Wondering as an Adjective

Definitions of "Wondering" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “wondering” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Showing curiosity.*
- *Characterized by or expressive of a desire to know something; curious.*
- *Characterized by or expressive of admiration and amazement.*



Synonyms of "Wondering" as an adjective (3 Words)

- inquisitive** Inquiring or appearing to inquire.
*I didn't like to seem **inquisitive**.*
- questioning** (of a look) suggesting that information is sought.
*Aaron shot her a **questioning** glance.*
- speculative** (of an investment) involving a high risk of loss.
***Speculative** knowledge.*



Usage Examples of "Wondering" as an adjective

- *Peter listened with an air of wondering astonishment.*
- *Unsure where she was leading to, I cast her a wondering look.*

| astonishing | So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>An astonishing achievement.</i> |
| astounding | So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>An astounding achievement.</i> |

| bystander | A nonparticipant spectator. <i>Water cannons were turned on marchers and innocent bystanders alike.</i> |
| curious | Eager to investigate and learn or learn more (sometimes about others' concerns). <i>Curious about the neighbor s doings.</i> |
| flabbergasted | As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i>Flabbergasted fans took to the streets to celebrate the team s big win.</i> |
| incredible | Difficult to believe; extraordinary. <i>The book s plot is simply incredible.</i> |
| inquiring | Showing an interest in learning new things. <i>He sent her an inquiring glance.</i> |
| inquisitive | Showing curiosity. <i>The police are proverbially inquisitive.</i> |
| interrogative | Some linguists consider interrogative sentences to constitute a mood. <i>A hard interrogative stare.</i> |
| interrogatory | Relating to the use of or having the nature of an interrogation. <i>She abandoned her interrogatory monologue.</i> |
| marvelous | Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>A marvelous collection of rare books.</i> |
| nosy | Offensively curious or inquisitive. <i>He flipped through my letters in his nosy way.</i> |
| perplexed | Completely baffled; very puzzled. <i>Perplexed state of the world.</i> |
| puzzled | Filled with bewilderment. <i>She looked puzzled and angry with him.</i> |
| questioning | The action of asking someone questions, especially in an official context. <i>The questioning mind of a child.</i> |
| quizzical | (of a person's expression or behaviour) indicating mild or amused puzzlement. <i>One of the most quizzical movies ever made.</i> |

| speculative | Showing curiosity. <i>Raised a speculative eyebrow.</i> |
| <u>staggering</u> | So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>The staggering bills for maintenance and repair.</i> |
| stupefy | Make dull or stupid or muddle with drunkenness or infatuation. <i>The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to stupefy her.</i> |
| surprise | Cause to be surprised. <i>Surprise major.</i> |
| surprised | Taken unawares or suddenly and feeling wonder or astonishment. <i>Surprised that he remembered my name.</i> |
| wonder | A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>The wonders of modern science.</i> |
