### Definitions of "Witty" as an adjective

- *Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour.*
- *Combining clever conception and facetious expression.*



## Synonyms of "Witty" as an adjective (7 Words)

<b>amusing</b>	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>Such a likeable <b>amusing</b> man.</i>
<b>chucklesome</b>	Causing mild amusement; humorous. <i>The script is <b>chucklesome</b> rather than hilarious.</i>
<b>comic</b>	Relating to or in the style of comedy. <i><b>Comic</b> hero.</i>
<b>comical</b>	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>A series of <b>comical</b> misunderstandings.</i>
<b>droll</b>	Curious or unusual in a way that provokes dry amusement. <i>His unique brand of <b>droll</b> self mockery.</i>
<b>funny</b>	Difficult to explain or understand; strange or odd. <i>A <b>funny</b> story.</i>
<b>humorous</b>	Causing laughter and amusement; comic. <i><b>Humorous</b> cartoons.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Witty" as an adjective

- *A witty remark.*
- *Marlowe was charming and witty.*
- *His sermons were unpredictably witty and satirical as well as eloquent.*



## Associations of "Witty" (30 Words)

<b>amusing</b>	Causing laughter and providing entertainment. <i>An <b>amusing</b> film with a steady stream of pranks and pratfalls.</i>
<b><u>badinage</u></b>	Frivolous banter. <i>He developed a nice line in <b>badinage</b> with the Labour leader.</i>
<b><u>banter</u></b>	Exchange remarks in a good-humoured teasing way. <i>The men <b>bantered</b> with the waitresses.</i>
<b>comic</b>	A periodical containing comic strips intended chiefly for children. <i>He is training as a stand up <b>comic</b>.</i>
<b>conversationalist</b>	A person who is good at or fond of engaging in conversation. <i>An entertaining <b>conversationalist</b>.</i>
<b>droll</b>	Comical in an odd or whimsical manner. <i>His unique brand of <b>droll</b> self mockery.</i>



<b>facetious</b>	Treating serious issues with deliberately inappropriate humour; flippant. <i>A <b>facetious</b> remark.</i>
<b>fun</b>	A source of fun. <i>He became a figure of <b>fun</b>.</i>
<b>funny</b>	Not as expected. <i>A very <b>funny</b> writer.</i>
<b>humor</b>	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>She didn't appreciate my <b>humor</b>.</i>
<b>humorous</b>	Causing laughter and amusement; comic. <i>A <b>humorous</b> and entertaining talk.</i>
<b>humour</b>	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>The clash hadn't improved his <b>humour</b>.</i>
<b>insightful</b>	Exhibiting insight or clear and deep perception-R.C.Angell. <i>An <b>insightful</b> parent.</i>
<b>jest</b>	Act in a funny or teasing way. <i>Lowly virtue is the <b>jest</b> of fools.</i>
<b>jesting</b>	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>A <b>jesting</b> commentary on world affairs.</i>
<b>jocose</b>	Playful or humorous. <i>A <b>jocose</b> allusion.</i>
<b>jocular</b>	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>His voice was <b>jocular</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>joke</u></a>	Make jokes talk humorously or flippantly. <i>She could laugh and <b>joke</b> with her colleagues.</i>
<a href="#"><u>jolly</u></a>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Some regard it as a bit of a <b>jolly</b>.</i>
<b>laugh</b>	Something that causes laughter a source of fun amusement or derision. <i>I like Peter he's a good <b>laugh</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>playful</u></a>	Intended for one's own or others' amusement rather than seriously. <i>A <b>playful</b> tomboy who loves to dress up.</i>
<b>puckish</b>	Naughtily or annoyingly playful. <i>A <b>puckish</b> sense of humour.</i>
<a href="#"><u>quirky</u></a>	(informal) strikingly unconventional. <i>Her sense of humour was decidedly <b>quirky</b>.</i>
<b>raconteur</b>	A person skilled in telling anecdotes. <i>A colourful <b>raconteur</b>.</i>

<b>repartee</b>	Adroitness and cleverness in reply. <i>He had a quick mind and a splendid gift of <b>repartee</b>.</i>
<b>slapstick</b>	Acoustic device consisting of two paddles hinged together; used by an actor to make a loud noise without inflicting injury when striking someone. <b>Slapstick</b> humour.
<b>waggish</b>	Witty or joking- James Fenimore Cooper. A <b>waggish</b> riposte.
<u><b>whimsical</b></u>	Determined by chance or impulse or whim rather than by necessity or reason. A <b>whimsical</b> sense of humour.
<u><b>wit</b></u>	A witty person. <i>He needed all his <b>wits</b> to figure out the way back.</i>
<b>witticism</b>	A witty remark. <i>Maurice roared with laughter at his own <b>witticisms</b>.</i>
