## Winter as a Noun

### Definitions of "Winter" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “winter” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The coldest season of the year; in the northern hemisphere it extends from the winter solstice to the vernal equinox.*
- *The period from the winter solstice to the vernal equinox.*
- *Years.*
- *The coldest season of the year, in the northern hemisphere from December to February and in the southern hemisphere from June to August.*



## Synonyms of "Winter" as a noun (1 Word)

**wintertime** The season or period of winter.  
*I couldn't believe it roses in **wintertime**.*



## Usage Examples of "Winter" as a noun

- *He seemed a hundred winters old.*
- *The winter months.*
- *The tree has a good crop of berries in winter.*





## Winter as a Verb

### Definitions of "Winter" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “winter” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Spend the winter.*
- *(especially of a bird) spend the winter in a particular place.*
- *Keep or feed (plants or cattle) during winter.*



## Synonyms of "Winter" as a verb (1 Word)

**overwinter** (of an insect, plant, etc.) live through the winter.  
*The germinated seeds will **overwinter**.*





## Usage Examples of "Winter" as a verb

- *We wintered on the Riviera.*
- *Shackleton's men overwintered on Elephant Island.*
- *Birds wintering in the Channel Islands.*



## Associations of "Winter" (30 Words)

<b>antarctic</b>	At or near the south pole.
<b>arctic</b>	Extremely cold. <i>An <b>arctic</b> climate.</i>
<b><u>blizzard</u></b>	A storm with widespread snowfall accompanied by strong winds. <i>A <b>blizzard</b> of lawsuits.</i>
<b>chill</b>	Chilly. <i>The draughty <b>chill</b> of the castle.</i>
<b>cold</b>	Extended meanings especially of psychological coldness without human warmth or emotion. <i>A <b>cold</b> impersonal manner.</i>
<b>coldness</b>	(in reference to colour) the quality of containing pale blue or grey. <i>A sudden <b>coldness</b> crept around his heart.</i>

<b>cryogenic</b>	Relating to the deep-freezing of the bodies of people who have just died, in the hope that scientific advances may allow them to be revived in the future. <i>A body being prepared for <b>cryogenic</b> preservation.</i>
<b>crystal</b>	Articles made of crystal glass. <i>A quartz <b>crystal</b>.</i>
<b>freeze</b>	Stop a process or a habit by imposing a freeze on it. <i>I could <b>freeze</b> to death in this office when the air conditioning is turned on.</i>
<b>freezing</b>	The freezing point of water 0 C. <i>He was <b>freezing</b> and miserable.</i>
<b>frigid</b>	Unable to be sexually aroused (typically used of a woman). <i>My ex told everyone I was <b>frigid</b>.</i>
<b>frost</b>	The formation of frost or ice on a surface. <i>Following two or three nights of hard <b>frost</b> my garden is a wreck.</i>
<b>frosty</b>	(of the weather) very cold, with frost forming on surfaces. <i>A <b>frosty</b> glass.</i>
<b>frozen</b>	Incapable of being changed or moved or undone; e.g. <i>Children skating on a <b>frozen</b> brook.</i>
<b>gelid</b>	Extremely cold. <i><b>Gelid</b> waters of the North Atlantic.</i>
<b>glacial</b>	A glacial period. <i><b>Glacial</b> winds.</i>
<b>ice</b>	Put ice on or put on ice. <i>Look at the <b>ice</b> on that dame.</i>
<b>iceberg</b>	Lettuce with crisp tightly packed light-green leaves in a firm head. <i><b>Iceberg</b> is still the most popular lettuce.</i>
<b>icecap</b>	A mass of ice and snow that permanently covers a large area of land (e.g., the polar regions or a mountain peak).
<b>icicle</b>	A hanging, tapering piece of ice formed by the freezing of dripping water.
<b>icy</b>	Covered with or consisting of ice. <i>Her voice was <b>icy</b>.</i>
<b>midwinter</b>	The middle of winter. <i>In <b>midwinter</b> the track became a muddy morass.</i>
<b>polar</b>	Having electrical or magnetic polarity. <i>A <b>polar</b> principal.</i>
<b>refrigerant</b>	Causing cooling or freezing. <i>A <b>refrigerant</b> substance such as ice or solid carbon dioxide.</i>



<b>rime</b>	Frost formed on cold objects by the rapid freezing of water vapour in cloud or fog. <i>He does not brush away the frost that <b>rimes</b> his beard.</i>
<b>skiing</b>	The action of travelling over snow on skis especially as a sport or recreation Competitive skiing falls into two categories Nordic cross country racing jumping and biathlon and Alpine downhill or straight racing and slalom racing round a series of markers.
<b>sleet</b>	Sleet falls. <i>Driving <b>sleet</b> and rain made conditions horrendous.</i>
<b>snow</b>	A dessert or other dish resembling snow. <i>All that they could pick up on their screens was <b>snow</b>.</i>
<b>snowfall</b>	A fall of snow. <i>The average <b>snowfall</b> is 7 5 m a year.</i>
<b>wintry</b>	Devoid of warmth and cordiality; expressive of unfriendliness or disdain. <i>A <b>wintry</b> landscape.</i>
