Definitions of "Witch" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “witch” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A woman who is bewitchingly attractive.*
- *A person thought to have magic powers, especially evil ones, popularly depicted as a woman wearing a black cloak and pointed hat and flying on a broomstick.*
- *A being (usually female) imagined to have special powers derived from the devil.*
- *An ugly or unpleasant woman.*
- *A believer in Wicca.*
- *A female sorcerer or magician.*
- *An edible North Atlantic flatfish.*
- *An ugly evil-looking old woman.*
- *A follower or practitioner of Wicca or of modern witchcraft.*



Synonyms of "Witch" as a noun (13 Words)

- beldam** An ugly evil-looking old woman.
- beldame** A woman of advanced age.
- crone** An ugly evil-looking old woman.
- enchantress** A woman who is considered to be dangerously seductive.
- hag** An ugly old woman.
*A fat old **hag** in a dirty apron.*
- harpy** (Greek mythology) vicious winged monster; often depicted as a bird with the head of a woman.
Clearly, he had us down as a couple of gold-digging harpies.
- harridan** A scolding (even vicious) old woman.
*A bullying old **harridan**.*
- necromancer** One who practices magic or sorcery.
*Dr Faustus a **necromancer** of the 16th century.*

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| occultist | A believer in occultism; someone versed in the occult arts. |
| she-devil | A cruel woman. |
| sorceress | A female sorcerer; a witch. |
| termagant | A harsh-tempered or overbearing woman. |
| wiccan | A believer in Wicca. |

Witch as a Verb

Definitions of "Witch" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "witch" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something.*
- *(of a woman) enchant (a man).*
- *Cast an evil spell on.*



Synonyms of "Witch" as a verb (5 Words)

bewitch Enchant and delight (someone).
*They both were **bewitched** by the golden luminosity of Italy.*

enchant Fill (someone) with great delight; charm.
*Isabel was **enchanted** with the idea.*

glamour Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something.

hex Cast a spell over someone or something put a hex on someone or something.
*He **hexed** her with his fingers.*

jinx Bring bad luck to; cast an evil spell on.
*The play is **jinxed**.*



Usage Examples of "Witch" as a verb

- *She witched Jake.*
- *Mrs Mucharski had somehow witched the house.*

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| amulet | An ornament or small piece of jewellery thought to give protection against evil, danger, or disease. |
| bewitchment | A magical spell. |
| <u>broom</u> | Sweep with a broom or as if with a broom. |
| charmed | (of a particle) possessing the property charm. <i>I felt that I had a charmed life.</i> |
| <u>conjure</u> | Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together. <i>Anne conjured up a delicious home made hotpot.</i> |
| coven | A group or meeting of witches. <i>Covens of militants within the party.</i> |
| crone | An ugly old woman. |
| disbelieve | Be unable to believe. <i>To disbelieve is as much an act of faith as belief.</i> |

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| genie | An invisible spirit mentioned in the Koran and believed by Muslims to inhabit the earth and influence mankind by appearing in the form of humans or animals. |
| goddess | A woman who is greatly admired, especially for her beauty. <i>He had an affair with a screen goddess.</i> |
| hunt | An act of hunting wild animals or game. <i>Goering often hunted wild boars in Poland.</i> |
| magic | An illusory feat considered magical by naive observers. <i>A magic wand.</i> |
| magical | Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers. <i>It was a magical evening of pure nostalgia.</i> |
| magician | A person with exceptional skill in a particular area. <i>He was the magician of the fan belt.</i> |
| mermaid | A mythical sea creature with the head and trunk of a woman and the tail of a fish, conventionally depicted as beautiful and with long flowing golden hair. |
| mystic | Relating to or characteristic of mysticism. <i>The mystical style of Blake.</i> |
| myth | A traditional story, especially one concerning the early history of a people or explaining a natural or social phenomenon, and typically involving supernatural beings or events. <i>Nobody had ever heard of Simon's mysterious friend Anna said he was a myth.</i> |
| necromancer | One who practices divination by conjuring up the dead. <i>Dr Faustus a necromancer of the 16th century.</i> |
| necromancy | Conjuring up the dead, especially for prophesying. <i>Alchemy necromancy and other magic practices.</i> |
| potion | A liquid with healing, magical, or poisonous properties. <i>A healing potion.</i> |
| ritual | Of or relating to or characteristic of religious rituals. <i>Ritual burial.</i> |
| seance | A meeting at which people attempt to make contact with the dead, especially through the agency of a medium. <i>The seance was held in the medium's parlor.</i> |
| shaman | In societies practicing shamanism one acting as a medium between the visible and spirit worlds practices sorcery for healing or divination. |

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| sleight | The use of dexterity or cunning, especially so as to deceive. <i>Except by sleight of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i> |
| sorcerer | One who practices magic or sorcery. |
| sorcery | The use of magic, especially black magic. |
| spell | Orally recite the letters of or give the spelling of. <i>I m afraid this spells trouble.</i> |
| talisman | A person regarded as representing and inspiring a particular group. <i>Those rings so fresh and gleaming were their talismans.</i> |
| witchcraft | Bewitching or fascinating attraction or charm. <i>Children and goods were believed to be vulnerable to the witchcraft of jealous neighbours.</i> |
| wizard | A help feature of a software package that automates complex tasks by asking the user a series of easy-to-answer questions. <i>A financial wizard.</i> |
