Definitions of "Wound" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “wound” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The act of inflicting a wound.*
- *A casualty to military personnel resulting from combat.*
- *An injury to living tissue caused by a cut, blow, or other impact, typically one in which the skin is cut or broken.*
- *A figurative injury (to your feelings or pride).*
- *An injury to living tissue (especially an injury involving a cut or break in the skin).*
- *An injury to a person's feelings or reputation.*



Synonyms of "Wound" as a noun (16 Words)

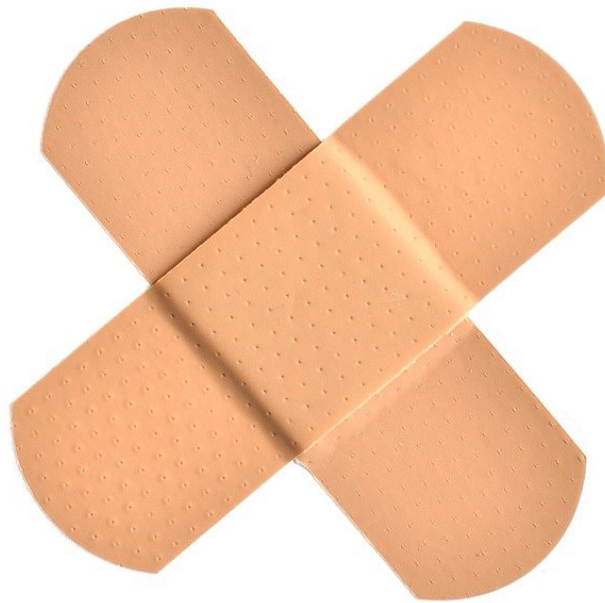
affront	An action or remark that causes outrage or offence. <i>He took his son's desertion as a personal affront.</i>
blow	An act of blowing an instrument. <i>Give your nose a good blow.</i>
combat injury	An engagement fought between two military forces.
cut	A piece of meat that has been cut from an animal carcass. <i>The elegant cut of his dinner jacket.</i>
injury	A casualty to military personnel resulting from combat. <i>All escaped without serious injury.</i>
<u>insult</u>	A rude expression intended to offend or hurt. <i>He saw the book as a deliberate insult to the Church.</i>
laceration	A deep cut or tear in skin or flesh. <i>His death was due to multiple skull fractures with laceration of the brain.</i>

lesion	Any localized abnormal structural change in a bodily part.
offence	The action of attacking someone or something. <i>I didn't intend to give offence.</i>
puncture	Loss of air pressure in a tire when a hole is made by some sharp object. <i>She was on her way home when she had a puncture.</i>
rent	An opening made forcibly as by pulling apart. <i>I cannot even afford to pay the rent on this flat.</i>
<u>slash</u>	An act of urinating. <i>Sentence breaks are highlighted by slashes.</i>
slight	An insult caused by a failure to show someone proper respect or attention. <i>An unintended slight can create grudges.</i>
tear	The act of tearing. <i>His story brought tears to her eyes.</i>
wounding	The act of inflicting a wound.



Usage Examples of "Wound" as a noun

- *A wound to the thigh.*
- *Deep in her breast lives the silent wound.*
- *The right reader of a good poem can tell the moment it strikes him that he has taken an immortal wound—that he will never get over it.*
- *Chest wounds.*
- *The new crisis has opened old wounds.*
- *A knife wound.*
- *He feared that mentioning it might reopen the wound.*

Synonyms of "Wound" as a verb (23 Words)

affront

Treat, mention, or speak to rudely.
*She was **affronted** by his familiarity.*

bruise

Inflict a bruise or bruises on a part of the body.
*Add the beans tomatoes and lime wedges and roughly **bruise** with the pestle.*

damage

Suffer or be susceptible to damage.
*The scandal could seriously **damage** his career.*

