Definitions of "Wrap" as a noun

- *Cloak that is folded or wrapped around a person.*
- *A tortilla wrapped around a filling, eaten as a sandwich.*
- *The end of a session of filming or recording.*
- *A loose outer garment or piece of material.*
- *A sandwich in which the filling is rolled up in a soft tortilla.*
- *The covering (usually paper or cellophane) in which something is wrapped.*
- *Paper or soft material used for wrapping.*

- *A small packet of a powdered illegal drug.*
- *(of a garment) having one part overlapping another; wrap-around.*
- *A veil of secrecy maintained about something, especially a new project.*

classified

A short ad in a newspaper or magazine (usually in small print) and appearing along with other ads of the same type.

not to be disclosed	A light strong brittle grey toxic bivalent metallic element.

<u>scarf</u>	A garment worn around the head or neck or shoulders for warmth or decoration. <i>A silk scarf.</i>
secret	Something that is kept or meant to be kept unknown or unseen by others. <i>It remains one of nature's secrets.</i>
shawl	Cloak consisting of an oblong piece of cloth used to cover the head and shoulders.
<u>stole</u>	A stolen base an instance in which a base runner advances safely during the delivery of a pitch without the help of a hit or walk or passed ball or wild pitch.
top secret	A conical child's plaything tapering to a steel point on which it can be made to spin.
wrapper	A loose dressing gown for women. <i>Cellophane wrappers.</i>
wrapping	Paper or soft material used to cover or enclose something. <i>She took the cellophane wrapping off the box.</i>

Definitions of "Wrap" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "wrap" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Place an arm, finger, or leg round.*
- *Arrange or fold as a cover or protection.*
- *Cover or enclose in paper or soft material.*
- *Crash a vehicle into (a stationary object).*
- *Finish filming or recording.*
- *Arrange paper or soft material round (someone or something), typically as a covering or for warmth or protection.*
- *Cause (a word or unit of text) to be carried over to a new line automatically as the margin is reached, or to fit around embedded features such as pictures.*

- *Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering.*
- *(of a word or unit of text) be carried over automatically as the margin is reached.*
- *Arrange or or coil around.*
- *Clasp or embrace (someone).*
- *Crash into so as to coil around.*

embrace	Include or contain (something) as a constituent part. <i>She embraced Catholicism.</i>
encase	Enclose or cover in a case or close-fitting surround. <i>My feet were encased in mud.</i>
enclose	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>Two years after he enclosed the convent the plague struck one of the sisters.</i>
enfold	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>He shut off the engine and silence enfolded them.</i>
entangle	Entrap. <i>Fish attempt to swim through the mesh and become entangled.</i>
envelop	(of troops) surround (an enemy force). <i>Their assignment was to envelop the head of the enemy column and destroy it.</i>
enwrap	Wrap; envelop. <i>They were enwrapped in conversation.</i>
fold	Be able to be opened out unfold. <i>Fold up the newspaper.</i>
gift-wrap	Wrap (a gift) attractively.
hug	Congratulate or be pleased with oneself. <i>He hugged her close to him.</i>
interlace	Spin, wind, or twist together. <i>Jane interlaced her fingers to form a cup.</i>
interlink	Join or connect (two or more things) together. <i>The department's postgraduate work is closely interlinked with the MSc programme.</i>
intertwine	Make a loop in. <i>Intertwine the ribbons.</i>
interweave	Interlace by or as if by weaving. <i>The rugs are made by tightly interweaving the strands.</i>
muffle	Deaden (a sound or noise), especially by wrapping. <i>The trade unions fear their voice within the party is being muffled.</i>
pack	Hike with a backpack. <i>The nurse packed gauze in the wound.</i>
pack up	Have the property of being packable or of compacting easily.
package	Put into a box. <i>Choose products which are packaged in recyclable materials.</i>

