- *Acquire or deserve by one's efforts or actions.*
- *Attain success or reach a desired goal.*
- *Win something through one's efforts.*
- *Obtain advantages, such as points, etc.*
- *Be the winner in a contest or competition; be victorious.*



Synonyms of "Wins" as a verb (13 Words)

acquire

Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes).

*They **acquired** a new pet.*

advance

Pay in advance.

*The building society **advanced** them a loan.*

bring home the bacon

Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.

come through

Be received.

deliver the goods

Bring to a destination, make a delivery.

Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages.

earn

*She **earns** a lot in her new job.*

gain	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages. <i>Managers would gain from greater openness.</i>
gain ground	Obtain advantages, such as points, etc.
garner	Store grain. <i>The crop was ready to be reaped and garnered.</i>
get ahead	Go or come after and bring or take back.
make headway	Be or be capable of being changed or made into.
pull ahead	Tear or be torn violently.
succeed	Attain fame, wealth, or social status. <i>Will Charles succeed to the throne.</i>



Usage Examples of "Wins" as a verb

- *Win someone's confidence and friendship.*

- *Win points.*



Associations of "Wins" (30 Words)

- accomplishment** The action of accomplishing something.
*Long distance running was another of her **accomplishments**.*
- achieve** Successfully bring about or reach (a desired objective or result) by effort, skill, or courage.
*The killings **achieved** nothing.*
- achievement** A thing done successfully with effort, skill, or courage.
*To reach this stage is a great **achievement**.*
- achiever** A person with a record of successes.
*His son would never be the **achiever** that his father was.*
- acquirement** An ability that has been acquired by training.
*The **acquirement** of self control.*

acquisition	The buying or obtaining of assets or objects. <i>The acquisition of wealth.</i>
attain	Reach a destination, either real or abstract. <i>Clarify your objectives and ways of attaining them.</i>
attainment	A thing achieved, especially a skill or educational achievement. <i>The attainment of independence.</i>
blowout	A gay festivity. <i>It is difficult to imagine the slim person going for a real blowout.</i>
clinch	Fasten a rope or angling line with a clinch knot. <i>Johnson scored the goals which clinched victory.</i>
competition	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>Business competition can be fiendish at times.</i>
competitive	Involving competition or competitiveness. <i>Highly competitive sales representative.</i>
contention	A point asserted as part of an argument. <i>Freud's contention that all dreams were wish fulfilment.</i>
contest	An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. <i>A coalition was formed to contest the presidential elections.</i>
gain	Increase (one's body weight). <i>Shares showed gains of up to 21 per cent.</i>
gamely	In a plucky manner. <i>I scribbled madly gamely trying to keep up.</i>
jubilant	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>A large number of jubilant fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
jubilation	A feeling of extreme joy. <i>Unbelievable scenes of jubilation.</i>
opposing	Characterized by active hostility. <i>On the opposing page there were two addresses.</i>
outmaneuver	Defeat by more skillful maneuvering. <i>My new supervisor knows how to outmaneuver the boss in most situations.</i>
rejoicing	Great joy; jubilation. <i>The ban was lifted in 1990 amid general rejoicing.</i>
rivalry	Competition for the same objective or for superiority in the same field. <i>There always has been intense rivalry between the clubs.</i>

succeed	Become the new rightful holder of an office, title, or property. <i>He would succeed Hawke as Prime Minister.</i>
success	A person with a record of successes. <i>The president had some success in restoring confidence.</i>
<u>triumph</u>	The exultation of victory. <i>The agreement was a triumph for common sense.</i>
<u>triumphant</u>	Experiencing triumph. <i>Two of their triumphant Cup team.</i>
<u>trophy</u>	A souvenir of an achievement, especially a part of an animal taken when hunting.
victor	The contestant who wins the contest. <i>Congratulations to the victors.</i>
<u>victory</u>	An act of defeating an enemy or opponent in a battle, game, or other competition. <i>Clinched a victory.</i>
<u>winner</u>	A goal or shot that wins a match or point. <i>Anyone taking out a fixed rate mortgage could be on to a winner.</i>
