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Associations of "Withdrew" (30 Words)

abjure	Formally reject or disavow a formerly held belief, usually under pressure. <i>MPs were urged to abjure their Jacobite allegiance.</i>
abolish	Do away with. <i>Slavery was abolished in the mid 19th century in America and in Russia.</i>
accuser	Someone who imputes guilt or blame. <i>I dislike any law that puts the burden of proof on the accused rather than the accuser.</i>
annihilate	Kill in large numbers. <i>A simple bomb of this type could annihilate them all.</i>
backdown	An act of backing down. <i>Ministers have avoided sounding triumphal about the association s backdown.</i>
cancel	A notation cancelling a previous sharp or flat. <i>A cancel title page.</i>
capitulate	Surrender under agreed conditions. <i>The patriots had to capitulate to the enemy forces.</i>
disavow	Deny any responsibility or support for. <i>Her husband disavowed her after 30 years of marriage and six children.</i>
disclaim	Make a disclaimer about. <i>The school disclaimed any responsibility for his death.</i>
disown	Cast off. <i>Lovell s rich family had disowned him because of his marriage.</i>
exterminate	Kill (a pest). <i>Hitler wanted to exterminate the Jews Gypsies Communists and homosexuals of Europe.</i>
foreswear	Do without or cease to hold or adhere to. <i>I am foreswearing women forever.</i>

forswear	Formally reject or disavow a formerly held belief, usually under pressure. <i>I swore that I would lead us safely home and I do not mean to be forsworn.</i>
negate	Deny the existence of. <i>Alcohol negates the effects of the drug.</i>
quit	Resign from (a job). <i>Quit yourselves like men and fight.</i>
recant	Say that one no longer holds an opinion or belief, especially one considered heretical. <i>Galileo was forced to recant his assertion that the earth orbited the sun.</i>
recantation	A disavowal or taking back of a previous assertion. <i>Every writer interprets Galileo's recantation in a different way.</i>
<u>recede</u>	(of a quality, feeling, or possibility) gradually diminish. <i>His chin receded sharply from his lower lip.</i>
relinquish	Do without or cease to hold or adhere to. <i>I am relinquishing my bedroom to the long term house guest.</i>
remove	Remove from a position or an office. <i>Remove a wrapper.</i>
<u>renounce</u>	Refuse or resign a right or position, especially one as an heir or trustee. <i>He renounced alcohol completely.</i>
rescission	The act of rescinding; the cancellation of a contract and the return of the parties to the positions they would have had if the contract had not been made. <i>The plaintiff agreed to the rescission of the agreement.</i>
resign	Part with a possession or right. <i>Resign a claim to the throne.</i>
retract	Withdraw or go back on (an undertaking). <i>He retracted his earlier statements about his religion.</i>
retraction	A withdrawal of a statement, accusation, or undertaking. <i>Retraction of the foreskin.</i>
retreat	Make a retreat from an earlier commitment or activity. <i>His proposals were clearly unreasonable and he was forced to retreat.</i>
<u>surrender</u>	The action of surrendering a lease or life insurance policy. <i>In 1815 Denmark surrendered Norway to Sweden.</i>
swallow	An act of swallowing something especially food or drink. <i>He seemed ready to swallow any insult.</i>
<u>waive</u>	Do without or cease to hold or adhere to. <i>He will waive all rights to the money.</i>

withdrawal The action of ceasing to participate in an activity.
