### Definitions of "Witch" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “witch” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A woman who is bewitchingly attractive.*
- *A person thought to have magic powers, especially evil ones, popularly depicted as a woman wearing a black cloak and pointed hat and flying on a broomstick.*
- *A being (usually female) imagined to have special powers derived from the devil.*
- *An ugly or unpleasant woman.*
- *A believer in Wicca.*
- *A female sorcerer or magician.*
- *An edible North Atlantic flatfish.*
- *An ugly evil-looking old woman.*
- *A follower or practitioner of Wicca or of modern witchcraft.*



## Synonyms of "Witch" as a noun (13 Words)

<b>beldam</b>	An ugly evil-looking old woman.
<b>beldame</b>	A woman of advanced age.
<b>crone</b>	An ugly evil-looking old woman.
<b>enchantress</b>	A woman who is considered to be dangerously seductive.
<b>hag</b>	An ugly old woman. <i>A fat old <b>hag</b> in a dirty apron.</i>
<b>harpy</b>	(Greek mythology) vicious winged monster; often depicted as a bird with the head of a woman. <i>Clearly, he had us down as a couple of gold-digging harpies.</i>
<b>harridan</b>	A scolding (even vicious) old woman. <i>A bullying old <b>harridan</b>.</i>
<b>necromancer</b>	One who practices magic or sorcery. <i>Dr Faustus a <b>necromancer</b> of the 16th century.</i>

<b>occultist</b>	A believer in occultism; someone versed in the occult arts.
<b>she-devil</b>	A cruel woman.
<b>sorceress</b>	A female sorcerer; a witch.
<b>termagant</b>	A harsh-tempered or overbearing woman.
<b>wiccan</b>	A believer in Wicca.



### Usage Examples of "Witch" as a noun

- *He can marry the old witch for all I care.*



## Witch as a Verb

### Definitions of "Witch" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "witch" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something.*
- *(of a woman) enchant (a man).*
- *Cast an evil spell on.*



## Synonyms of "Witch" as a verb (5 Words)

**bewitch** Enchant and delight (someone).  
*They both were **bewitched** by the golden luminosity of Italy.*

**enchant** Fill (someone) with great delight; charm.  
*Isabel was **enchanted** with the idea.*

**glamour** Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something.

**hex** Cast a spell over someone or something put a hex on someone or something.  
*He **hexed** her with his fingers.*

**jinx** Bring bad luck to; cast an evil spell on.  
*The play is **jinxed**.*



## Usage Examples of "Witch" as a verb

- *She witched Jake.*
- *Mrs Mucharski had somehow witched the house.*



## Associations of "Witch" (30 Words)

<b>amulet</b>	An ornament or small piece of jewellery thought to give protection against evil, danger, or disease.
<b>bewitchment</b>	A magical spell.
<b><u>broom</u></b>	Sweep with a broom or as if with a broom.
<b>charmed</b>	(of a particle) possessing the property charm. <i>I felt that I had a <b>charmed</b> life.</i>
<b><u>conjure</u></b>	Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together. <i>Anne <b>conjured</b> up a delicious home made hotpot.</i>
<b>coven</b>	A group or meeting of witches. <i><b>Covens</b> of militants within the party.</i>
<b>crone</b>	An ugly old woman.
<b>disbelieve</b>	Be unable to believe. <i>To <b>disbelieve</b> is as much an act of faith as belief.</i>

<b>genie</b>	An invisible spirit mentioned in the Koran and believed by Muslims to inhabit the earth and influence mankind by appearing in the form of humans or animals.
<b>goddess</b>	A woman who is greatly admired, especially for her beauty. <i>He had an affair with a screen <b>goddess</b>.</i>
<b>hunt</b>	An act of hunting wild animals or game. <i>Goering often <b>hunted</b> wild boars in Poland.</i>
<b>magic</b>	An illusory feat considered magical by naive observers. <i>A <b>magic</b> wand.</i>
<b>magical</b>	Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers. <i>It was a <b>magical</b> evening of pure nostalgia.</i>
<b>magician</b>	A person with exceptional skill in a particular area. <i>He was the <b>magician</b> of the fan belt.</i>
<b>mermaid</b>	A mythical sea creature with the head and trunk of a woman and the tail of a fish, conventionally depicted as beautiful and with long flowing golden hair.
<b>mystic</b>	Relating to or characteristic of mysticism. <i>The <b>mystical</b> style of Blake.</i>
<b>myth</b>	A traditional story, especially one concerning the early history of a people or explaining a natural or social phenomenon, and typically involving supernatural beings or events. <i>Nobody had ever heard of Simon's mysterious friend Anna said he was a <b>myth</b>.</i>
<b>necromancer</b>	One who practices divination by conjuring up the dead. <i>Dr Faustus a <b>necromancer</b> of the 16th century.</i>
<b>necromancy</b>	Conjuring up the dead, especially for prophesying. <i>Alchemy <b>necromancy</b> and other magic practices.</i>
<b>potion</b>	A liquid with healing, magical, or poisonous properties. <i>A healing <b>potion</b>.</i>
<b>ritual</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of religious rituals. <i><b>Ritual</b> burial.</i>
<b>seance</b>	A meeting at which people attempt to make contact with the dead, especially through the agency of a medium. <i>The <b>seance</b> was held in the medium's parlor.</i>
<b>shaman</b>	In societies practicing shamanism one acting as a medium between the visible and spirit worlds practices sorcery for healing or divination.



<b>sleight</b>	The use of dexterity or cunning, especially so as to deceive. <i>Except by <b>sleight</b> of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
<b>sorcerer</b>	One who practices magic or sorcery.
<b>sorcery</b>	The use of magic, especially black magic.
<b>spell</b>	Orally recite the letters of or give the spelling of. <i>I m afraid this <b>spells</b> trouble.</i>
<b>talisman</b>	A person regarded as representing and inspiring a particular group. <i>Those rings so fresh and gleaming were their <b>talismans</b>.</i>
<b>witchcraft</b>	Bewitching or fascinating attraction or charm. <i>Children and goods were believed to be vulnerable to the <b>witchcraft</b> of jealous neighbours.</i>
<b>wizard</b>	A help feature of a software package that automates complex tasks by asking the user a series of easy-to-answer questions. <i>A financial <b>wizard</b>.</i>
