- vexation** The psychological state of being irritated or annoyed.
*Jenna bit her lip in **vexation**.*

- *His worry over the prospect of being fired.*

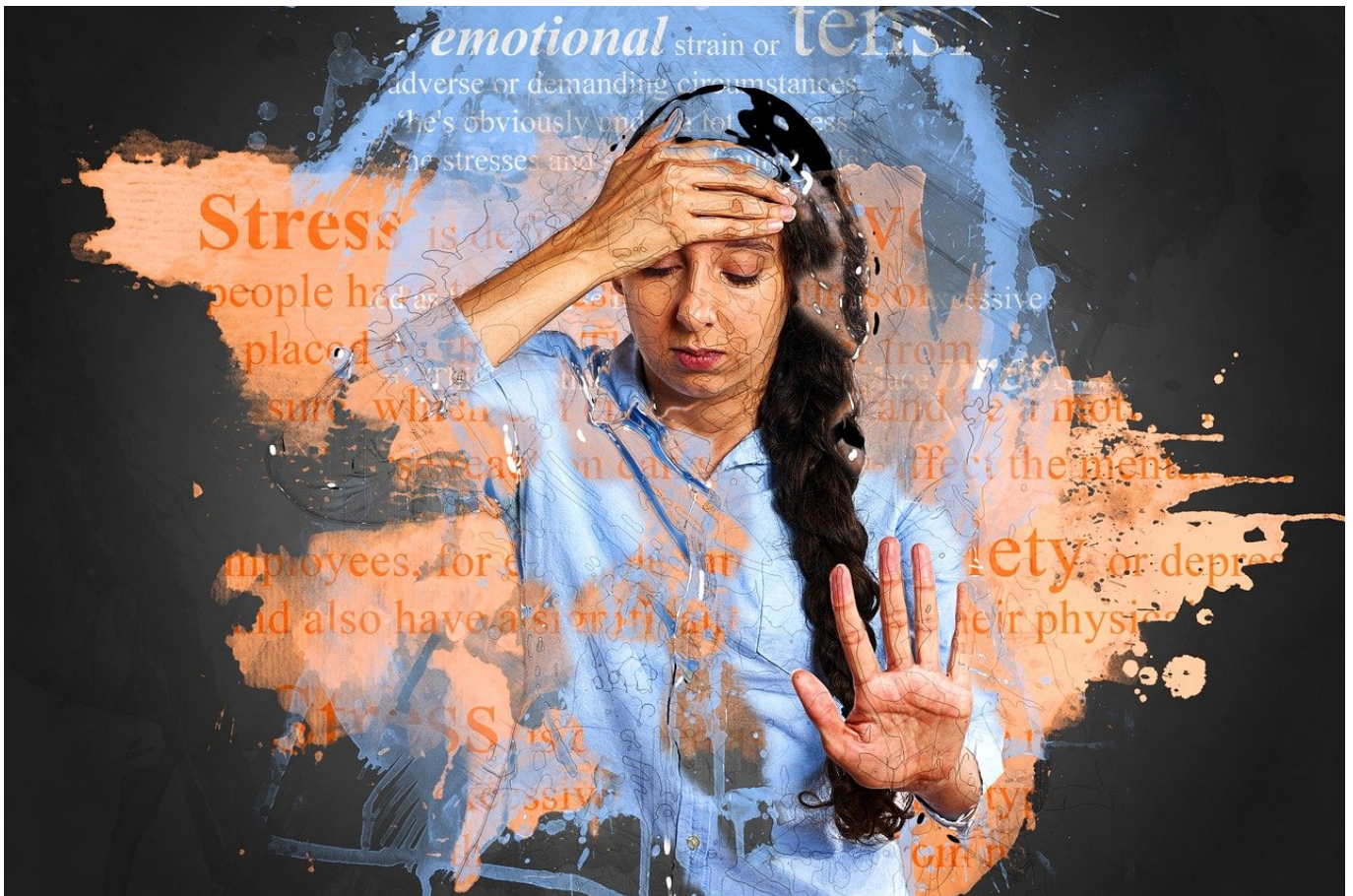


Worries as a Verb

Definitions of "Worries" as a verb

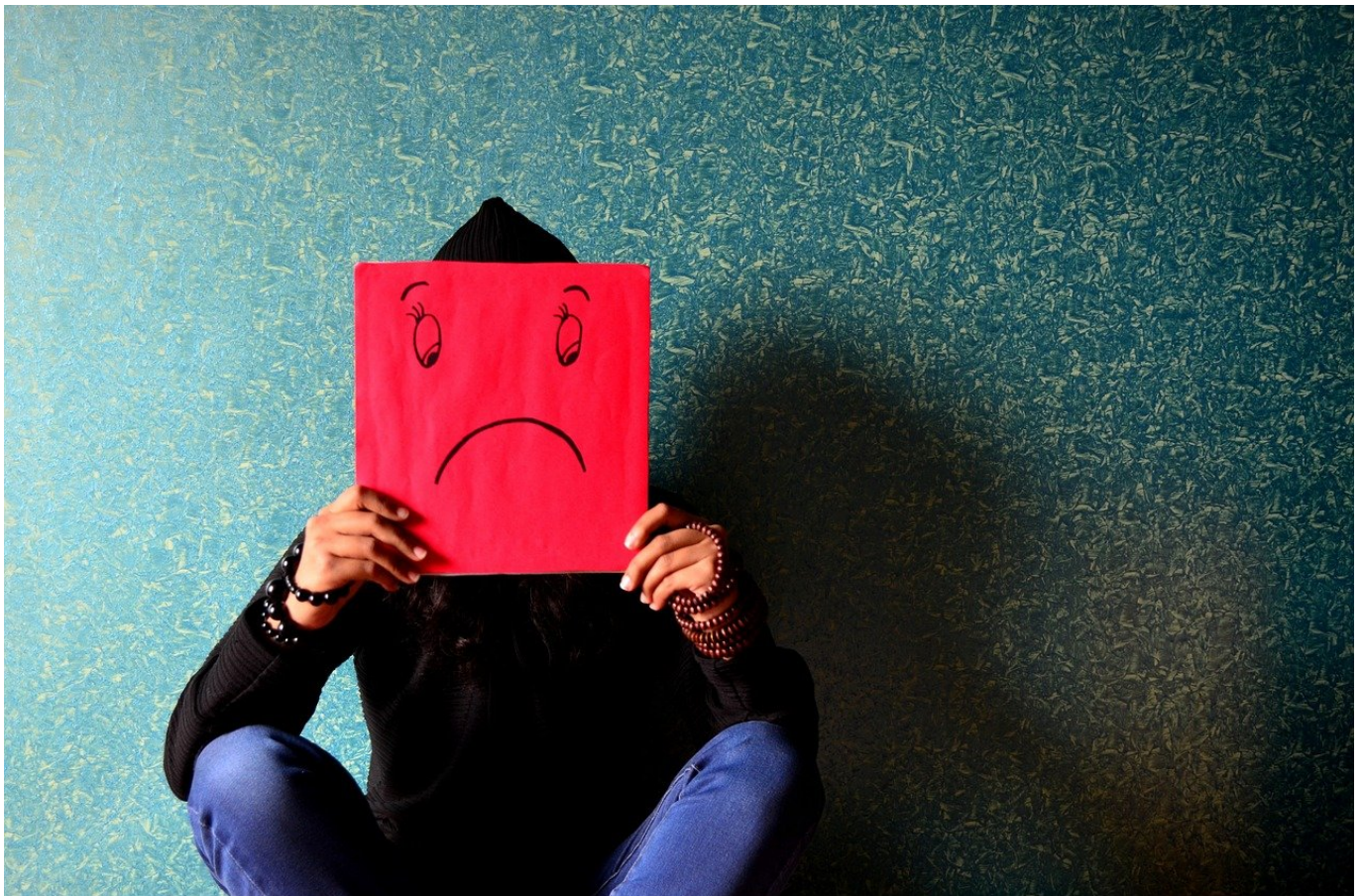
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "worries" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Touch or rub constantly.*
- *Lacerate by biting.*
- *Disturb the peace of mind of; afflict with mental agitation or distress.*
- *Be worried, concerned, anxious, troubled, or uneasy.*
- *Be on the mind of.*
- *Be concerned with.*



