| <b>forbearance</b> | The action of refraining from exercising a legal right, especially enforcing the payment of a debt.<br><i>His unfailing courtesy and <b>forbearance</b> under great provocation.</i> |
| <b>fortitude</b>   | Courage in pain or adversity.<br><i>She endured her illness with great <b>fortitude</b>.</i>   |
| <b>grapple</b>     | The act of engaging in close hand-to-hand combat.<br><i>The two men <b>grappled</b> with each other for several minutes.</i>   |
| <b>handle</b>      | Handle effectively.<br><i>That s some <b>handle</b> for a baby.</i>  |
| <b>maintenance</b> | Means of maintenance of a family or group.<br><i>A divorced man paying his ex wife 2 500 a year <b>maintenance</b>.</i>  |
| <b>manage</b>      | Be the manager of a sports team or a performer.<br><i>She <b>managed</b> a brave but unconvincing smile.</i>   |

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| <b>obstinacy</b>       | Resolute adherence to your own ideas or desires.<br><i>His reputation for <b>obstinacy</b>.</i>   |
| <b>patience</b>        | Good-natured tolerance of delay or incompetence.<br><i>I have run out of <b>patience</b> with her.</i>  |
| <b>patiently</b>       | With patience; in a patient manner.<br><i>He <b>patiently</b> explained the pros and cons.</i>  |
| <b>perseverance</b>    | Persistent determination.<br><i>Medicine is a field which requires dedication and <b>perseverance</b>.</i>  |
| <b>persevere</b>       | Be persistent, refuse to stop.<br><i>His family <b>persevered</b> with his treatment.</i>   |
| <b><u>persist</u></b>  | Be persistent refuse to stop.<br><i>We are <b>persisting</b> with policies that will create jobs for the future.</i>  |
| <b>persistence</b>     | The fact of continuing in an opinion or course of action in spite of difficulty or opposition.<br><i>Cardiff's <b>persistence</b> was rewarded with a try.</i>  |
| <b>recalcitrance</b>   | The trait of being unmanageable.  |
| <b><u>resist</u></b>   | Resist immunologically the introduction of some foreign tissue or organ.<br><i>We will continue to <b>resist</b> changes to the treaty.</i>   |
| <b><u>stamina</u></b>  | Enduring strength and energy.<br><i>Their secret is <b>stamina</b> rather than speed.</i>   |
| <b>struggle</b>        | Make a strenuous or labored effort.<br><i>It was a <b>struggle</b> to make herself understood.</i>  |
| <b><u>survival</u></b> | A natural process resulting in the evolution of organisms best adapted to the environment.<br><i>His shorts were a <b>survival</b> from his army days.</i>  |
| <b><u>survive</u></b>  | Manage to keep going in difficult circumstances.<br><i>He <b>survived</b> the cancer against all odds.</i>  |
| <b><u>sustain</u></b>  | An effect or facility on a keyboard or electronic instrument whereby a note can be sustained after the key is released.<br><i>His health will no longer enable him to <b>sustain</b> the heavy burdens of office.</i> |
| <b><u>tolerate</u></b> | Have a tolerance for a poison or strong drug or pathogen or environmental condition.<br><i>A regime unwilling to <b>tolerate</b> dissent.</i>   |
| <b>toleration</b>      | The practice of tolerating something, in particular differences of opinion or behaviour.<br><i>The king demanded greater religious <b>toleration</b>.</i>   |
