convention	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional. <i>The party held its biennial convention.</i>
custom	Regular dealings with a shop or business by customers. <i>Custom demanded that a person should have gifts for the child.</i>
habit	The general form or mode of growth (especially of a plant or crystal). <i>A cocaine habit.</i>
practice	Systematic training by multiple repetitions. <i>Dr Apps has a practice in Neasham Road.</i>
routine	A short performance that is part of a longer program. <i>She had a catchy little routine.</i>
rule	A rule describing or prescribing a linguistic practice. <i>Violence is the rule not the exception.</i>
use	A purpose for or way in which something can be used. <i>Long use had hardened him to it.</i>

A general category of things used in the expression in the way of.
*The dinghy lost **way** and drifted towards the shore.*



Usage Examples of "Wont" as a noun

- *Constance, as was her wont, had paid her little attention.*

Definitions of "Wont" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "wont" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a person) in the habit of doing something; accustomed.*



Synonyms of "Wont" as an adjective (4 Words)

- accustomed** Customary; usual.
*His **accustomed** route.*
- given** Acknowledged as a supposition.
*This **given** under my hand this thirtieth day of October.*
- inclined** Having a preference, disposition, or tendency.
*Wasn't **inclined** to believe the excuse.*
- used** Having already been used.
*Bought a secondhand or **used** car.*



Usage Examples of "Wont" as an adjective

- *He was wont to arise at 5.30 every morning.*



Associations of "Wont" (30 Words)

- accustomed** Commonly used or practiced; usual.
*His **accustomed** thoroughness.*
- broadly** Without regard to specific details or exceptions.
*He interprets the law **broadly**.*
- chiefly** For the most part.
*He is remembered **chiefly** for his organ sonatas.*
- commonly** Very often; frequently.
*A **commonly** used industrial chemical.*
- conventional** Rigidly formal or bound by convention.
*West made a **conventional** bid showing a hand with at least 5 spades.*

custom	Made or done to order custom made. <i>If you keep me waiting I will take my custom elsewhere.</i>
customarily	In a way which follows customs or usual practices; usually. <i>The leaves are customarily used for animal fodder.</i>
customary	Established by or based on custom rather than common law or statute. <i>Sealed the deal with the customary handshake.</i>
generally	In general terms; without regard to particulars or exceptions. <i>The term of a lease is generally 99 years.</i>
habit	Put a habit on. <i>Owls have nocturnal habits.</i>
habitual	Done constantly or as a habit. <i>His habitual comment.</i>
inveterate	Having a particular habit, activity, or interest that is long-established and unlikely to change. <i>An inveterate gambler.</i>
largely	To a great extent; on the whole; mostly. <i>He was soon arrested largely through the efforts of Tom Poole.</i>
mainly	For the most part. <i>The west will be mainly dry.</i>
manner	A kind or sort. <i>What manner of man is he.</i>
mostly	As regards the greater part or number. <i>I made some good friends but mostly met closed minded people.</i>
normally	At right angles to a given line or surface. <i>Try to breathe normally.</i>
ordinarily	Under normal conditions. <i>A person who is ordinarily resident in the United Kingdom.</i>
overwhelmingly	To a very great degree or with a great majority. <i>The country voted overwhelmingly for independence.</i>
patter	Run with quick light steps. <i>He quickly pattered down the stairs.</i>
primarily	For the most part; mainly. <i>Around 80 per cent of personal computers are used primarily for word processing.</i>
principally	For the most part. <i>He was principally a landscape painter.</i>

routine	Organize according to a routine. <i>I settled down into a routine of work and sleep.</i>
<u>rutinely</u>	As part of a regular procedure rather than for a special reason. <i>Owners rutinely flout local laws about restraining and picking up after their pets.</i>
traditional	Consisting of or derived from tradition. <i>The traditional drinks in the clubhouse.</i>
tuscan	A resident of Tuscany.
<u>typical</u>	Representative as a symbol; symbolic. <i>A painting typical of the Impressionist school.</i>
<u>typically</u>	In most cases; usually. <i>The illness typically lasts five to ten days.</i>
<u>usual</u>	The drink one habitually prefers. <i>He carried out his usual evening routine.</i>
usually	Under normal conditions; generally. <i>Usually she was late.</i>
