altercation	Noisy quarrel. <i>I had an altercation with the ticket collector.</i>
<u>argument</u>	An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and x and the value is y . <i>It was a strong argument that his hypothesis was true.</i>
difference of opinion	The number that remains after subtraction; the number that when added to the subtrahend gives the minuend.
<u>disagreement</u>	Lack of consensus or approval. <i>There was some disagreement about the details.</i>
dispute	A disagreement or argument. <i>He had a dispute with his wife.</i>
dustup	An angry dispute.

fight	The inclination or ability to fight or struggle. <i>The team was full of fight.</i>
haggle	A period of haggling. <i>An inevitable and lengthy haggle over compensation.</i>
haggling	An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining).
quarrel	A heated argument or disagreement, typically about a trivial issue and between people who are usually on good terms. <i>We have no quarrel with the people of the country only with the dictator.</i>
row	The act of rowing as a sport. <i>Rows of barbed wire protected the trenches.</i>
run-in	An angry dispute.
shouting match	Uttering a loud inarticulate cry as of pain or excitement.
squabble	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Family squabbles.</i>
tiff	A petty quarrel, especially one between friends or lovers. <i>Joanna had a tiff with her boyfriend.</i>
war of words	An active struggle between competing entities.
words	The words that are spoken. <i>He has a gift for words.</i>
wrangling	Engagement in a long, complicated dispute or argument. <i>Weeks of political wrangling.</i>

debate	Argue about (a subject), especially in a formal manner. <i>MPs debated the issue in the Commons.</i>
<u>disagree</u>	(of food, climate, or an experience) have an adverse effect on. <i>The two approaches disagree about how to explain the decentralization in the 1960s and early 70s.</i>
have a disagreement	Cause to be born.
have a row	Be confronted with.
have an altercation	Organize or be responsible for.
have words	Suffer from; be ill with.
<u>quarrel</u>	Have a heated argument or disagreement. <i>Some people quarrel with this approach.</i>
row	Propel with oars. <i>Row the boat across the lake.</i>
squabble	Argue over petty things. <i>The boys were squabbling over a ball.</i>

counterargument	An argument or set of reasons put forward to oppose an idea or theory developed in another argument. <i>The obvious counterargument to that dire prediction is that the recession has depressed earnings.</i>
<u>debatable</u>	Open to doubt or debate. <i>It is debatable whether the country is coming out of recession.</i>
debate	Argue about (a subject), especially in a formal manner. <i>The national debate on abortion.</i>
declamatory	Ostentatiously lofty in style. <i>A long declamatory speech.</i>
discussion	An exchange of views on some topic. <i>See Appendix One for a more detailed discussion.</i>
disproof	The action of proving that something is untrue. <i>The answer ought to turn on considerations that are susceptible to verification or disproof.</i>

disputable	Capable of being disproved. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be disputable.</i>
disputatious	Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>It s a congenial hang out for disputatious academics.</i>
dispute	Have a disagreement over something. <i>He taught and disputed with local poets.</i>
<u>enthuse</u>	Utter with enthusiasm. <i>Public art is a tonic that can enthuse alienated youth.</i>
fight	The inclination or ability to fight or struggle. <i>McCracken will fight Sheffield s Martin Smith.</i>
gainsay	Take exception to. <i>None could gainsay her.</i>
hassel	Norwegian chemist noted for his research on organic molecules (1897-1981).
<u>hotspot</u>	An area of volcanic activity. <i>Fire engines were required to visit the scene again last night after hotspots appeared to be in danger of re igniting.</i>
polemical	Of or involving dispute or controversy. <i>A polemical essay.</i>
<u>quarrel</u>	A heated argument or disagreement, typically about a trivial issue and between people who are usually on good terms. <i>We quarreled over the question as to who discovered America.</i>
rebut	Overthrow by argument, evidence, or proof. <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did rebut.</i>
refutable	Able to be refuted.
<u>refute</u>	Deny or contradict (a statement or accusation). <i>His voice challenging his audience to rise and refute him.</i>
