
## Willingness as a Noun

A state of readiness, especially for war. preparedness

The country maintained a high level of military **preparedness**.

Prompt willingness.

**readiness** Putting them in **readiness**.

The capability of conscious choice and decision and intention. <u>will</u>

Where there's a will there s a way.

A thing that is or has been wished for. wish

The union has reiterated its **wish** for an agreement.

alacrity

Brisk and cheerful readiness.

She accepted the invitation with **alacrity**.

**ardor** Feelings of great warmth and intensity.

He spoke with great **ardor**.

Direct one's hopes or ambitions towards achieving something.

Above the domes of loftiest mosques these pinnacles **aspire**.

avidity The overall strength of binding between an antibody and an antigen.

He read detective stories with avidity.

**covetous** Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages.

She fingered the linen with **covetous** hands.

desire Something that is desired.

They were clinging together in fierce **desire**.

desirous Having or characterized by desire.

The Pope was **desirous** of peace in Europe.

Strongly wanting to do or have something.

eager An eager look.



Used to emphasize a strong desire to do or have something. eagerly

Fans of the show are **eagerly** awaiting the new season.

A positive feeling of wanting to push ahead with something. eagerness

They showed no **eagerness** to spread the gospel.

Something that arouses enthusiasm. enthusiasm

Few expressed **enthusiasm** about the current leaders.

Having or showing intense and eager enjoyment, interest, or approval. enthusiastic

An **enthusiastic** response.

Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages. envious

An **envious** glance.

A person or thing that inspires envy. envy

A lifestyle which most of us would **envy**.

The quality of being full of energy, excitement, and cheerfulness; ebullience. exuberance

Plants growing with wild **exuberance**.

Feelings of great warmth and intensity. fervor

Excessive desire to acquire or possess more (especially more material

wealth) than one needs or deserves. greed

**Greed** has taken over football.

The style in which a work of art is executed.

**gusto** He had a particular **qusto** for those sort of performances.

A specific instance of feeling hopeful. hope

It revived their **hope** of winning the pennant.

The quality of being intense. **intensity** 

Hydrothermal processes of low **intensity**.

Not able to be controlled or restrained. irrepressible

An **irrepressible** rogue.

Suspicious or unduly suspicious or fearful of being displaced by a rival. <u>jealous</u>

A **jealous** husband.

Strong and barely controllable emotion. passion

Oratory in which he gradually works himself up into a **passion**.

Forcefully. vigorously

He defended his ideas **vigorously**.

Under the conscious control of the brain. voluntary

**Voluntary** generosity in times of disaster.

Hunt or look for want for a particular reason. want

You don t **want** to believe everything you hear.



willing

Not brought about by coercion or force.

A **willing** participant.

wish Make or express a wish.

He wouldn t wish Arthur on anyone.

**zeal** Prompt willingness.

He had an absolute **zeal** for litigation.

zest Add herbs or spices to.

**Zest** the orange and lemon taking care to discard all of the white pith.
