## Associations of "Wind down" (30 Words)

<a href="#">beneath</a>	Extending or directly underneath something. <i>Upper layers can be removed to reveal internal parts <b>beneath</b>.</i>
<a href="#">curtail</a>	Terminate or abbreviate before its intended or proper end or its full extent. <i><b>Curtail</b> drinking in school.</i>
<b>debase</b>	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>War <b>debases</b> people.</i>
<b>declension</b>	The inflection of nouns and pronouns and adjectives in Indo-European languages. <i>The <b>declension</b> of the new generation.</i>
<b>declivity</b>	A downward slope or bend. <i>A thickly wooded <b>declivity</b>.</i>
<b>decrease</b>	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>The population of the area has <b>decreased</b> radically.</i>
<b>demoralize</b>	Cause (someone) to lose confidence or hope. <i>The General Strike had <b>demoralized</b> the trade unions.</i>
<a href="#">depletion</a>	Reduction in the number or quantity of something. <i>The <b>depletion</b> of the ozone layer.</i>
<b>descend</b>	Be a blood relative of (a specified ancestor). <i>The chords <b>descended</b> in spectacular style from the upper register to the lower.</i>
<b>descending</b>	(of sound) becoming lower in pitch. <i>The categories are listed in <b>descending</b> order of usefulness.</i>
<a href="#">descent</a>	A movement downward. <i>The plane had gone into a steep <b>descent</b>.</i>
<a href="#">diminution</a>	A reduction in the size, extent, or importance of something. <i>The disease shows no signs of <b>diminution</b>.</i>

<b>downdraft</b>	A strong downward air current.
<b><u>downturn</u></b>	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>A <b>downturn</b> in the housing market.</i>
<b>downward</b>	Spatially or metaphorically from a higher to a lower level or position. <i>He lay face <b>downward</b>.</i>
<b>drop</b>	Let or cause to fall in drops. <i>The spoon <b>dropped</b> with a clatter from her hand.</i>
<b>fall</b>	A thing which falls or has fallen. <i>All that <b>falls</b> under the general heading of corruption.</i>
<b><u>falling</u></b>	Moving from a higher to a lower level, typically rapidly and without control. <i><b>Falling</b> standards.</i>
<b><u>glide</u></b>	A flight in a glider or unpowered aircraft. <i>A few gondolas <b>glided</b> past.</i>
<b><u>low</u></b>	A low point level or figure. <i>The sun is <b>low</b>.</i>
<b><u>lower</u></b>	The lower of two berths. <i>Flora stuck out her <b>lower</b> lip.</i>
<b>reduction</b>	The amount by which something is made smaller, less, or lower in price. <i>Special <b>reductions</b> on knitwear.</i>
<b>rotary</b>	A rotary machine engine or device. <i>A <b>rotary</b> mower.</i>
<b><u>rundown</u></b>	An analysis or summary of something by a knowledgeable person. <i>He gave his teammates a <b>rundown</b> on the opposition.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Cause to sink. <i>The players were <b>sinking</b> a few post match lagers.</i>
<b>submergence</b>	The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. <i>Total <b>submergence</b> of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i>
<b><u>substrate</u></b>	Any stratum or layer lying underneath another. <i>The Celtic languages of Britain are a <b>substrate</b> for English.</i>
<b><u>under</u></b>	Under water. <i>Weaving the body through the crossbars over and <b>under</b> over and <b>under</b>.</i>
<b>vane</b>	A fin attached to the tail of an arrow, bomb or missile in order to stabilize or guide it.
<b>vertically</b>	In a way that involves different levels or stages of a hierarchy or process. <i><b>Vertically</b> stacked books.</i>
