use A purpose for or way in which something can be used.



A general category of things used in the expression in the way of. The dinghy lost **way** and drifted towards the shore.



• Constance, as was her wont, had paid her little attention.




Wont as an Adjective

given This **given** under my hand this thirtieth day of October.


Having a preference, disposition, or tendency.

customary Established by or based on custom rather than common law or statute.

The term of a lease is **generally** 99 years.

habitual Done constantly or as a habit.