Synonyms of "Worries" as a verb (5 Words)

- care** Provide care for.
*I really **care** about my work.*
- concern** Be on the mind of.
*The roof of the barn **concerns** me because eventually it will fall in.*
- interest** Excite the curiosity of engage the interest of.
*Efforts were made to **interest** her in a purchase.*
- occupy** Fill or preoccupy the mind.
*The young prince will soon **occupy** the throne.*
- vex** Be a mystery or bewildering to.
*Thou shalt not **vex** a stranger.*



Usage Examples of "Worries" as a verb

- *I cannot sleep-my daughter's health is worrying me.*
- *I worry about the second Germanic consonant shift.*

- *I worry about my job.*
- *I worry about my grades.*



Associations of "Worries" (30 Words)

afraid	Filled with fear or apprehension. <i>Afraid to show emotion.</i>
annoy	Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations. <i>Your damned cheerfulness has always annoyed me.</i>
annoyance	A thing that annoys someone; a nuisance. <i>The Council found him an annoyance.</i>
annoyed	Slightly angry; irritated. <i>He was annoyed at being woken up so early.</i>
anxious	Very eager or concerned to do something or for something to happen. <i>She was extremely anxious about her exams.</i>
anxiously	In a manner resulting from or revealing anxiety. <i>We are all waiting anxiously for any news.</i>
apprehensive	Relating to perception or understanding. <i>Felt apprehensive about the consequences.</i>
bother	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i>A spot of bother.</i>
chagrin	Feel distressed or humiliated. <i>To my chagrin he was nowhere to be seen.</i>
concern	Something or someone that causes anxiety; a source of unhappiness. <i>Don't concern yourself old boy my lips are sealed.</i>
distracted	Unable to concentrate because one is preoccupied by something worrying or unpleasant. <i>Charlotte seemed too distracted to give him much attention.</i>
distress	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>Vessels in distress on or near the coast.</i>
disturb	Interfere with the normal arrangement or functioning of. <i>Take the rollers out carefully so as not to disturb the curls too much.</i>
disturbing	Causing anxiety; worrying. <i>A disturbing amount of crime.</i>
headache	A thing or person that causes worry or difficulty; a problem. <i>An administrative headache.</i>
inconvenience	To cause inconvenience or discomfort to. <i>The inconvenience of having to change trains.</i>
incubus	A nightmare. <i>Debt is a big incubus in developing countries.</i>

<u>irritation</u>	A sudden outburst of anger. <i>Any food produced irritation of the stomach.</i>
nuisance	An act which is harmful or offensive to the public or a member of it and for which there is a legal remedy. <i>I hope you re not going to make a nuisance of yourself.</i>
offend	Hurt the feelings of. <i>17 per cent of viewers said they had been offended by bad language.</i>
solicitude	A feeling of excessive concern. <i>I was touched by his solicitude.</i>
<u>terrifying</u>	Causing extreme terror. <i>The terrifying events of the past few weeks.</i>
trouble	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>He did not trouble to call his mother on her birthday.</i>
<u>uncomfortable</u>	Providing or experiencing physical discomfort. <i>This kind of life can prove disruptive and uncomfortable.</i>
<u>uneasy</u>	Lacking a sense of security or affording no ease or reassurance. <i>Uneasy lies the head that wears the crown.</i>
upset	The act of upsetting something. <i>Everyone gets stomach upsets from time to time.</i>
vex	Subject to prolonged examination, discussion, or deliberation. <i>I wouldn t vex it will be just great if whoever borrow the pump just bring it back.</i>
<u>vexation</u>	The act of troubling or annoying someone. <i>The vexations of life under canvas.</i>
worried	Mentally upset over possible misfortune or danger etc. <i>Michelle knew that her friends were very worried about her.</i>
worrying	The act of moving something by repeated tugs or pushes. <i>A worrying situation.</i>