parcel	Make something into a parcel by wrapping it. <i>He parcelled up the goods and sent them back.</i>
parcel up	Make into a wrapped container.
roll	Take the shape of a roll or cylinder. <i>She rolled the ball across the floor.</i>
sheathe	Cover with a protective sheathing. <i>Sheathe her face.</i>
swaddle	Wrap (someone, especially a baby) in garments or cloth. <i>She swaddled the baby tightly.</i>
swathe	Wrap in swaddling clothes.
tangle	Tangle or complicate. <i>The child entangled the cord.</i>
tie up	Connect, fasten, or put together two or more pieces.
twine	Spin, wind, or twist together. <i>Intertwined hearts.</i>
twist round	Twist suddenly so as to sprain.
weave	Sway to and fro. <i>Some thick mohairs can be difficult to weave.</i>
wind	Make a baby bring up wind after feeding by patting its back. <i>Wind your watch.</i>
wind round	Raise or haul up with or as if with mechanical help.
wrap round	Crash into so as to coil around.
wrap up	Arrange or or coil around.

- *The text in the document wraps around the image.*
- *Wrap the bandage around the injured limb.*
- *When you type, the text wraps to the next line.*

- *She wrapped her arms around the child.*
- *The program can automatically wrap text around irregularly shaped graphics.*
- *He wrapped an arm around her waist.*
- *Words are wrapped to the next line if they are too long.*

- *Richard wrapped his car round a telegraph pole.*

circumscribe	<i>The minister's powers are circumscribed both by tradition and the organization of local government.</i>
confine	Restrict or confine. <i>The troops were confined to their barracks.</i>
convolve	Combine (one function or series) with another by forming their convolution.
cover	The protective covering on the front back and spine of a book. <i>One reason doctors take temperatures is to cover themselves against negligence claims.</i>
detain	Keep (someone) in official custody, typically for questioning about a crime or in a politically sensitive situation. <i>Customs officers may detain goods for up to two days.</i>
encircle	Bind with something round or circular. <i>The town is encircled by fortified walls.</i>
enclose	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>The lamp was enclosed in a frosted glass globe.</i>
engulf	Flow over or cover completely. <i>The toad can engulf nestling birds.</i>
envelop	(of troops) surround (an enemy force). <i>A figure enveloped in a black cloak.</i>
environ	Extend on all sides of simultaneously; encircle. <i>The stone circle was enviored by an expanse of peat soil.</i>
foil	Cover or back with foil. <i>The fins of a fish act as hydrofoils.</i>
gift	Give something as a gift especially formally or as a donation or bequest. <i>He has a gift for comedy.</i>
hermetically	In an airtight manner. <i>A hermetically closed society.</i>
incarcerate	Imprison or confine. <i>Many are incarcerated for property offences.</i>
packaging	The presentation of a person or thing in an advantageous way. <i>His business is packaging for transport.</i>
restrict	Place under restrictions limit access to. <i>Cities can restrict groups of protesters from gathering on a residential street.</i>
roll	Move along or from side to side unsteadily or uncontrollably. <i>They rolled him over on to his back.</i>

seal	A stamp affixed to a document as to attest to its authenticity or to seal it. <i>Seal the letter.</i>
sheathe	Cover with a protective sheathing. <i>Her legs were sheathed in black stockings.</i>
shroud	Form a cover like a shroud. <i>Mist shrouded the castle.</i>
surround	Surround so as to force to give up. <i>He loves to surround himself with family and friends.</i>
swathe	Wrap in swaddling clothes. <i>Vast swathes of countryside.</i>
twine	Spin, wind, or twist together. <i>The plant will twine round its support.</i>
wind	Catch the scent of get wind of. <i>The river winds through the hills.</i>
wrapper	A loose dressing gown for women. <i>Cellophane wrappers.</i>
wrapping	The covering (usually paper or cellophane) in which something is wrapped. <i>She took the cellophane wrapping off the box.</i>
zinc	Coat iron with zinc or a zinc compound to prevent rust. <i>The metal has to be zinced to prevent oxidation and decay.</i>
