| beneath | Extending or directly underneath something. <i>Upper layers can be removed to reveal internal parts beneath.</i> |
| curtail | Terminate or abbreviate before its intended or proper end or its full extent. <i>Curtail drinking in school.</i> |
| debase | Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>War debases people.</i> |
| declension | The inflection of nouns and pronouns and adjectives in Indo-European languages. <i>The declension of the new generation.</i> |
| declivity | A downward slope or bend. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i> |
| decrease | Decrease in size extent or range. <i>The population of the area has decreased radically.</i> |
| demoralize | Cause (someone) to lose confidence or hope. <i>The General Strike had demoralized the trade unions.</i> |
| depletion | Reduction in the number or quantity of something. <i>The depletion of the ozone layer.</i> |
| descend | Be a blood relative of (a specified ancestor). <i>The chords descended in spectacular style from the upper register to the lower.</i> |
| descending | (of sound) becoming lower in pitch. <i>The categories are listed in descending order of usefulness.</i> |
| descent | A movement downward. <i>The plane had gone into a steep descent.</i> |
| diminution | A reduction in the size, extent, or importance of something. <i>The disease shows no signs of diminution.</i> |

| downdraft | A strong downward air current. |
| <u>downturn</u> | A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>A downturn in the housing market.</i> |
| downward | Spatially or metaphorically from a higher to a lower level or position. <i>He lay face downward.</i> |
| drop | Let or cause to fall in drops. <i>The spoon dropped with a clatter from her hand.</i> |
| fall | A thing which falls or has fallen. <i>All that falls under the general heading of corruption.</i> |
| <u>falling</u> | Moving from a higher to a lower level, typically rapidly and without control. <i>Falling standards.</i> |
| <u>glide</u> | A flight in a glider or unpowered aircraft. <i>A few gondolas glided past.</i> |
| <u>low</u> | A low point level or figure. <i>The sun is low.</i> |
| <u>lower</u> | The lower of two berths. <i>Flora stuck out her lower lip.</i> |
| reduction | The amount by which something is made smaller, less, or lower in price. <i>Special reductions on knitwear.</i> |
| rotary | A rotary machine engine or device. <i>A rotary mower.</i> |
| <u>rundown</u> | An analysis or summary of something by a knowledgeable person. <i>He gave his teammates a rundown on the opposition.</i> |
| sink | Cause to sink. <i>The players were sinking a few post match lagers.</i> |
| submergence | The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. <i>Total submergence of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i> |
| <u>substrate</u> | Any stratum or layer lying underneath another. <i>The Celtic languages of Britain are a substrate for English.</i> |
| <u>under</u> | Under water. <i>Weaving the body through the crossbars over and under over and under.</i> |
| vane | A fin attached to the tail of an arrow, bomb or missile in order to stabilize or guide it. |
| vertically | In a way that involves different levels or stages of a hierarchy or process. <i>Vertically stacked books.</i> |
