An economic system based on private ownership of capital.  
*An era of free market **capitalism**.*

Appropriate for or engaged in office work.  
***Clerical** skills.*

<b><u>consumerism</u></b>	A movement advocating greater protection of the interests of consumers. <i>Many people are becoming increasingly conscious of the environmental impact of <b>consumerism</b>.</i>
<b>exaggerated</b>	Enlarged or altered beyond normal proportions. <i>Thick lenses <b>exaggerated</b> the size of her eyes.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i><b>Excessive</b> charges.</i>
<b>excessively</b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i><b>Excessively</b> high taxes.</i>
<b>extra</b>	Excessive or extravagant. <i>I had an education with all the <b>extras</b>.</i>
<b>headquarters</b>	A military unit consisting of a commander and the headquarters staff. <i>Many companies have their <b>headquarters</b> in New York.</i>
<b><u>hectic</u></b>	A hectic fever or flush. <i>A <b>hectic</b> business schedule.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i><b>Immoderate</b> spending.</i>
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b>intemperate</b>	Excessive in behavior. <i><b>Intemperate</b> rage.</i>
<b>job</b>	A workplace as in the expression on the job. <i>We thought you'd have a <b>job</b> getting there.</i>
<b>levity</b>	A manner lacking seriousness. <i>As an attempt to introduce a note of <b>levity</b> the words were a disastrous flop.</i>
<b>management</b>	The treatment or control of diseases or disorders, or the care of patients who suffer them. <i>Businesses were slow to adopt the key elements of environmental risk <b>management</b>.</i>
<b>materialism</b>	The philosophical theory that matter is the only reality. <i>They hated the sinful <b>materialism</b> of the wicked city.</i>
<b><u>occupation</u></b>	The action, state, or period of occupying or being occupied by military force. <i>People in professional <b>occupations</b>.</i>
<b>office</b>	Professional or clerical workers in an office. <i>The <b>offices</b> of the mass.</i>

<b><u>overly</u></b>	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>pedantry</b>	Excessive concern with minor details and rules. <i>To object to this is not mere <b>pedantry</b>.</i>
<b><u>quantity</u></b>	The figure or symbol representing a quantity. <i>He had a <b>quantity</b> of ammunition.</i>
<b>sinecure</b>	A position requiring little or no work but giving the holder status or financial benefit. <i>Political <b>sinecures</b> for the supporters of ministers.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>superfluous</b>	Serving no useful purpose; having no excuse for being. <i>Delete <b>superfluous</b> or unnecessary words.</i>
<b><u>too</u></b>	Moreover (used when adding a further point). <i>He wore suits that seemed a size <b>too</b> small for him.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i>His dress stops just short of <b>undue</b> elegance.</i>
<b><u>unjustified</u></b>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i><b>Unjustified</b> price increases.</i>
<b><u>unwarranted</u></b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i><b>Unwarranted</b> limitations of personal freedom.</i>
<b>usurious</b>	Relating to or characterized by usury; extortionate. <i>They lend money at <b>usurious</b> rates.</i>
<b><u>workplace</u></b>	A place where people work, such as an office or factory. <i><b>Workplace</b> nurseries.</i>
