- winnings** Succeeding with great difficulty.

## Wins as a Verb

### Definitions of "Wins" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "wins" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Acquire or deserve by one's efforts or actions.*
- *Attain success or reach a desired goal.*
- *Win something through one's efforts.*
- *Obtain advantages, such as points, etc.*
- *Be the winner in a contest or competition; be victorious.*



## Synonyms of "Wins" as a verb (13 Words)

### **acquire**

Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes).

*They **acquired** a new pet.*

### **advance**

Pay in advance.

*The building society **advanced** them a loan.*

### **bring home the bacon**

Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.

### **come through**

Be received.

### **deliver the goods**

Bring to a destination, make a delivery.

### **earn**

Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages.

*She **earns** a lot in her new job.*

<b>gain</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages. <i>Managers would <b>gain</b> from greater openness.</i>
<b>gain ground</b>	Obtain advantages, such as points, etc.
<b>garner</b>	Store grain. <i>The crop was ready to be reaped and <b>garnered</b>.</i>
<b>get ahead</b>	Go or come after and bring or take back.
<b>make headway</b>	Be or be capable of being changed or made into.
<b>pull ahead</b>	Tear or be torn violently.
<b>succeed</b>	Attain fame, wealth, or social status. <i>Will Charles <b>succeed</b> to the throne.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Wins" as a verb

- *Win someone's confidence and friendship.*

- *Win points.*



## Associations of "Wins" (30 Words)

- accomplishment** The action of accomplishing something.  
*Long distance running was another of her **accomplishments**.*
- achieve** Successfully bring about or reach (a desired objective or result) by effort, skill, or courage.  
*The killings **achieved** nothing.*
- achievement** A thing done successfully with effort, skill, or courage.  
*To reach this stage is a great **achievement**.*
- achiever** A person with a record of successes.  
*His son would never be the **achiever** that his father was.*
- acquirement** An ability that has been acquired by training.  
*The **acquirement** of self control.*

<b>acquisition</b>	The buying or obtaining of assets or objects. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of wealth.</i>
<b>attain</b>	Reach a destination, either real or abstract. <i>Clarify your objectives and ways of <b>attaining</b> them.</i>
<b>attainment</b>	A thing achieved, especially a skill or educational achievement. <i>The <b>attainment</b> of independence.</i>
<b>blowout</b>	A gay festivity. <i>It is difficult to imagine the slim person going for a real <b>blowout</b>.</i>
<b>clinch</b>	Fasten a rope or angling line with a clinch knot. <i>Johnson scored the goals which <b>clinched</b> victory.</i>
<b>competition</b>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>Business <b>competition</b> can be fiendish at times.</i>
<b>competitive</b>	Involving competition or competitiveness. <i>Highly <b>competitive</b> sales representative.</i>
<b>contention</b>	A point asserted as part of an argument. <i>Freud's <b>contention</b> that all dreams were wish fulfilment.</i>
<b>contest</b>	An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. <i>A coalition was formed to <b>contest</b> the presidential elections.</i>
<b>gain</b>	Increase (one's body weight). <i>Shares showed <b>gains</b> of up to 21 per cent.</i>
<b>gamely</b>	In a plucky manner. <i>I scribbled madly <b>gamely</b> trying to keep up.</i>
<b>jubilant</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
<b>jubilation</b>	A feeling of extreme joy. <i>Unbelievable scenes of <b>jubilation</b>.</i>
<b>opposing</b>	Characterized by active hostility. <i>On the <b>opposing</b> page there were two addresses.</i>
<b>outmaneuver</b>	Defeat by more skillful maneuvering. <i>My new supervisor knows how to <b>outmaneuver</b> the boss in most situations.</i>
<b>rejoicing</b>	Great joy; jubilation. <i>The ban was lifted in 1990 amid general <b>rejoicing</b>.</i>
<b>rivalry</b>	Competition for the same objective or for superiority in the same field. <i>There always has been intense <b>rivalry</b> between the clubs.</i>



<b>succeed</b>	Become the new rightful holder of an office, title, or property. <i>He would <b>succeed</b> Hawke as Prime Minister.</i>
<b>success</b>	A person with a record of successes. <i>The president had some <b>success</b> in restoring confidence.</i>
<u>triumph</u>	The exultation of victory. <i>The agreement was a <b>triumph</b> for common sense.</i>
<u>triumphant</u>	Experiencing triumph. <i>Two of their <b>triumphant</b> Cup team.</i>
<u>trophy</u>	A souvenir of an achievement, especially a part of an animal taken when hunting.
<b>victor</b>	The contestant who wins the contest. <i>Congratulations to the <b>victors</b>.</i>
<u>victory</u>	An act of defeating an enemy or opponent in a battle, game, or other competition. <i>Clinched a <b>victory</b>.</i>
<u>winner</u>	A goal or shot that wins a match or point. <i>Anyone taking out a fixed rate mortgage could be on to a <b>winner</b>.</i>
