| abyss | A deep or seemingly bottomless chasm. <i>The abyss between the two nations.</i> |
| beneath | Extending or directly underneath something. <i>A house built on stilts to allow air to circulate beneath.</i> |
| debase | Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>The love episodes debase the dignity of the drama.</i> |
| declension | A condition of decline or moral deterioration. <i>The first declension in Latin.</i> |
| decline | Inflect for number, gender, case, etc. <i>Caroline declined the coffee.</i> |
| decrease | Decrease in size extent or range. <i>He decreased his staff.</i> |
| depress | Lower (prices or markets). <i>Depress the lever.</i> |
| descend | (of a feeling) develop suddenly and affect a place or person. <i>The chords descended in spectacular style from the upper register to the lower.</i> |
| descending | Moving or sloping downwards. <i>A rocky descending path.</i> |
| descent | The transmission of qualities, property, or privileges by inheritance. <i>The plane had gone into a steep descent.</i> |
| disparagement | A communication that belittles somebody or something. |
| draft | A strong downward air current. |
| downgrade | An instance of reducing someone or something's rank, status, or level of importance. <i>A steep downgrade for which he had to put the car in second.</i> |

| downturn | A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>The market took a downturn.</i> |
| downward | Moving or leading towards a lower place or level. <i>The downward course of the stream.</i> |
| drop | Let or cause to fall in drops. <i>They only just avoided the drop last season.</i> |
| fall | Go as if by falling. <i>The barometer had fallen a further ten points.</i> |
| falling | Coming down freely under the influence of gravity. <i>Falling rain.</i> |
| low | Below average in amount extent or intensity. <i>He had a low opinion of himself.</i> |
| lower | The lower of two berths. <i>The lower levels of the building.</i> |
| nether | Lower. <i>Nether regions.</i> |
| rundown | (especially of a building or area) in a poor or neglected state after having been prosperous. <i>He gave his teammates a rundown on the opposition.</i> |
| settle | Bring to an end settle conclusively. <i>We finally settled the argument.</i> |
| sink | Cause to sink. <i>You can relax on the veranda as the sun sinks low.</i> |
| sinuosity | The ability to curve or bend easily and flexibly. <i>He hated the sinuosity of mountain roads.</i> |
| slump | Fall heavily or suddenly; decline markedly. <i>Land prices slumped.</i> |
| submergence | The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Total submergence of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i> |
| substrate | The surface or material on or from which an organism lives, grows, or obtains its nourishment. <i>Optical disk substrates.</i> |
| under | Under water. <i>An under secretary.</i> |
| vertically | (with reference to passage of diseases) from one generation to the next. <i>The wheel hangs vertically from a wire.</i> |
