Synonyms of "Worsen" as a verb (20 Words)

add to	Determine the sum of.
aggravate	Make (a problem, injury, or offence) worse or more serious. <i>Military action would only aggravate the situation.</i>
augment	Grow or intensify. <i>He augmented his summer income by painting houses.</i>
become worse	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.

<u>compound</u>	Reckon (interest) on previously accumulated interest. <i>Prisoners lack of contact with the outside world compounds their problems.</i>
decline	(typically of something regarded as good) become smaller, fewer, or less; decrease. <i>Her health began to decline.</i>
degenerate	Grow worse. <i>The quality of life had degenerated.</i>
deteriorate	Grow worse. <i>Her condition deteriorated.</i>
exacerbate	Exasperate or irritate. <i>The strong pound has exacerbated the situation by making it much harder for UK companies to compete on price.</i>
exasperate	Exasperate or irritate. <i>This futile process exasperates prison officers.</i>
get worse	Move into a desired direction of discourse.
grow worse	Increase in size by natural process.
heighten	Increase the height of. <i>The stage will be extended heightening the grid by 3 4 metres.</i>
increase	Become bigger or greater in amount. <i>The university increased the number of students it admitted.</i>
inflame	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The repetitive motion inflamed her joint.</i>
<u>intensify</u>	Make more intense, stronger, or more marked. <i>The dispute began to intensify.</i>
<u>magnify</u>	Increase in size, volume or significance. <i>Praise the Lord and magnify Him.</i>
make worse	Achieve a point or goal.
take a turn for the worse	Be designed to hold or take.
<u>weaken</u>	Reduce the level or intensity or size or scope of. <i>The prisoner s resistance weakened after seven days.</i>

Usage Examples of "Worsen" as a verb

- *Arguing actually worsens the problem.*
- *Conditions in the slum worsened.*

- *Her condition worsened on the flight.*

Associations of "Worsen" (30 Words)

aggravate	Make worse. <i>Military action would only aggravate the situation.</i>
aggravating	Making worse. <i>She found him thoroughly aggravating and unprofessional.</i>
aggravation	Action that makes a problem or a disease (or its symptoms) worse. <i>The whole business has caused me a lot of aggravation.</i>
agitate	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>The thought of questioning Toby agitated him extremely.</i>
anger	Fill someone with anger provoke anger in. <i>He was angered that he had not been told.</i>
annoy	Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations. <i>A gallant Saxon who annoyed this Coast.</i>
attritional	Relating to or caused by attrition.
counteract	Oppose or check by a counteraction. <i>Should we deliberately intervene in the climate system to counteract global warming.</i>
debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>The King was forced to debase the coinage.</i>
debasement	Being mixed with extraneous material; the product of adulterating. <i>The outcome is rot and debasement of the system.</i>
decline	(especially of the sun) move downwards. <i>The birth rate continued to decline.</i>
degeneracy	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles. <i>The degeneracy of later Roman work.</i>
degenerate	An immoral or corrupt person. <i>The quality of life had degenerated.</i>
degeneration	Passing from a more complex to a simpler biological form. <i>Degeneration of the muscle fibres.</i>
deteriorate	Become progressively worse. <i>His mind deteriorated.</i>

devolve	(of property) be transferred from one owner to (another), especially by inheritance. <i>His duties devolved on a comrade.</i>
downturn	A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>The market took a downturn.</i>
enrage	Make (someone) very angry. <i>The students were enraged at these new rules.</i>
exacerbate	Exasperate or irritate. <i>The exorbitant cost of land in urban areas only exacerbated the problem.</i>
exasperate	Exasperate or irritate. <i>This futile process exasperates prison officers.</i>
inconvenient	Not conveniently timed. <i>It is inconvenient not to have a telephone in the kitchen.</i>
irritating	Causing irritation to a body part. <i>Bites of black flies are more than irritating they can be very painful.</i>
irritation	The neural or electrical arousal of an organ or muscle or gland. <i>Some chemicals cause a direct irritation to the skin leading to dermatitis.</i>
nettle	Sting with nettles. <i>I was only asking Jess said nettled.</i>
provocation	Action or speech held to be likely to prompt physical retaliation. <i>The result was a provocation of vigorous investigation.</i>
rage	A vehement desire or passion. <i>He raged at the futility of it all.</i>
retrogression	The process of returning to an earlier state, typically a worse one. <i>A retrogression to 19th century attitudes.</i>
vex	Be annoyed, irritated, or unhappy. <i>A vexing problem.</i>
wane	(of the moon) have a progressively smaller part of its visible surface illuminated, so that it appears to decrease in size. <i>Interest in the project waned.</i>
worse	Changed for the worse in health or fitness. <i>He did worse on the second exam.</i>
