<b>altercation</b>	Noisy quarrel. <i>I had an <b>altercation</b> with the ticket collector.</i>
<b><u>argument</u></b>	An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function $F$ are $x$ and $x$ and the value is $y$ . <i>It was a strong <b>argument</b> that his hypothesis was true.</i>
<b>difference of opinion</b>	The number that remains after subtraction; the number that when added to the subtrahend gives the minuend.
<b><u>disagreement</u></b>	Lack of consensus or approval. <i>There was some <b>disagreement</b> about the details.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	A disagreement or argument. <i>He had a <b>dispute</b> with his wife.</i>
<b>dustup</b>	An angry dispute.

<b>fight</b>	The inclination or ability to fight or struggle. <i>The team was full of <b>fight</b>.</i>
<b>haggle</b>	A period of haggling. <i>An inevitable and lengthy <b>haggle</b> over compensation.</i>
<b>haggling</b>	An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining).
<b>quarrel</b>	A heated argument or disagreement, typically about a trivial issue and between people who are usually on good terms. <i>We have no <b>quarrel</b> with the people of the country only with the dictator.</i>
<b>row</b>	The act of rowing as a sport. <i><b>Rows</b> of barbed wire protected the trenches.</i>
<b>run-in</b>	An angry dispute.
<b>shouting match</b>	Uttering a loud inarticulate cry as of pain or excitement.
<b>squabble</b>	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Family <b>squabbles</b>.</i>
<b>tiff</b>	A petty quarrel, especially one between friends or lovers. <i>Joanna had a <b>tiff</b> with her boyfriend.</i>
<b>war of words</b>	An active struggle between competing entities.
<b>words</b>	The words that are spoken. <i>He has a gift for <b>words</b>.</i>
<b>wrangling</b>	Engagement in a long, complicated dispute or argument. <i>Weeks of political <b>wrangling</b>.</i>

- *To quarrel noisily, angrily or disruptively.*

<b>have a disagreement</b>	Cause to be born.
<b>have a row</b>	Be confronted with.
<b>have an altercation</b>	Organize or be responsible for.
<b>have words</b>	Suffer from; be ill with.
<b><u>quarrel</u></b>	Have a heated argument or disagreement. <i>Some people <b>quarrel</b> with this approach.</i>
<b>row</b>	Propel with oars. <i><b>Row</b> the boat across the lake.</i>
<b>squabble</b>	Argue over petty things. <i>The boys were <b>squabbling</b> over a ball.</i>

<u><b>controversial</b></u>	Marked by or capable of arousing controversy. <i>The issue of the death penalty is highly <b>controversial</b>.</i>
<u><b>controversy</b></u>	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>The design of the building has caused <b>controversy</b>.</i>
<b>counterargument</b>	An argument or set of reasons put forward to oppose an idea or theory developed in another argument. <i>The obvious <b>counterargument</b> to that dire prediction is that the recession has depressed earnings.</i>
<u><b>debatable</b></u>	Open to doubt or debate. <i>It is <b>debatable</b> whether the country is coming out of recession.</i>
<b>debate</b>	Argue about (a subject), especially in a formal manner. <i>The national <b>debate</b> on abortion.</i>
<b>declamatory</b>	Ostentatiously lofty in style. <i>A long <b>declamatory</b> speech.</i>
<b>discussion</b>	An exchange of views on some topic. <i>See Appendix One for a more detailed <b>discussion</b>.</i>
<b>disproof</b>	The action of proving that something is untrue. <i>The answer ought to turn on considerations that are susceptible to verification or <b>disproof</b>.</i>

<b>disputable</b>	Capable of being disproved. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be <b>disputable</b>.</i>
<b>disputatious</b>	Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>It s a congenial hang out for <b>disputatious</b> academics.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	Have a disagreement over something. <i>He taught and <b>disputed</b> with local poets.</i>
<b><u>enthuse</u></b>	Utter with enthusiasm. <i>Public art is a tonic that can <b>enthuse</b> alienated youth.</i>
<b>fight</b>	The inclination or ability to fight or struggle. <i>McCracken will <b>fight</b> Sheffield s Martin Smith.</i>
<b>gainsay</b>	Take exception to. <i>None could <b>gainsay</b> her.</i>

<b><u>hotspot</u></b>	An area of volcanic activity. <i>Fire engines were required to visit the scene again last night after <b>hotspots</b> appeared to be in danger of re igniting.</i>
<b>polemical</b>	Of or involving dispute or controversy. <i>A <b>polemical</b> essay.</i>
<b><u>quarrel</u></b>	A heated argument or disagreement, typically about a trivial issue and between people who are usually on good terms. <i>We <b>quarreled</b> over the question as to who discovered America.</i>
<b>rebut</b>	Overthrow by argument, evidence, or proof. <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did <b>rebut</b>.</i>