<u>disable</u>	Make unable to perform a certain action. <i>He was disabled in a car accident.</i>
<u>discomfort</u>	Make (someone) physically uncomfortable; cause slight pain to. <i>I am often discomforted at night by pain in the knee joint.</i>
distress	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>The manner in which leather jackets are industrially distressed.</i>
<u>disturb</u>	Change the arrangement or position of. <i>I am disturbed by the document I have just read.</i>
give offence to	Submit for consideration, judgment, or use.
<u>harm</u>	Cause or do harm to. <i>These pills won't harm your system.</i>
hurt	Hurt the feelings of. <i>He was hurting badly but he smiled through his tears.</i>
hurt the feelings of	Hurt the feelings of.
incapacitate	Make unable to perform a certain action. <i>He was incapacitated by a heart attack.</i>
injure	Hurt the feelings of. <i>A libel calculated to injure the company's reputation.</i>
<u>insult</u>	Treat, mention, or speak to rudely. <i>You're insulting the woman I love.</i>
maim	Injure or wound seriously and leave permanent disfiguration or mutilation. <i>People were maimed by the explosion.</i>
make miserable	Give certain properties to something.
mutilate	Inflict serious damage on. <i>Mutilated bodies.</i>
offend	Act in disregard of laws, rules, contracts, or promises. <i>A small hard core of young criminals who offend again and again.</i>
<u>scar</u>	Mark with a scar or scars. <i>Such lung scarring is associated with cigarette smoking.</i>
slight	Raze or destroy (a fortification). <i>A Council determined whether the Fort should be kept or slighted.</i>
<u>spite</u>	Deliberately hurt, annoy, or offend (someone). <i>He put the house up for sale to spite his family.</i>
trouble	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>She was too concerned with her own feelings to trouble about Clare's.</i>

upset

Defeat suddenly and unexpectedly.
*The motion of the boat would **upset** his stomach.*



Usage Examples of "Wound" as a verb

- *You really wounded his pride when you turned him down.*
- *The sergeant was seriously wounded.*



Associations of "Wound" (30 Words)

abrasion	Erosion by friction. <i>The metal is resistant to abrasion.</i>
bandage	Wrap around with something so as to cover or enclose. <i>Bandage an incision.</i>
bleed	An instance of bleeding. <i>The bleeding has stopped now.</i>
bruise	Inflict a bruise or bruises on a part of the body. <i>Potatoes bruise easily so treat them with care.</i>

concussion	Any violent blow. <i>He was carried off the pitch with concussion.</i>
contusion	The action of bruising. <i>The bruise resulted from a contusion.</i>
disinfect	Destroy microorganisms or pathogens by cleansing. <i>Disinfect a wound.</i>
fester	(of food or rubbish) become rotten and offensive to the senses. <i>Her wounds are festering.</i>
hamstring	Cripple a person or animal by cutting their hamstrings. <i>He pulled a hamstring.</i>
healing	The natural process by which the body repairs itself. <i>Her gentle healing hand.</i>
hemophilia	Congenital tendency to uncontrolled bleeding; usually affects males and is transmitted from mother to son.
hurt	Hurt the feelings of. <i>He was hurting badly but he smiled through his tears.</i>
impair	Make imperfect. <i>His vision was impaired.</i>
injure	Cause damage or affect negatively. <i>He injured his back helping the girl.</i>
injured	Emotionally hurt or upset or annoyed. <i>Injured feelings.</i>
injurious	Harmful to living things. <i>Food which is injurious to health.</i>
injury	An instance of being injured. <i>All escaped without serious injury.</i>
lacerate	Having edges that are jagged from injury. <i>Lacerate leaves.</i>
mar	A mark or flaw that spoils the appearance of something especially on a person's body. <i>Violence marred a number of New Year celebrations.</i>
maul	Take part in a maul. <i>The team were mauled 4 0 by Manchester City.</i>
ointment	A smooth oily substance that is rubbed on the skin for medicinal purposes or as a cosmetic. <i>Scented ointments for the skin.</i>

orthopedic	Of or relating to orthopedics. <i>Orthopedic shoes.</i>
salve	Apply a salve to usually for the purpose of healing. <i>Charity salves our conscience.</i>
scar	Mark with a scar or scars. <i>His arm will not scar.</i>
sore	Hurting. <i>All of us had sores and infections on our hands.</i>
splint	Support with a splint. <i>He lit the fire with a burning splint.</i>
stab	A wound made by stabbing. <i>She had a deep stab in the back.</i>
sterilize	Deprive (a person or animal) of the ability to produce offspring, typically by removing or blocking the sex organs. <i>A Scandinavian lake has been sterilized by rain made acid.</i>
twinge	Feel a sudden sharp, local pain. <i>Twinges of conscience.</i>
vitiate	Take away the legal force of or render ineffective. <i>The insurance is vitiated because of foolish acts on the part of the tenant.</i>
