spread the gospel.</i>
enthusiasm	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>Few expressed enthusiasm about the current leaders.</i>
enthusiastic	Having or showing intense and eager enjoyment, interest, or approval. <i>An enthusiastic response.</i>
<u>envious</u>	Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages. <i>An envious glance.</i>
envy	A person or thing that inspires envy. <i>A lifestyle which most of us would envy.</i>
exuberance	The quality of being full of energy, excitement, and cheerfulness; ebullience. <i>Plants growing with wild exuberance.</i>
<u>fervor</u>	Feelings of great warmth and intensity.
greed	Excessive desire to acquire or possess more (especially more material wealth) than one needs or deserves. <i>Greed has taken over football.</i>
<u>gusto</u>	The style in which a work of art is executed. <i>He had a particular gusto for those sort of performances.</i>
hope	A specific instance of feeling hopeful. <i>It revived their hope of winning the pennant.</i>
<u>intensity</u>	The quality of being intense. <i>Hydrothermal processes of low intensity.</i>
irrepressible	Not able to be controlled or restrained. <i>An irrepressible rogue.</i>
<u>jealous</u>	Suspicious or unduly suspicious or fearful of being displaced by a rival. <i>A jealous husband.</i>
passion	Strong and barely controllable emotion. <i>Oratory in which he gradually works himself up into a passion.</i>
vigorously	Forcefully. <i>He defended his ideas vigorously.</i>
<u>voluntary</u>	Under the conscious control of the brain. <i>Voluntary generosity in times of disaster.</i>
want	Hunt or look for want for a particular reason. <i>You don't want to believe everything you hear.</i>

willing

Not brought about by coercion or force.
A **willing** participant.

wish

Make or express a wish.
*He wouldn't **wish** Arthur on anyone.*

zeal

Prompt willingness.
*He had an absolute **zeal** for litigation.*

zest

Add herbs or spices to.
***Zest** the orange and lemon taking care to discard all of the white pith.*
